

From the Pastor's Keyboard

"Esperanza"

Happy New Year! Yes, you read that right. This is not my January article, it is my December article; yet I am wishing you "Happy New Year!"

This is because in the liturgical cycle of the church, the New Year begins with the first Sunday of Advent. This year, that Sunday is November 27. We begin the year by expressing our desire, our longing for HOPE in our lives, and understanding that God is the avenue to realize the possibility of HOPE in the New Year.

HOPE in the midst of oppression was a constant theme in the lives of the first century people whose lives are the focus of the stories of our traditions. Mary and Joseph and their contemporaries lived in a society plagued by nepotism, hypocrisy, and oppression. (Sound familiar?) The social and religious authorities of their day used religious expression to manipulate the already oppressed, making it very hard to find God's presence in their lives.

But in the midst of this, the Christmas story tells us a tale of HOPE. Joseph and Mary both had HOPE in what was to come after hearing God's messengers tell them "Do not be afraid." Their HOPE is expressed as they journey to Bethlehem, give birth in humble circumstance, and name their child as instructed. The name they give him, in itself, is an expression of HOPE; "Jesus" literally means "Yahweh is Salvation" or, to phrase it in a more contemporary way, "God Save Us."

The HOPE that Mary and Joseph had in their context was based in their faith. The stories of our traditions tell us they both had a rich faith heritage based in Jewish instruction, and were brought up with a knowledge of God and God's commandments. They followed proper religious customs, such as the dedication of Jesus (Luke 2:21) and annual pilgrimages to the Temple to celebrate Passover (Luke 2:41). They knew God as a very real presence in their lives, and their HOPE was based in this faith. Are we cultivating our faith as Joseph and Mary did? If we do not cultivate our faith, is it any wonder when we lose HOPE?

The Spanish word for "HOPE" is "Esperanza." While I was in Mexico, this word came up often. The people of Chiapas are bereft of many conveniences our U.S. culture has to offer, but they are very rich in "Esperanza." Despite the many layers of oppression they endure daily, they have a great sense of HOPE in a better world to come; an "Esperanza" based in their strong faith.

I think our U.S. culture could use a bit of "Esperanza." We have become so overwhelmed by our excess and jaded by tweets of misinformation that we seem to have almost forgotten about strengthening our faith; and certainly, lost our sense of HOPE.

But now, with Advent, a New Year has begun. With the newness of the season, a renewed sense of HOPE is upon us. Advent is about anticipation; and as we anticipate the birth of Christ, we also

anticipate the HOPE that he brings us; HOPE for a new world, new relationships, a new realization of God's Kingdom in our midst.

This is the season of HOPE. May a renewed sense of HOPE be kindled in your hearts this Advent Season! *-Pastor Rick*

CHURCH COUNCIL

CUCC Council Meeting—November 15, 2022

The meeting was called to order at 6:34 p.m. by Kristy Hayward. Pastor Rick opened with a prayer and shared a bit about his sabbatical experience. Present: Pastor Rick, Kristy Hayward, Kurt Heine via Zoom, Sue Ann Schaefer, Mike Pierson, Tricia Price, Stefanie Zimny, Lorry Dreier, Keith Birkes, Mark Duncan via Zoom, Jessica Lucas, Ted Dachroeden, and Alethea Tennill via Zoom.

Mike Pierson made a motion to approve the agenda with a second from Tricia Price. The motion passed.

Jessica Lucas made a motion to approve the minutes. Second from Lorry Dreier. The motion passed.

Sue Ann Schaefer discussed Chapters 7 and 8 in the book, <u>A Bigger Table</u> by John Pavlovitz. Chapter 7 talks about radical hospitality. Chapter 8 talks about total authenticity. We all vacillate between certainty and doubt. One of the ways to cultivate this is "Our Life Story" groups, where each person shares with the small group their life story, to feel fully known. Kristy Hayward will report on Chapters 9 and 10 next month.

