

"The Lord's Prayer"

During the month of July, we will be looking at various ways Jesus encouraged his disciples to encourage his disciples to focus on God and put the ways of the world behind them. On July 7, we will look at the ways the early church leaders were called, by Jesus and then by Paul, to sow seeds of Peace in contrast to the war-like ways of the world. On July 14, Jesus tells a parable encouraging a lawyer to defy the law and instead love his neighbor, no matter who that neighbor is. On July 21, we will look at Jesus' interaction with Mary and Martha and his challenge to focus on what truly matters in life.

Then, on July 28, we will hear Jesus instruct his disciples on how to pray. He introduces them, in Luke 11 and Matthew 6, to the prayer that we now call the Lord's Prayer. In this section, Jesus is not fixated on words, he is focusing on instructing his disciples in a way to develop a relationship with God, communicating with God, not for God's sake, but for the sake of the community. This prayer is an exercise in community development among the early disciples, as well as an exercise in communal development with God.

Many do not realize that this prayer has a very Jewish structure. It consists of an introduction, seven petitions and a Doxology ("for thine is the...) although the doxology is not in Luke's Gospel and was added to Matthew's Gospel at a later date. The introduction and seven petitions have several parallels in the books of Ezekiel, Isaiah, Obadiah, 1 Samuel and Proverbs; as well as reflection in several Jewish prayers and the Kaddish. So, while the instruction to pray was an important wisdom lesson, the structure of the prayer was not original; it had its basis in Jewish tradition.

Over the years, translations and adaptations of the prayer have brought new life and insight into communities around the world. Adapting "sins" into "debts" or "trespasses," adding on the ending doxology ("for thine is the…"), and eliminating masculine references ("Father" becomes "Creator") or defunct language (changing "thine" to "Your" and "which" to "who") are all ways communities of faith have made this exercise in community and communion applicable to their context while still reflective of communal traditions.

The Lord's Prayer is a tool to get closer to God, not a god itself. As a tool that Jesus advocated, it will always change and adapt to the context in which it is used, even as it is reflective of the traditions that inspired it. What matters is not the words, but the WORD; the Wisdom that Jesus shared about communing with God in ways that are authentic and attuned to God's ever-present love. Be here in church on July 28 when we talk more about the Lord's Prayer and examine the Wisdom we receive when we pray.

The primary purpose of the Memorial Education Fund is to encourage theological or Christian education in the United Church of Christ. The fund is to provide financial aid in the form of grants to any woman or man in the congregation who is preparing for ordained ministry or other religious vocations. Persons are to be (1) encouraged by the church to pursue their religious educational goals, and (2) will be assisted financially as funds will allow.

Funds may secondarily be used to support youth and college groups within the church and to support the education and training of teachers and leaders of Christian Education within the church as the committee shall determine on a case by case basis.

Over the past 44 years the fund has

- 1) provided support to five seminary students,
- 2) funded church school training,
- 3) supported 35 campers, funded the purchase of Bibles for the Sunday School students,
- 4) funded the Youth Leader's attendance of the National Youth Event.

General Synod 32

As I am writing this, the General Synod 32 is in its final day. It has been an exciting and exhausting event; full of life and energy and most importantly, the Holy Spirit. In everything that is said and done, in the presentations, the business, and even in the display space, God's Holy Spirit is very evident; and the gathered delegates, visitors and presenters are visible embodiment of that Spirit in action.

General Synod, the biennial national gathering of the United Church of Christ, is a five-day event; Friday-Tuesday. Many people think of General Synod as "all about business" but the truth is that the essence of the event is so much more. The inspiration and education that Synod visitors experience far outweighs the business that is conducted. This year was no exception.

But we did participate in many business sessions. We re-elected Rev. Dr. John Dorhauer as the General Minister and President of the denomination for a second 4-year term. We also elected Rev. Dr. Karen Georgia Thompson to a four-year term as an Associate General Minister. We elected members to the Board of Directors, approved a budget, and said farewell to retiring church leaders including Rev. Jim Moos, who led Global Ministries for the past eight years and Don Hart, who was the President of United Church Funds.

