From the Pastor's Keyboard

"COVID and Ash Wednesday"

Well after two years of pandemic, I finally got it—on Saturday, February 12, I tested positive for COVID-19. I had no symptoms at the time, and I never did develop symptoms. Had I not gotten tested, I never would have known that I had COVID. Kim and I were preparing to travel, and my test was a mandatory pre-flight COVID test. As you may imagine, we did not fly the next day as planned.

Kim wound up testing positive as well, and her only symptom was a mild cough. We both observed quarantine for five days, time to read and reflect; and emerged from quarantine feeling fine. But Kim and I both were vaccinated, and we both received our vaccine booster (and we will every year). I have known several who have not been vaccinated and had much more severe reactions to the virus. To me, this illustrates the importance of getting vaccinated. Not only is it our civic duty, to get this virus under control once and for all, it is also for our own good. Getting vaccinated is the key not only to beating this virus, but to surviving it.

I recently read an analogy that I feel is most apt. The COVID vaccine was equated to a bullet proof vest that a police officer or first responder might wear. A bullet proof vest is not going to keep a person from getting shot, but it has a good chance of keeping them from getting killed. Our COVID vaccines did not keep us from getting COVID, but they did keep us from severe, perhaps fatal, consequences.

The COVID pandemic is just about over. We are entering a managed phase of living with the COVID virus; but in order to live with the virus, we must observe sensible protocols. Part of those protocols will be getting booster vaccines every fall, along with our flu vaccine. Part of those protocols will be masking when cases rise. Part of those protocols will be quarantining when we do get the virus. But ignoring it will not bring this managed phase about. Facing the limitations of our relationship with COVID will allow us all to live more harmoniously.


In some ways, this is part of the lesson of Ash Wednesday. On Ash Wednesday we are confronted with our own limitations, and our own mortality. We put ashes on our forehead and say, "from dust we come, and to dust we shall return." That is a powerful statement; and it is kind of frightening. But it is the reality of our existence. We don't often want to face it, but our existence here on earth is finite. God created us for a limited lifespan and when that span is over, we will be gone. We are not eternal, and nothing we do will last forever.

But while we are here, we are called to live purposefully. As Yusef Salaam said, "We were born on purpose and for a purpose." God Created us intentionally and God has intention for our lives. This is what Ash Wednesday is about, this is what the COVID vaccine is about. We are finite; but our call as finite beings is to live that finite time with purpose as best we can. Take advantage of things that will keep you healthy, physically and mentally. Eat well. Exercise. Pray. Meditate. Get vaccinated. Live the finite life God has given you with purpose, on purpose; a purpose that is aligned with God.

We will celebrate Ash Wednesday here at CUCC on Wednesday, March 2 with a worship service at 7:00pm. At that service we will have the traditional imposition of ashes. Those who wish to can come forward and receive ashes from me on their forehead or on their hand and I will remind them that we are created from dust, and to dust we shall return. I hope you will join us for this somber but important service.

Ash Wednesday is also the beginning of Lent; the 40-day time period where we walk intentionally with Jesus to Jerusalem and the crucifixion. During Lent, we will be looking at ways Jesus calls us to "change the world" by being true to the Good News message Jesus brings us. Many Christians choose, during Lent to take up new practices; intentional practices to bring them closer to Jesus. Some focus on Bible Study, some on meditation, some on just faithfully coming to worship. What will you do to follow Jesus more closely this Lent? See you in church!

The Church Council met on Tuesday, February 15, 2022. Those present in person were Kristy Odneal, Kurt Heine, John Bullerd, Lorry Dreier, Keith Birkes, Tricia Price, Linda Neale, Sue Ann Schaefer, and Audrey Lasley. Pastor Rick joined the meeting by Zoom.

- Keith Birkes led discussion on the first chapter of the book, Neighborhood Church.
- Empty spots were filled for Council Steward duties for the rest of February and part of March.
- No new update on the chancel lighting in the sanctuary.
- Still waiting for Tiger Security to install parts on the south basement door.
- The sealing for the driveway is done and rest of parking lot will be finished in the Spring/Summer.
- COVID-numbers are going down! Masks are still available to those who wish to wear one.
- A Sabbatical committee of 5 members is being formed.
- Still in the process of creating a policy to address virtual voting at Congregational meetings.

INCLUSION AND AFFIRMATION MINISTRY

We just completed our observance of Black History month and now transition into Women's History month. As Pastor Rick mentioned in his February Communicator note, some people wonder why we observe these particular months. There are some stats below that demonstrate why:

- There are 100 US Senators: 0 Black Women, 24 White Women meaning that women have only 24% representation in that body. (There are only 3 Black Men in the Senate.)
- There are 435 House of Representatives: 26 Black women, 125 White Women making that representation 35%. (There are only 34 Black Men in the House.)
- Current Supreme Court: 0 Black Women, 1 Black Man, 1 Hispanic Woman, 5 White Men and 2 White women.
- Just over 50% of the total US population is female, yet they are hugely underrepresented in the USA Branches of Government as are African Americans.