Unfinished Business:

- Spots were filled for stewardship duties.
- Sanctuary Renovation Updates: 2 of 3 bids have come in for carpet. We have wallpaper samples for the front wall that match the carpet. Mike talked to a local company about handrails for the steps. Two companies have come in to discuss painting the ceiling, and we are waiting on bids. Mike's goal is to have all of our bids ready for Finance & Stewardship by sometime in December. Then we could have some drawings ready for people to see at the 100th Anniversary kickoff. We also need to eventually replace the part of the roof over the gathering area. It has 3 HVAC units on top of it, and if any of them break, we have to rent a crane to replace it, so it would make the most sense to replace all 3 at once.
- The 100th Anniversary committee: The first event will be a potluck on January 22. There will be one event each month for 10 months, with many focusing on a specific decade of church history. The culminating event will be the last weekend in September, possibly at the MU Health Pavilion (where the farmers market is), which only costs \$250 to rent.
- New Cleaning Service: Ted Dachroeden got a bid from Jan-Pro, and recommends we go with them for our cleaning service. Council voted and approved Jan-Pro unanimously
- Administrative assistant position: discussed utilizing IMKO staffing for this position. Pastor Rick is going to follow up with more information.
- Security plan: A lot of policies in our policy manual are outdated, including our Security Plan. We need to look at many of them in upcoming months, maybe starting in January. Council stewards each Sunday should try to keep an eye out for any problems, including health issues and anything suspicious.

New Business

- Additional alarm for LODO door: There's a back door off the storage room with no sensor. When the system was installed, they couldn't put a sensor on the door for some reason, but we think our new security company should be able to add one. Mike will call them and ask them to come look at it.
- A Cub Scout den (just 6-8 kids) wants to use the Fellowship Hall twice a month on Sunday late afternoons. A Girl Scout troop also wants to use the Fellowship Hall on Monday nights. Ted Dachroeden moved to approve both groups. Lorry Dreier seconded. Motion passed.
- Christmas Eve services: Services will be at 7:00 and 11:00 p.m. this year (no 4:00 service).

Pastor's Report: Pastor Rick's is looking ahead to the next five years now that he's back from sabbatical.

Financial Report: We had a good October, but we are still way behind for the year. Our goal for Giving Tuesday is \$25,000, and it will all go into Joyful Giving. Dom Lee is putting together a video to promote it.

Ministry Team Reports:

- Building & Grounds: Ted Dachroeden. LODO had a bench that broke, and Ted took care of it.
- Fellowship & Hospitality: Stefany Zimny. Advent banquet needs help from people not in bells or choir on Dec. 11.
- Finance & Stewardship: Report submitted. Giving Tuesday goal is \$25,000.
- Membership & Care: Report submitted. Small group gatherings are happening. New church directory in spring.

• Inclusion & Affirmation/Nurture & Education/Outreach & Advocacy/Worship & Music: Reports were submitted Meeting adjourned at 8:40 p.m.

SANCTUARY REMODEL

Slow strides continue happening toward the goal of an upgrade to many of the physical space aspects of our sanctuary. Design decisions are being made in connection with our designer, Kenna Weber. Bids are being secured for everything from carpet installation, ceiling painting, window replacement, chancel railings, etc. The goal remains to have final bids ready for Finance and Stewardship prior to the end of the year AND a final design presentation for the congregation in January. If all goes to plan, we hope to begin work early next summer and complete the project prior to the end of 2023 to be combined with the celebration of the church's centennial.

One of the aspects of the renovation is the replacement of the smaller square windows that go around the upper part of the sanctuary (45 windows in total!). The textured plastic panes will be replaced with insulated glass panes that will be covered with a special vinyl film to simulate the look of stained glass adding a significant color dimension to the space. The opportunity to sponsor a window (or more) will be presented to the congregation. The details of this plan are still in the works.

There will be several ways in which we plan to utilize our own resources to complete aspects of the project to help keep costs lower. These include wall painting, moving of furniture, railing installation, window film installation, and drapery installation. Be on the lookout for how to signup to help out! It is exciting to visualize the finished product!

A round-about Christmas message....

I have written several Vacation Bible School curriculums. It started when my daughter attended a VBS that used a coloring book for the lesson and the art project was to color a page from the book. The teaching part was a lecture. The children were bored and, I suspect, learned little. So, being of childish mind myself, I volunteered to direct the next year's session and found a very innovative and interactive VBS package. After that year, I started writing them myself with my husband's assistance.

That church had several families with young children and parents who had no fear of trying new things. One of my favorite VBS themes involved time travel via a tunnel. My husband and I made this tunnel out of PVC pipe covered in black plastic with rope lights inside to light the way. There was an adult to guild the children thru, known as the "Time Tunnel Attendant" or TTA.

