

From the Pastor's Keyboard

Dear Friends in Christ:



During his time away, I am honored and pleased to serve as your "Sabbatical Pastor." I have been meeting with Pastor Rick and the Sabbatical Team to plan for the three months that I will be with you. The Sabbatical Team is a wonderful group of folks who will help guide all of us through the sabbatical time. The one question that we shall focus is this: "How are we doing in our ministry together in this moment?"

My covenant with the church is that I will be in Columbia two days a week, with one night per week lodging. Much of my preparation will be accomplished from my home office in Independence, allowing time during my two days in Columbia for worship, gatherings, calling, staff meetings. The days onsite will not always be the same two days of the week, although Sundays will definitely be included--of course! If you want to meet with me, please do contact me to set up a time. We also have Skype, Zoom, and FaceTime as useful platforms over the distance.

I will be available, upon request and as negotiated, for emergencies and pastoral visitation. The Sabbatical Team and Office Staff will coordinate the schedule. My goal is to be accessible and responsive to needs as they arise.

I will also rely heavily on the gifts and experience of the church staff. Each one knows the tasks of ministry that are needed in the position. It is a particularly talented group of individuals who work well together. I will honor and support each staff member along the way.

There will not be any major changes to worship and how things are done at Columbia United Church of Christ. We shall continue the missional focus that the congregation has embraced. I shall endeavor to prepare sermons that are descriptive of our shared reality, not prescriptive or didactic.

My first day at Columbia UCC will be Saturday, August 6. I am excited to share in worship with you Sunday, August 7, celebrating the Lord's Supper.




In its 27th year, the CROP HUNGER WALK continues to fight against the challenges of poor health, disaster, unemployment, and other concerns that leave our local and distant neighbors hungry. MEET AND GREET WITH REV. DALE PARSON

Welcome Rev. Dale Parson, our Sabbatical Pastor! Dale will be filling in for Pastor Rick while he is on Sabbatical, August 1 — October 31. Dale is well known by many at CUCC from his time as our Associate Conference Minister. Dale retired from that position in 2017 and has done interim work with churches since that time. He will be working with us part time, around 25 hours/week, leading worship on Sunday mornings, and working with the staff and Council during the week. There will be a meet and greet for Dale before worship on his first Sunday here, August 7. Plan to come early that day to meet him!

A few weeks ago our new group of Council members met for our annual retreat. CHURCH COUNCIL NOTES FOR JULY

Pastor Rick discussed the book *Planning Sabbaticals*. Sabbaticals are good for the congregation and the pastor. This is a opportunity for both to learn and grow, to rekindle the reasons why we do what we do as a church and members of it, to allow time for all to refocus on God's missions.

Our next book will be A Bigger Table by John Pavlovitz. Trisha Price will lead the discussion on the first few chapters at our August meeting.

- Worship/Sanctuary: Carpet has been selected. We are now looking for bids for carpet and installation. Bids will also be solicited for drapery and paint.
- Building Project: Two HVAC systems have been replaced. A third one is on order. The sealing of the parking lot will happen the 2nd week of August. Fred and his crew will stripe the parking lot after it has been sealed. The floors will be refinished at the end of that week also.
- Sabbatical Team: The Sabbatical team is launching a project that has jobs needing to be completed each month. The congregation can pick a job and sign up to complete it during that month.
- April will be on vacation for two weeks in September and is currently lining up volunteers to cover the office while she is away.
- The 100th Anniversary committee: The committee currently consists of Doug Privitt, Jolene Hackman, and Melba Shaffer. Other names were suggested and will be contacted.
- Vision Team: The Vision Team meeting will be August 21 after church. Each Ministry Team needs to consider what projects they will work on this year to help reach the 5-year plans.
- ♦ Budget: All budgets are due to Sue Ann Schaeffer by August 31.
- Pastor Rick has received his yearly evaluation along with 15 responses from the Ministry Teams.
- Seminary Student: There is the possibility that we will have a seminary student from September December. Her name is Shelly Dunham. She has recently relocated from Colorado to Columbia. Rev. Bryan Crousore will be her supervisor. She is interested in holding an adult Bible study, outreach projects, and visiting shutins. She will work 10 hours per week. The council approved Shelly Dunham being a seminary student for fall semester.
- Eagle Scout Project: Connor Maltsberger would like to build shelves in the back room of the Fellowship Hall as part of his Eagle Project. He will raise the funds needed to purchase the supplies. He will complete the project.
- Gift Policy Revision: The Finance and Stewardship committee has revised the Gift Policy and submitted it to the council for approval. After some discussion and a minor change the motion passed.
- Snow Removal: Even though it is hot outside, it is time to start looking for Snow Removal Companies. We are looking for bids from companies that have their own equipment.
- Council Retreat Key Points: Council members must represent the interests of the Church on behalf of the Council and the Ministry Teams. The responsibility of the Ministry Team representatives is to the church as a whole, not to their individual Ministry Team. Your first responsibility is to the church council. The governance of the Council is to set policies so that the ministry of the Church can happen. Some people are tasked with the governance of the Church, but all are tasked with the ministry of the Church.
- Financial Reports: We are typically behind in Joyful Giving this time of the year. However, this year we are \$20,000 behind more that most years. The finance team will be sending out a letter to the congregation.
- Membership & Care: We have had a few frequent visitors to our church. A new directory is in the works. Pictures will occur March 2023.
- Nurture & Education: Lydia Whitacre is looking for adult education classes for next year. If anyone has any interest, please let Lydia know.


