From the Pastor's Keyboard

As I write this message, I'm reflecting on our very successful and safe "Falloween" here at CUCC. With 30+ volunteers working together to put on the event and 100+ participants, it was a wonderful day for everyone. The fall weather was crisp and the costumes were fun. It was a safe way to celebrate our community together. There were strict guidelines from the City of Columbia that were followed. We had to submit a request to the City for permission, a document that detailed all of the precautions we were planning. There were several emails back and forth from the City to ensure that safety protocols would be practiced, but in the end, permission was received and all was well. It is good to know such standards are in place to keep our community safer.

In many ways this event was emblematic of how, as people of God, we can learn to live as God's children in a Coronavirus world. Those who choose to do so can gather safely, and community can happen with socially distanced guidelines observed and safety measures (such as wearing masks) practiced. Of course, this is not the right choice for everyone. Those with compromised immune systems or other vulnerable conditions are wise to choose to remain more isolated. But for those who choose to participate in community, it is well and good that we as a church and we as a greater Columbia community are safely providing that option.

The numbers here in Boone County show us the fruits of our safety practices. We have gone from a 5-day average of 143 new cases of COVID on September 5 to a 5-day average of 38 new cases of COVID on October 20, and 5-day averages continue to drop. Our prevention efforts and slow emergence into community are making a difference. We see that it is possible, for those who are not in the most vulnerable population and who choose to do so, to live in a Coronavirus world in relative safety.

The knowledge that we can learn to live in a Coronavirus world is encouraging, because despite sensationalistic predictions that it will just disappear, or that a vaccine will cure everything instantly, the reality is that it is not going anywhere for a while, even when a vaccine is found. We will be living with the Coronavirus for a long time, just as we have lived with other viruses for a long time, and like other viruses, we will also learn how to live with the Coronavirus safely.

This Coronavirus has caused such anxiety in our world over the past year because in recent generations we have adopted a false sense of immortality. We believe that nothing bad can or will happen to us. If we get sick, we take a pill. If we don't like our body, we sculpt it. If we need more energy, we have special drinks for that. We feel like we can live forever and then get extremely anxious when our idea of immortality is threatened.

When we think our physical bodies are immortal, we forget about what truly is immortal, our eternal existence with God, here on this earth and beyond. We forget about our existence as spiritual beings on a temporary physical journey. When we think our bodies are immortal and focus solely on feeding our bodies, we forget to feed our souls, we forget to nurture our spiritual selves.

But the good news is that when we repent, when we turn back to God, God is waiting to welcome us. In a recent pastoral letter Dr. Ginny Brown Daniel, our Conference Minister, stated, ". . . take heart, we are not alone. Jesus Christ went before us to embody how we are to love our neighbor in frightening moments; and God, our Creator, created us in God's image in order to build the Beloved Community in the midst of trials and tribulations." Even in these frightening times, in the midst of these trials and tribulations, we are called to be secure in the knowledge that God is giving us strength and encouraging us to be faithful.

We all will emerge into community at different times, when we are ready and feel we can safely do so, but whether we are in quarantine or in controlled public spaces, we are all still part of God's Beloved Community and the community of faithful Christians that has been established in this time and this place. You are never alone. Your spirit is ever connected to God and to all the Saints of the Church, those who have gone before us and those yet to come. Hopefully, in that reality, you can find some solace in these anxious times.

CUCC LIVESTREAMING TO CONTINUE

The COVID pandemic has not only brought anxiety to our world, it has also brought a share of positive innovation, not the least of which is the opportunity to livestream our worship services at CUCC and reach a new demographic of viewers anxious to hear the Good News of our Savior, Jesus Christ!



We plan to continue livestreaming our worship services indefinitely; but for those of you who have been watching at home, you know the quality of the feed has been challenging. Limitations in technology and internet service have made some livestreams spotty and challenging.

But the best is yet to come! On Tuesday, September 22 the Church Council approved purchasing new technology for livestreaming our services, including two PTZ cameras with optical zoom that will be fixed in the rear of the sanctuary, a video switcher, preview monitor, network hub and more, all from Nelson Audio in Eldon, MO. They are the company that also installed our new sound system.