The students went through the tunnel and 'back in time' to help Abraham and Sarah pack when God instructed them to move. They watched King Solomon decern which woman was the actual mother of the disputed baby. You get the idea. On the final night, the time tunnel 'malfunctioned.' Instead of taking them back into Biblical times, it took them into the future where they met an alien. The alien was a Ferengi (a species known to Star Trek lovers, such as Pastor Rick and myself). When the alien asked where the students were from, a conversation developed. The children explained, in their own words: VBS, the Bible, God, and Jesus. They actually got to 'witness' their faith to someone, probably for the first time.

Why is this story in the December communicator? Because the birth of Jesus changed our world forever, and set an example for our faith in such a wonderful way.

Let's lean into this precious holiday season by remembering to celebrate through witness . . . especially to those who are experiencing sorrow, loss, and pain, no matter *their* religious beliefs. <u>Our</u> belief is that all are God's children. Thus, as you are able, reach out with kind words, cards, tasty treats, a hug –

"Now may our Lord Jesus Christ himself, and God our Creator, who loved us and gave us eternal comfort and good hope through grace, comfort your hearts and establish them in every good work and word." <u>2 Thessalonians 2:16,17 ESV</u>



INTERNATIONAL MISSIONS

CULTURAL IMMERSION IN CHIAPAS

Most of the congregation is aware that I went to Mexico on Sabbatical. You may not be aware of what I was doing there, or the unique relationship our church has with the missions we support in Chiapas. The next few months, I will be using this space to share an aspect of our mission work, and how we are addressing Jesus' prayer for unity.

Chiapas is the southernmost state of 31 states in Mexico. Chiapas is the poorest state economically, but it is one of the richest states culturally. It is home to some

very inspiring artistic destinations, a center of religious expression, and home to a diverse group of indigenous people who have incorporated the ancient faith and customs of the Mayan community into our current context.

San Cristobal de las Casas is the city that I visit when I am in Chiapas. San Cristobal was founded in 1528, making it one of the oldest cities in America. However, the indigenous Mayan people have lived there since 1400 BC, around the same time Moses was alive. Spanish (and later US) colonization, beginning in 1492, brought harsh oppression to the Mayan community, fracturing them into various camps, depending on which Conquistador found them first. I heard many stories while I was there about the historic oppression of these people and how the lingering effects of that oppression still resonate with them today.

The Institute for Intercultural Studies and Research is one of our mission agencies in San Cristobal de las Casas. This is the organization I worked with. **The Institute** works with the indigenous Mayan communities to bring reconciliation to them through both implicit and explicit teaching. Many of their workshops deliver explicit

instruction, while planting implicit ideals of peace and justice, harmony and unity in their communities. To put it simply, they teach them to get along while teaching them important life skills. At CUCC, we support this mission directly by giving them donations each year, and we support them indirectly through our support of Global Ministries through Our Church's Wider Mission and One Great Hour of Sharing. 
CUCC IS PROVIDING HOUSING FOR SENIORS IN CHILE

The Pentecostal Church of Chile (IPC) is a denomination born in Chile that has been a partner of Global Ministries for many years. The Bethany House Project was established by the IPC in 1995 in response to the need for safe and adequate housing for many elderly who lived in poverty and solitude in and around the city of Curico, where the IPC has its headquarters and many congregations. The Chilean national social services program for senior adults did not adequately meet the needs of this segment of the population. IPC determined to build a facility that would provide improved and secure standards of living for seniors who needed a place to live out their remaining life with peace and dignity.

The Pentecostal Church of Chile had available to them property in Curicó, south of the capital city of Santiago, that would be a good place for the project. Bethany House was designed as a national project of the IPC, although the local IPC church of Curicó would administer the project. Bethany House offers housing for seniors, both men and women, regardless of church affiliation.

With substantial financial support of the Massachusetts Conference of the United Church of Christ, the project was completed and provides housing for 15 seniors. The common denominator among the residents was a low self-esteem rooted in loneliness. The project has made a vast difference in the lives of the residents.

IPC is currently proposing an expansion project to build four more dormitories, two full baths, a multi-purpose dining room, a central hall, and a food storage pantry. Expansion will include the hiring of four additional caregivers. The estimated budget for the proposed expansion is \$87,400 for building construction and \$4,220 for furnishings and equipment. Through Global Ministries, the people of Columbia United Church of Christ are making a difference in the lives of these Chilean Seniors!