The lack of representation in government isn't the only issue:

The actress Geena Davis was watching cartoons with her 2-year-old daughter. She immediately noted that female characters were very few to none-at-all in that programing. She spoke to multiple studio heads (all of them men), regarding lack of female representation in all programing. Every one of them said, "Oh that used to be a problem, but we fixed it." In other words, they really didn't listen.

Ms. Davis decided to take matters into her own hands. She created the "Geena Davis Institute on Gender in Media." For 2 years the institute personnel meticulously collected data specifically on children's programing. This is what they found:

- 72% of speaking parts were male
- 4 out of 5 narrators were male
- Overall, in 2017, only 17% of characters were female

(Think about this: name characters from Sesame Street.... Burt, Ernie, Big Bird, The Count, Grover, Animal, the cook, the scientist and his side kick Beaker, Kermit. All are male except, of course, Miss Piggy.)

Why does this matter? 80% of all programing in the world is created in the US. The numbers above give the perception, subliminally to both boys and girls, that females are inconsequential, uninteresting, unimportant and that they their existence is to orbit around the male characters, if females are there at all.

Ms. Davis has created a mantra for her study on gender bias in children/youth media: "If she can see it, she can be it." There are multiple examples of that being true – one came after the 2012 movies "Brave" and "The Hunger Games" were released. Both of these films happened to show women archers. After their release, there was a 105% increase in girls and women taking up the sport.

Another example can be seen on the TV screen. It is called, "The CSI Effect." After seeing a woman as a crime scene scientist/pathologist, there was an increase in women going into that field. Now, in real life, 50% of individuals in that field are women.

WORSHIP AND MUSIC MINISTRY TEAL

For Women's History Month I would like to honor some of the women that helped make me into the musician I am today.

Of course, my mom, Vanessa Brown, has been there every step of the way aside from being my biggest supporter, she was my chauffer to rehearsals and concerts, and made sure I had a wide range of cultural experiences.

The Minister of Music at the church where I grew up, Regina Taylor-Sligh, saw something special in me and asked me to direct the youth choir. It was during that time I cultivated my skills as a choir director, learned to sing and teach each part by rote, and improved my gospel singing.

The beginning of my classical training was with Josephine Poelinitz, who was the Director of the All-City Elementary Youth Chorus. My brother was in the choir, and I went with him to rehearsal. Worship & Music Notes

At the February Council meeting, the Church Council approved hiring two section leaders for the Celebration Singers for a three month time period. This has been a request from both our former and current Music Coordinator/Choir Director to provide leadership in a couple of the sections of the choir as it is being successfully implemented in several other churches across Columbia. Pay for the positions will be \$30/ session (rehearsal, worship); \$60/week. \$1560 (maximum) was allocated for this for the term (\$120/week x 13 weeks) from the Worship & Music Designated Fund. The integrity and professional discernment the Council (and we hope, the Congregation) is seeing in our current Music Coordinator, Brandon Brown, was a factor in their decision to go ahead with this plan. Council is looking at this as a "new idea" that they want to try for a period and see how it works; and if they like the results, look for ways to make it happen again this fall. If this program is successful this semester, they will bring it to the Congregational Meeting on May 15 for the Congregation's approval.

Phase two of the update to the sanctuary technology will begin this spring. New lighting will be installed to

better illuminate the chancel, organ, and bell choir areas. These areas have long been the least lit areas when they naturally should be the brightest areas. The addition of these lights will also improve the picture quality in our streaming, allowing the cameras to zoom in closer without the image getting "grainy." These lights will be similar to theatrical lighting and be suspended from the ceiling on two sides of the center aisle.

Phase three of the update to the sanctuary including carpet, windows, window coverings, other flooring, handrails, etc. is still in the works.

FINANCE AND STEWARDSHIP MINISTRY TEAM

WHAT IS A QCD AND AM I ELIGIBLE?

Are you over age 70 ½ and have an IRA or Inherited IRA? If so, you have another option available to contribute to Joyful Giving at CUCC. This is called a Qualified Charitable Distribution or QCD.

Certain IRA holders have the opportunity to make tax-free distributions from their IRAs to qualified charitable organizations. For tax-free eligibility, the Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) must be sent directly from the IRA payable to the receiving qualified non-profit organization.