And then there were the Resolutions. There were 22 Resolutions in all, brought to General Synod by interested parties in the church such as Congregations, Associations and Conferences. The scope of the Resolutions dealt with issues such as affirming our relationship with our counterpart churches in Puerto Rico, restructuring of the New England conferences, revising the United Church of Christ by-laws to include nonbinary gender language, speaking out against our national escalation toward nuclear war, declaring support of the "New Green Deal" and affirming the intersectionality of climate change issues with all other justice issues, and focusing on Jesus' call to "follow me." (All of these Resolutions can be viewed using the link on our CUCC website.) Each one of these Resolutions was debated passionately, theologically and faithfully. As the delegates debated, God's Spirit was ever present; challenging and inspiring each one.

General Synod 32 is over; but you will be hearing much more in the next two years about General Synod 33. It will be in Kansas City July 16-20, 2021. I am on the planning team; and we will be looking for volunteer helpers. This will be your chance to participate in this Spirit-filled adventure! If you ever doubted God's presence at work in the world, come to General Synod; God's presence is very evident in the life of the United Church of Christ.

WHY CELEBRATE INDEPENDENCE DAY? By Rev. Rick Oberle

To begin with, this holiday is not "The Fourth of July," it is "Independence Day." Renaming it the former can cause us to forget about the latter, the meaning behind this celebration. This is a celebration of freedom, independence and the birth of a new nation based on liberty for all, and the term "Fourth of July" is not comprehensive of this understanding.

But why do we continue to celebrate this day, 241 years after we declared our independence from the systemic oppression of England?

The reality is that most of our ancestors were not here in 1776. Those of us with German Heritage can probably trace our migration to this country to the great German immigration of 1820-1870; other ethnic groups (Irish, Asian, African etc.) to other time periods probably not coinciding with the colonial era. Yet on July 4 each year, we come together as one, celebrating Independence Day with barbeques and fireworks. Most of our ancestors were not among those freed from British tyranny; yet we, as immigrants, have adopted this passion as our own, which is a fine and wonderful thing to do. But in doing so, it is important to reflect on why this day came to be such a celebration.

Think about the people who celebrated the first Independence Day in Philadelphia on July 4, 1777 (the one-year anniversary of the US Declaration of Independence). They were at war with a great empire; tired, worried, unsure of their future, with a history of systemic oppression still in active memory; and in truth, still pervasive in their lives. This day held great importance to them as it became a chance to claim their self-value, claim their identity as a new nation, and remember their historic struggles. For a community that had been (and continued to be) oppressed and disenfranchised by the majority, Independence Day was a chance to reclaim their lost sense of dignity.

Times have changed, and that rag-tag group has become arguably the most powerful country in the world, truly a superpower. But as we celebrate Independence Day, we must not forget from whence "we" came. As other historically oppressed groups struggle to claim their self-value, identity and dignity and remember their historic struggles through significant observances and focused holidays, just as our ancestors did, the faith of our ancestors and the spirit of Independence Day is embodied in their observances, as well.

Have a safe and Happy Independence Day; and keep the Independence Day spirit of self-value, identity, dignity, and historic struggle alive as we enable all of God's children to claim their God-given dignity and worth.

This promises to be a lifechanging adventure for the youth who are attending, learning more about God's call to service and Inclusion in the world. You will hear more about this trip when the youth return, as they present opportunities in worship and outside of worship for you to learn more about this mission and this trip.

In 2008 a dedicated group of parents and professionals came together to fulfill a dream of providing enriching day services for their adult children with autism. Hiram Farm program opened in June of 2009 on a 120-acre organic farm under lease. Six adult workers with autism were served by the program at that time. In the first year, a one-acre organic garden was

planted, twelve small garden plots were made available to gardeners living in the Hiram community, the livestock program began, and a small greenhouse was constructed.

By our second anniversary in June 2011, the program expanded to include 22 adults with autism. Construction work on the barn continued and the farm purchased a house adjacent to the existing property to serve as the administrative offices and program space. Meanwhile, our community garden project doubled in size and the Hiram Farm participants and staff developed a number of craft projects and grew seedling plants to sell to the public.

Over the years, our facilities expanded and we began to welcome adults with other developmental disabilities, in addition to autism, into our programs. In 2017, we welcomed our 31st individual.