This technology is not inexpensive (around \$7500, installed and serviced) but it will make Sunday Morning "Couch Church" more transformative for all our viewers, both within and outside of the congregation!

Please be patient. Technological advances are coming soon! We just found out last week that the equipment has started to arrive at Nelson Audio; as soon as it all arrives, they will schedule an installation date. We are hoping to have it all installed by mid-November and have this project completed by Advent. Livestream viewers, keep watching! You should see a significant improvement by mid-November.



PLEASE HELP US KEEP OUR PLAYGROUND SAFE FOR ALL CHILDREN BY FOLLOWING THESE GUIDELINES:

- The CUCC playground is designed for, and should only be used by, children ages 8 and younger.

NEW TRANSPORTATION FUND ESTABLISHED

At the October Church Council Meeting, the Council heard a recommendation by the Membership & Care Ministry Team, the Inclusion & Advocacy Ministry Team, and the Finance & Stewardship Ministry team to establish a new Designated Fund—the Transportation Fund. After discussion, the Council voted to establish this fund with \$10,000 from the Alan Mader Estate.

The primary purpose of this fund is to accumulate donations that can be used for purchasing or renting transportation, specifically a church van or bus, as well as maintaining and insuring such a vehicle. This fund could also be used for short term rental goals to transport members to and from church or for special church trips or other special projects identified and authorized by the Church Council.

Approval to utilize this fund to purchase vehicles will require specific ministry plans and schedules attached which designate usage, maintenance, and amortization. This means that no purchases can be made from this fund until all details are worked out and listed exhaustively, including the items mentioned above.

This fund is open to contributions from fellowship groups or individuals through estate planning, recurring gifts, or one-time donations. For this fund to grow, it is up to individual members to make it happen.

We have several church members with transportation challenges, especially our homebound members. This fund could, if it grows, be used to help address these challenges, whether we purchase a vehicle, rent vehicles on occasion, or come up with some other creative option to provide transportation options to care for our members.

For years, some in the congregation have lamented our inability to provide transportation options to our homebound members, youth, fellowship groups, and others. This is your chance to make these dreams a reality! To contribute to this fund, check with <u>Sue Ann Shaefer</u>, <u>Brent Marcks</u>, <u>George Zimny</u>, or another member of the Church Council. We can make this happen if we all work together!

Here is how the funds designated for "Giving Tuesday" will be allocated:

- 80% of what is received on Giving Tuesday will be allocated for "Joyful Giving;" the funds needed to meet our budget goal for 2020 (\$\$90,000 is needed between now and December 31)
- 10% of what is received on Giving Tuesday will be allocated to our Little One's Day Out preschool ministry, to help offset their shortfall this year due to COVID-19
- 10% of what is received will be given away. In keeping with the Biblical mandate to Tithe 10% of our blessings, we will allocate 10% of Giving Tuesday receipts to the Voluntary Action Center, to help fund their Christmas


Greetings CUCC!



10 Tips On How To Talk To Your Kids About Race

1. Prioritize your kids.

Don't overwhelm them with your own feelings. Ensure conversations give them space to work through their emotions. Process your experience enough so the conversation with your kids can focus on them more

2. Ask them what they know.

In the Information Age, your children probably already know more than you think. Respect them enough to assume they understand a lot. Start you conversation by letting them teach. Then, use their perceptions to form your discussion.

3. Provide facts, not editorials.

After asking them what they've heard, work together to discover credible facts. Then give them space to ct the dots for themselves. Instead of controlling their thinking, ask questions that help them pieces of information.

4. Use age-appropriate words and examples.

Consider your children's character, education, and interests. Start with personal experiences then widen to social issues. For example, with younger children, instead of asking, "What do you think about violent protests?" begin by asking, "What do you do when you're ignored?"

5. Let them ask questions.

The point of these conversations is not for you to teach your children but to create an environment where everyone learns. Make inquiry a two-way street. And remember one of the best answers of all: "I don't know, let's learn together!"