Eligibility and Donation Limit:

Although the SECURE Act raised the required minimum distribution age to 72, IRA holders can continue to make QCDs at age 70 1/2. In addition, beneficiaries of inherited IRAs who meet the age requirement can also take advantage of QCDs. For those who qualify, the maximum IRA charitable distribution is limited to \$100,000 per individual per tax year.

Benefits of a QCD:

If a taxpayer makes the donation as prescribed by the IRS, then the distribution will be excluded from gross income and counts toward the taxpayer's \$100,000 exclusion limitation for the year the

distribution occurs, and the taxpayer's required minimum distribution (RMD) for the current year. With the increase in the standard deduction for 2022 to \$28,700 for married filing jointly age 65 or older and \$14,700 for single filers age 65 or older, more Americans will be using the standard deduction rather than itemizing deductions on their tax returns. Please consult your accountant or tax professional for tax-related advice.

BIG MOVES ARE AFOOT AT RONALD MCDONALD HOUSE

(condensed from a letter to CUCC by Terri Gray, Executive Director of COMO Ronald McDonald House)

House Charities® Mid-Missouri

As you may be aware, MU Healthcare made the decision to move Children's Hospital from Keene Street back to their main medical campus. While we understand their need to consolidate facilities, we firmly believe families should be within steps, not miles, of where their child is receiving treatment. Because of this, our Board of Directors has made the decision to sell the existing RMD facility and construct a NEW Ronald McDonald House close to where the new Children's Hospital Tower will be located.

We have a buyer for our current facility! St. Raymond's Society will take ownership of the house in early 2023. We are working with MU Healthcare to secure a temporary location to serve families until construction of our NEW Ronald McDonald House is complete.

Based on current construction estimates, less net proceeds from the sale of our existing facility, we will launching a campaign to raise an additional \$4 million for the NEW Ronald McDonald House. Located on the northeast corner of College Ave. and Stadium Blvd., the 27,000 square foot home will include 24 bedrooms, more communal areas, private spaces to relax and ample outdoor living space. The new facility will have six more bedrooms than our current house and will increase our space by 9000 square feet. This will allow us to serve more of our community in need. Plan now to participate in our "Building Love, Expanding Hope" campaign to raise the funds needed for this NEW Ronald McDonald House.

Families come to Ronald McDonald House in search of a place to stay within steps of their child receiving critical medical treatment. The Ronald McDonald House keeps families together near the care they need and that gives them hope—hope for a positive recovery, for seeing their child smile again, and for taking their child home. This move and expansion will allow us to serve more families and keep them close to their hospitalized children.

We will keep you posted on our progress; and you can keep track of what is new with our mission by visiting our website (rmhcmidmo.org). Please consider becoming a member of our RED SHOE SOCIETY. For only \$65/ year, you can support Ronald McDonald House and receive regular news and updates about our work.

(Note from Pastor Rick: Ronald McDonald House in Columbia is a private, not-for-profit agency that is partners with the McDonalds Corporation, but is not owned or operated by them. They receive philanthropic support from McDonalds <u>franchisees</u> in this market and from donations made at the counter in McDonalds restaurants; but that only accounts for around 20% of their income. The rest of their annual income comes from fundraising events, such as pull tab collections, dinners, and from private donations and grants. Some people believe that RMD House is fully funded by McDonalds—it is not. 80% of their operating budget comes from sources other than McDonalds. They are truly a community organization!)




We are temporarily combining Preschool through 5th grade Sunday School classes and Middle School and High School Classes until attendance picks up again. There will be two teachers for each combined class.

WHAT IS CHRISTIAN NATIONALISM?

AND MORE IMPORTANTLY—WHY SHOULD WE WORRY ABOUT IT?

On January 6, 2021, people around the world were shocked to see a display of cowardice cloaked in the American Flag as insurgents tried to overthrow democracy and assassinate elected leaders of our country. While this was shocking in itself, perhaps more shocking was the presence of Christian symbolism among the terrorists, claiming that their actions were in God's name and divinely authorized. One stance of note was the placards that proclaimed "Jesus 2020" as if the Messiah was a candidate to be elected and who would govern our nation.

Other evidence of Christian Nationalism in our culture are movements to insist that children pray in school in ways that are choreographed by Christian Fundamentalists; movements to insist that courthouses display religious iconography such as the Ten Commandments; and movements to insist that the government declare the US a "Christian Nation." These movements are perversions of Christianity, an attempt to force one particular understanding of faith (Fundamentalist Christianity) on everyone, using the Christ as a weapon.