CUCC has been a beehive of activity this summer, addressing maintenance issues and prepping our building for an active program year thanks to your generous financial support. Thank you for making this care possible!



INCLUSION AND AFFIRMATION MINISTRY TEAM

Wow, it has been hot! The ONA Committee decided to skip a July meeting and will reconvene in August. Taking some of you on a trip down memory lane, remember the Disney movie, *Pollyanna*? It was about a young orphaned girl, whose parents had been missionaries. She was sent to live with her aunt Polly, whom she was named after.

Pollyanna was a high spirited and infectiously positive bolt of light. Her aunt, on the other hand, was somber, rich, controlling, and seemed to think that life was a struggle that one must endure. She managed to pass this pessimistic thread through her whole community.

Needless to say, these two personalities collided.

Pollyanna's dad had taught her the "Glad Game." In any situation where things have gone wrong, the game was to find something in that situation to be glad about. Pollyanna was a pro at this game.

There was a elderly 'invalid' in the community who was just waiting to die. Pollyanna arrived on the scene and noticed that the crystals from the lady's bedside lamp created prisms of color in the right window. The two of them made a game of hanging those crystals and creating a rainbow of twinkling colors on her wall. It completely brightened that woman's outlook: so simple, yet so inspired.

There are many of us in this congregation and indeed this country who could benefit from playing the "Glad Game." Some of us are experiencing the 'long goodbye' of a loved one either due to cognitive or physical decline. Some are witnessing their own weakening abilities. Some are miles and miles away from family members not knowing if they are safe. The recent "Supreme" Court rulings have handcuffed individuals to situations which they didn't cause, but which will alter their lives and livelihoods forever.

So, then, where is the 'glad' in all of that? It is in the positive aspects of our humanity.

- 1) The "long goodbye" gives us a chance to cherish memories and celebrate those lucid moments together.
- 2) We can celebrate the physical blessings we retain and rejoice in having people around us to help.
- 3) For loved ones far away, we can write our local happenings on a postcard and/or phone our loved ones whenever possible.
- 4) In regards to the court handcuffs, we can protest, we can provide rides and safe havens, we can vote and make our voices heard.





To me, another word for glad would be 'thankful,' which fits right into 1 Thessalonians 5:18:

In every thing give thanks: for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you.

Although school is a fun and safe place for many young people to flourish, for others it is a sheer veil covering a nightmare. It is a place where some come to continue the pretense that everything in their lives is "normal." It is a place where some come to escape their own homes and realities. Throughout the last couple of school years, dealing with the COVID pandemic, this dark reality has been brought into the light. Even though many teacher and staff already knew some young people dealing with less than ideal situations, many more have discovered the brutal truth and depth of this reality. Reports of physical, mental, and sexual abuse of children and young people skyrocketed. New cases of these various types of abuse, including sex trafficking, flooded the phones and offices of local police departments, the Family Support Division Offices, and various organizations that provide safe housing and services, including the STOP Human Trafficking Coalition of Central Missouri. This dark secret has now become public knowledge and more people are stepping up to fight this horrible injustice.

As members of this community, the responsibility rests on all of us—to take action in gaining knowledge, advocating, reporting signs, and educating others. It truly does take a village to raise a child, and we are that village. The young people in our community will be our leaders some day. They are talented, innovative, generous, world changers, and they need all of us to help them grow into adulthood so they can become productive and thriving members of society. Every single young person deserves this chance—the chance to be and do something great. Let's help them get there by

rallying around them with support, protection, love, and example.

CUCC IS WORKING WITH WOMEN IN CHIAPAS

The International Service for Peace (SIPAZ) was founded in 1995 and is a permanent program supported by an international coalition of civil organizations and religious groups. SIPAZ plays a role in preventing sociopolitical violence in the communities of the Mexican state of Chiapas and the states of Oaxaca and Guerrero in southern Mexico. SIPAZ operates from a perspective of non-violence that stresses the construction of positive peace.

SIPAZ has identified three primary areas of work:

- Accompaniment of women and/or women's groups in rural areas of southern Mexico
- Generate increased attention on women's roles in peace processes
- Generate an integral gender perspective within SIPAZ's activities

Although many SIPAZ workshops are exclusively for women, the presence of men is also encouraged. Having men in the workshops creates a positive exchange of ideas between women and men, bringing interesting insights to the discussions and reflections. Language is frequently a difficulty because not

all SIPAZ staff persons speak the region's indigenous language, which is ch'ol, and many of the indigenous women do not speak Spanish. The project plans look for women in the communities who can help, both with the preparation and evaluation of the workshops and translation.

SIPAZ is just one of four mission agencies in Chiapas that are supported by CUCC through our relationship with Gl.