6. Curate content.

Show your children enough information to incite critical questions but not so much that it overwhelms them. Monitor how much your children can handle. Deliver enough to spark compassion but not so much that

7. Be proactive.

Talk to you kids about race often, even when there aren't moments of grave racial injustice. Regularly consume media about race so your children have a broad vocabulary regarding these issues so they are more eloquent when it comes time to process traumatic events.

8. Show your work.

As your children struggle to improve their understanding of race, foreground your own difficulties. Foreground the mistakes, failures, and errors you've made and highlight the shortcomings you still have. Doing so will encourage your children to improve.

American society tells children the world is just. Prepare them for injustice by creating a family mission statement that prepares them to anticipate unfairness and obligates them to fight for equity

10. Repeat.

No garden thrives when weeded once. No conversation worth having ever ends. Impress on your children that we must keep returning to these deep discussions. Emphasize that creating a just society is a

ALAN MADER FUNDS DISTRIBUTION

The Church Council, acting on recommendation of the Finance & Stewardship Ministry Team, voted at their October 20 meeting to allocate some of the funds received from the Alan Mader Estate. This past summer we received \$125,000 as a partial distribution from that estate, and after some deliberation and discernment, have decided to allocate some of those funds to the following CUCC Designated Funds:

- \$10,000 to establish a Transportation Fund (see separate article)
- \$30,000 to the Building & Grounds Fund, to provide a cushion for anticipated Major Repairs that we know are in our future (specifically replacement of our 17 HVAC units that are all 21 years old)
- \$50,000 to the CUCC Scholarship Fund, to maintain its viability into the future, providing scholarships to CUCC students continuing their education (we had two recipients this year, and anticipate 6-7 recipients each year in years to come; each recipient receives \$1000)

The Church Council will be deciding how to allocate the remaining funds once the estate is settled. Through these Designated Funds, the legacy of Alan Mader lives on in many great ministries. If you are not familiar with the CUCC Designated Funds, email the Church office for a copy, or pick one up at church. These funds are a great way to leave a lasting legacy that will enable ministry opportunities for generations to come!

STEWARDSHIP MOMENT- FROM THE FINANCE & STEWARDSHIP MINISTRY TEAM

The following report was given by Sue Ann Schaefer in worship on October 11:

Good morning! My name is Sue Ann Schafer, and I am your Church Council Treasurer. I am also a member of the Finance and Stewardship Ministry Team, and over the next several Sundays, we are going to be highlighting several of the ways your faithful stewardship is impacting the lives and ministries of our congregation.

Today we are going to look at the 50 for 50 fundraising campaign.

Last year, in recognition of the 50th anniversary of this building, we introduced a campaign we called "50 for 50." The goal was to raise \$50,000 for upgrades to our facility, in honor of the 50th anniversary. The campaign started last September and ended in November, and in six weeks, we blew that goal out of the water! *We raised over \$66,000, 130% of our goal!*


The funds were to be used for five specific projects: to enhance the sound and lighting in the Sanctuary, to cover the exterior eaves surrounding the Sanctuary, to enhance the beauty of our grounds through professional landscaping, to upgrade our current security system, and to fix the floor of the Shelter House. We also committed to practicing good Stewardship of our resources by giving away a Biblical Tithe — 10% of whatever we raised- to ministry agencies we have historically supported.

Well, I am here to tell you- GOOD JOB, COLUMBIA UCC!

Thanks to you, this year, this work is being completed. Check out these pictures!

- Our beautiful landscaping is done! After receiving four bids, we contracted with Mill Creek Landscaping to enhance the beauty of our church through landscaping work. I hope you agree, it looks beautiful!
- Our sound technology is done! Thanks to Jason Schoeneberg and Mike Pierson who are remodeling the sound booth, we have a great new sound system for our Sanctuary. We received bids from three companies, and settled on the bid from Nelson Audio to install our equipment. There is more equipment to come to enhance our livestreaming feed, and more lighting improvements to be done later, but the sound is fantastic, don't you agree?
- In keeping with the Biblical model of tithing, we divided \$6,600 among these four agencies that we have historically supported: Emmaus Homes, Eden Seminary, ECH, and Camp MoVal. They were all grateful for our support.
- We also completed our eaves project, enclosing the eaves under the Sanctuary exterior to protect our facility from the elements.
- We are not done yet! We have three bids for upgrading our security system to consider at our November Council meeting, and we anticipate having three bids for the floor of the Shelter House to consider, as well. We hope to have these projects all completed by the end of 2020.