The danger of Christian Nationalism is not only the damage it is doing to our country, but the damage it is doing to our faith. Emerging generations see the extremist views of Christian Nationalism and define Christianity by these expressions; this causes them to reject Christianity outright. If this is how Christians behave, emerging generations want no part of it. Join me (Pastor Rick) for four Sundays in March as we examine how Christians should react to Christian Nationalism. Churches of the Missouri Mid-South Conference have travelled to Chiapas four times in the past six years, working alongside the Institute for Intercultural Studies and Research, one of our Global Ministries Mission partners in Chiapas. We have worked alongside them in towns and villages, learning about the people of Chiapas and the ways of life in the communities of Chiapas. We have also helped construct a new facility on the grounds at The Institute, a facility that has more than tripled their institutional capacity and ability to do ministry with the people of their communities.

<u>The Institute</u> is not the only Global Ministries Mission partner in Chiapas. On our last trip, we had the opportunity to work with another one of our Mission Partners, <u>Melel Xojobal</u>, an agency that works solely with children in need. <u>Melel Xojobal</u> means "True Light" in the indigenous Tzotzil language, and they focus on being a light of hope for children whose only other alternative is the dark of hopelessness.

The work of Melel Xojobal can be broken into three areas: early childhood work, support and advocacy for the rights of child workers, and work with young people. Melel Xojobal's early childhood work focuses on girls and boys from 0 to 4 years old. Melel Xojobal works with children and their parents to address topics such as nutritional, physical, and social skills. Their work with child workers seeks to defend the rights of indigenous children who work in the streets, markets, and public areas of the city. Melel Xojobal seeks to see the children's working conditions improved through self-care strategies and risk reduction. Melel Xojobal also works with young people ages 13 to 18 to encourage and promote healthy lifestyles and self-protection strategies that revolve around prevention of substance abuse, as well as finding dignified work.

Our next "Mission Trip" to Chiapas will be summer, 2022! We will leave St. Louis on July 8 and return on July 15. While we are in Chiapas, we will spend most of our time in the city of San Cristobal, working with The Institute and Melel Xojobal. We will have the opportunity to see several indigenous museums, including the Chocolate Museum, and immerse ourselves in the culture of Chiapas. We will spend time in the marketplaces, and worship at an indigenous church. We will learn about the life and context of the Indigenous Mayan communities that make up Chiapas, and we will even do some work; but work is not the focus of the trip. Education and relationship is the focus. The work will be suited for all abilities; all are welcome to come along, from age 16 up to age 90+! (Due to the nature of the trip, we are not encouraging anyone under 16 to participate.)

The cost for this trip is \$1450. This includes airfare, lodging for 7 days and 6 nights, food for that timeframe, transportation to and from the airport in Tuxtla Gutierrez and other transportation, and other incidentals. All expenses are included in that price, except souvenirs you may wish to buy. For a week long mission trip, it is very economical. Everyone who participates must be able to show proof of COVID vaccination, and have a current passport. We may have to take a COVID test before returning home, as well.

There is a limit of ten people for this trip – so make your commitment early! Due to transportation issues, we cannot have more than this number. If you would like to go, talk to Pastor Rick. He has packets with detailed information and registration materials. Registrations must be turned in by March 1. We will be purchasing tickets at that time, so get yours in early! Registration will include the completed registration form, a copy of your passport, and a copy of your COVID vaccination card.

This will be an amazing, life-changing experience! Make plans now to come along!

The Hong Kong Christian Council (HKCC) is the ecumenical body of Christian churches, organizations and institutions in Hong Kong. While most social services were suspended during the COVID-19 pandemic, HKCC and its service unit, Hong Kong Christian Service

CUCC IS WORKING IN MEXICO

The Round Table for Mission Development in Mexico, a Global Ministries partner, consists of three UCC/DOC partner congregations united in service. Since 2006, the Round Table has been a space for the three churches to do God's mission and live out God's reconciliation in a united way within the volatile context of Mexican churches and society.

Projects that the Round Table for Mission Development in Mexico have developed include projects by women of the three member churches. These projects are micro-credit efforts through which women take out loans at a low interest rate for family income-generation projects. Then, they pay back the loans from the proceeds of their project in order to benefit additional women with loans.

One project included a couple who has purchased 32 goats with a loan provided by the project. From these goats they will sell the goat's milk and meat as they reproduce. Another micro-credit project is of pig-raising. Pastor Claudia and her husband have adult and baby pigs. They will keep some to reproduce and others will be sold for

meat. Another project involves Karen and her husband. They purchased 15 sheep that were expecting and 20 young males. They are fattening the sheep and selling the lambs for meat. Other micro-credit projects include a woman who sells items at a bazaar, two women who cook and sell food from their home, and another woman who makes tamales using the church's kitchen and sells them.

Looking towards the future, The Round Table hopes to increase and develop its capacity for more projects and conferences, in order to enrich, empower, and sow solidarity between women and their communities around the world.