This campaign was a huge success thanks to your faithful stewardship. You are all a blessing, and we thank you for your support! However, I would be remiss if I did not mention that Joyful Giving for 2020 has significantly decreased. At this point, after September finances are closed, we need to take in a total of \$134,000 by the end of the year in order to meet our budget. That is three months, or an average of \$45,000 per

This funding (and the generous online contributions of individuals) allows CPS to make sure all children have the things they need to learn in this difficult new environment. CUCC donated \$5,000 from our 2020 Special Mission Project budget to CoMo Helps.

Other recent grants were awarded to Phoenix House for rent assistance for its outpatient clients and to the Columbia Homeless Outreach Team to provide survival essentials like tents, sleeping bags, etc. to homeless people facing fall and winter outdoors. Thank you for your generosity in supporting these essential needs.

VAC CHRISTMAS DRIVE—THE NEEDS ARE GREATER THAN EVER!

At Christmas time we share our joy in Christ's birth and our love for family and friends. This year is going to be a little different for many of us. But it's going to be a real challenge for those who have been ill, lost jobs or had their hours cut, struggled to put food on their tables, been unable to pay their utility bills, and gone without health care and the services their children normally receive at school.

WEST COAST FIRE EVACUATIONS TAKE TOLL ON UCC CHURCHES, CAMPS

As wind-whipped wildfires continue to take lives and destroy forests, homes, and businesses on the West Coast of the United States, United Church of Christ congregations are in stages ranging from evacuation to recovery to post-traumatic stress syndrome.

In the two hardest-hit UCC Conferences – <u>Central Pacific</u> and <u>Northern California-Nevada</u> – several congregations and church camps await word on the fate of their buildings. Others, evacuated days or weeks ago, are ministering to families and communities that escaped damage or are returning to inspect it. Daytime skies range from smoky gray to eerie orange to black as night.

"It feels like the whole coast is on fire," said Pastor Kimberly Williams of <u>Grace Community UCC</u> in North Fork, Calif., which got evacuation orders on September 6, her first official Sunday as pastor. In affected areas, "it's terrifying," she said. "Everybody is looking out their windows with this look of horror, but then realizing, OK, this is the reality, we've got to keep on going." Amid it all, pastors say they value how colleagues are checking in on each other, offering mutual support, advice and prayer – a response borne of years of relationship-building within each Conference.

At this writing, Oregon faces the most continuing damage and danger to population centers, with 10 deaths and 22 missing persons reported statewide as of Monday, September 13. "Right now, we're in the shock-and-awe phase," said the Rev. Tyler Connoley, Conference minister in Central Pacific. "Lots of members displaced. A few have lost homes, but no injuries that I've heard about. A couple churches and our camp are still in danger, but so far untouched."

Southern Oregon has been especially hard hit. There, fast-moving flames ravaged 3,200 acres and several communities September 7, killing two people and destroying some 600 homes and 100 businesses, many in the small towns of Talent and Phoenix, between Ashland and Medford, where two UCC congregations are aiding relief efforts. "One chaplain in Medford lost his home, and our pastor in Medford was in a neighborhood that burned, but thinks from some photos she saw on the internet that her house is still standing," Connoley said.

In a message to the Central Pacific Conference, Connoley responded to questions about where to send donations: "Remember that the UCC responds to a natural or human-made disaster once every three days through our Disaster Ministries and One Great Hour of Sharing," Connoley told the Conference. "Those systems are in place because of the money you gave in the past to prepare for just such a time as this." UCC Disaster Ministries is monitoring the situation and has set up a 2020 Wildfires relief fund, found here.

NURTURE & EDUCATION PLANS WITH COVID-19 PRECAUTIONS

SUNDAY SCHOOL:

- Teachers and all youth over age 10 will be required to wear masks.
- We will move classes outdoors as much as possible.
- Classrooms will be assigned as they have been typically in the past:

Preschool-Kindergarten Room 205
1st thru 4th Grade Room 204
5th thru 8th Grade Room 206
High School Room 100

- The Adult Class will meet in the Fellowship Hall and practice social distancing.
- Each Classroom will be supplied with cleaning materials and hand sanitizer.
- Children will use hand sanitizer as they arrive and before they leave.
- Teachers will thoroughly sanitize their classroom each Sunday following class.
- Classrooms will be locked after class and not used until the following Sunday, or if they are used during the week, they will be sanitized after.
- Classrooms will receive additional sanitizing each Thursday morning from our contracted cleaning service
- Prepackaged snacks only will be distributed, purchased by the Nurture & Education Ministry Team, with special consideration for allergies.

NURSERY: (Room 203)

- The Nursery will be locked until 10:00am, when the nursery attendant arrives. The nursery may NOT be utilized by church members prior to 10:00.
- The Nursery will have a 6-child maximum capacity. If there are more than 6 children, the Adult Volunteer for that Sunday will bring some of the children into the Preschool Sunday School classroom; this room will also have a maximum of 6 children.
- Parents will be required to sign their children into the nursery, acknowledging that their child is in good health. Parents will be required to list their cell number, as well.
- Nursery staff (Amanda Dwyer & Samantha Forward) will sanitize the nursery each Sunday following use, along with the Preschool classroom, if used.
- The Nursery will be locked following use.
- The Nursery will receive additional sanitizing each Thursday morning from our contracted cleaning service.

CORONAVIRUS AND CUCC REOPENING UPDATE

After a spike in Coronavirus cases on September 5, Boone County has seen a significant decline in new cases through the end of September. We have gone from a 5-day average of 143 new daily cases on September 5 to a 5-day average of 38 new daily cases on October 20. Vigilant attention to the safety protocols enacted by the Columbia City Council have paid off, and our strict observation of these protocols at CUCC are part of that action.

CUCC continues to maintain in-person worship with an option of online worship at the choice of each congregation member. We have implemented standards to create a very safe worship space, maintaining social distancing and practicing safety protocols (including mask wearing). This reopening has gone very well, and church members should be commended for their attention to these safety protocols. We will continue these procedures into the fall, but we also will be watching the numbers closely and will revisit our plan and adjust as necessary.

Moving forward, we want to remind people of a few safety measures:

- Please continue to practice social distancing in the Sanctuary and in other areas of the church.
- Please do not sit in "blue taped" chairs in the Sanctuary.
- Please keep at least two (or three) chairs between your family and the next family in the Sanctuary.
- Please continue to wear masks at all times in the church building (unless eating) and observe social distancing.
- Please do not "visit" with one another in the Sanctuary after Amy starts playing! This is a time for quiet meditation and reflection, not "visiting" (and sharing germs). The Gathering Space, Fellowship Hall or outdoor areas allow more opportunities to visit while practicing social distancing.

CUCC IS WORKING IN ISRAEL/PALESTINE

Gaza has approximately 2 million residents, 75% of which are Palestinian refugees. Amidst difficult realities, including the ongoing Israeli blockade of the Gaza Strip, Global Ministries partners continue to work to provide services for the people of Gaza. Run by Global Ministries Partner the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem, Al-Ahli Hospital provides health care services to refugees and residents there. It has responded to the emergency needs of the people. Resource shortages, increased patient load, patients unable to pay for services, and disruptions in utilities and services are ongoing challenges for hospitals in Gaza. The inhabitants of Gaza continue to experience severe hardships, deprivation, and violence creating even more challenges. While these are daunting, the services Al-Ahli Hospital provides to the community are making a significant impact.

Al-Ahli Hospital is a mission partner of Columbia United Church of Christ through Global Ministries, our shared mission agency with the Christian Church/Disciples of Christ. Global Ministries provides foundational support for this organization and support for their ongoing efforts. Please keep Global Ministries and Al-Ahli Hospital in your prayers!
