From the Pastor's Keyboard

"Come Away, Rest Awhile"

"The apostles gathered around Jesus, and told him all that they had done and taught. He said to them, "Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while." For many were coming and going, and they had no leisure even to eat. They went away in the boat to a deserted place by themselves. (Mark 6:30-32)

Often in scripture, Jesus advocates a time of rest, a time of retreat, a time of personal reflection. In Mark 1:12, Jesus goes into the wilderness for 40 days to fast and reflect, communing with God and developing his faith, even though he is tempted by the Devil. In Mark 6:30 (referenced above) he encourages his disciples to take time out of their busy schedules, retreat with him and rest awhile. Mark 7:24 sees Jesus taking refuge in a house in Tyre, looking for a bit of rest. John 4:6 has Jesus resting by Jacob's well, "tired out by his journey." For Jesus, rest and retreat was an important part of faith development.

The season of Lent, which began on February 17 and continues through the entire month of March, is structured around this idea. Modeled after Jesus' 40 days in the wilderness, this season is designed to give us a chance to retreat from the hectic pace of our lives, to put aside the distractions that keep us from God, and at least recharge, if not actually rest (although one Lenten discipline should be allowing yourself time to rest). Reconnecting with God as Jesus did in his times of retreat and rest is paramount in our lives, and Lent is our committed time to do this.


One opportunity for rest and retreat provided by our Missouri Mid-South Conference over the years has been Camp MoVal. Camp MoVal has, since 1962, been a place where intentional outdoor ministry programming happens, and people from all over the world are invited to come and reconnect with God. Retreat, Rest, and Renewal have been thematic for Camp MoVal as campers and rental groups investigate where God is in the midst of their hectic lives and how God is calling them to be. Many people are "too busy" to avail themselves of this opportunity. That "busyness" the key challenge to living fulfilled Christian lives; the key challenge that MoVal addresses; the lesson of Lent. When we lead lives that are "busy," we forget about God. When we don't have time to rest and retreat, we don't have time for God.

Lent has already begun, but you still have the whole month of March. It is not too late to begin a Lenten discipline of un-busying your lives. Let go of the distractions that keep you from walking fully with Jesus. Spend time just being, without electronic devices to distract you. Sit on the deck with no agenda, with your I-pad inside the house. Go on retreat. Walk in the woods (without ear buds). You may not be able to spend 40 days "at camp" like Jesus did, but Lent does provide you with an excuse to "come away, rest awhile."

CUCC LIVESTREAMING-NEW EQUIPMENT UPDATE

Our new livestreaming equipment was installed December 1, and over the past two months, James Melton and Mike Pierson, along



with Brent Marcks, Pete Jaberg, and others have been honing their skills at using it.

Our two new cameras are controlled from the Technology Booth (formerly the Sound Booth) remotely to Zoom in on worship leaders. What was once a one person job in the old Sound Booth has quickly evolved into a three person job; one on sound, one on cameras, and one advancing slides.

If you are interested in learning how to operate this equipment, contact <u>Mike Pierson</u> or <u>James Melton</u>. They are putting together training videos and would love to do some personal training for interested parties. With the new process, it will be more important than ever to expand our pool of volunteers.

UPDATE: At the February Council meeting, the Church Council approved spending \$2349 for a third PTZ camera and a gradient microphone to pick up ambient sound in the Sanctuary, as well as wiring, connectors, and labor. This will make the livestreaming experience even better for those watching from afar! Stay tuned for an even better livestreaming experience!

Improved Home Heating Bill Assistance Through LIHEAP Energy Crisis Intervention Program

Governor Parson announced that the <u>Low-Income</u> <u>Home Energy Assistance Program</u> (LIHEAP) Energy Crisis Intervention Program will improve assistance offered to eligible low-income Missourians.

When a household's energy source has been shut off or is at risk of disconnection, the winter Energy Crisis Intervention Program (ECIP), which runs November through May, pays the minimum amount needed on the fuel bill to get the household out of crisis. Starting this winter, ECIP will pledge the maximum disconnect amount (up to \$800) toward an eligible participant's owed balance.

In FY2020, Missouri provided \$78.6 million in LIHEAP assistance to over 108,000 households. In addition to meeting the income criteria, low-income Missourians must also meet the following criteria to be eligible for winter heating assistance through LIHEAP:

- Be responsible for paying home heating costs,
- Have \$3,000 or less in bank accounts, retirement accounts, or investments, and
- Be a U.S. citizen or legally admitted for permanent residence.

NEW TRANSPORTATION FUND ESTABLISHED, READY FOR CONTRIBUTIONS

In 2021, the Finance and Stewardship Ministry Team will be working with the Membership & Care Ministry Team and the Church Council to set parameters for our new Transportation Fund and begin marketing it. We hope to set a "goal" for growth of this fund so we can begin utilizing it to meet transportation challenges in the congregation. This fund is open to contributions from fellowship groups or individuals through estate planning, recurring gifts, or one-time donations. For this fund to grow, it is up to individual members to make it happen.

VAN CONTRIBUTION RECEIVED- FUND TO START WORKING!

We are pleased to announce that the Gregory Family has donated their Handicapped Accessible Minivan to the church, and the church has accepted it! It is here! Ongoing maintenance for this van could come from the new Transportation Fund, after we establish the parameters for it. We have also received donations to this fund already from several members. Many thanks to the Gregory family and to members of CUCC who have made this new ministry a priority in the life of the church!

We have several church members with transportation challenges, especially our homebound members. The new van, donated by the Gregory Family, will be used to help address these challenges, utilizing the resources of this fund. We can also use this fund to purchase another vehicle when the time comes, to rent other vehicles on occasion, or come up with some other creative option to provide transportation options to care for our members. This fund could also be used for short term rental goals to transport members to and from church or for special church trips or other special projects identified and authorized by the Church Council.

For years, some in the congregation have lamented our inability to provide transportation options to our homebound members, youth, fellowship groups, and others. Those dreams are becoming a reality! MODERATOR'S MOMENT

Greetings, Many Blessings, and Lots of Love,

Today (2/17/21) was cold; in fact, we set a record. We have been setting records all through this year and last. We are likely mighty uncomfortable with these records because it feels so out of our norm. Still, from my perspective, it has pushed our boundaries and asked us, now more than ever, to listen closely to Jesus' vision for our lives and to hear the voice of God.



In listening for that voice and as we reach the close of Black History Month, I thought I would share a recent reflection where I heard in my head the refrains of the linked performance (use the QR Code) by Nina Simone. I didn't become familiar with her artistry and story until I was older (you can watch an excellent documentary now available on Netflix, *What happened, Miss Simone*). Every time I hear a recording or watch the performance linked with the QR Code, I am physically shaken by the depth of what she shares. Through her skill and musical talents, she sets us at ease. It makes us comfortable, and then she begins to explore all the ways that oppression, hate, abuse, mental illness, and manipulation have kept her caged. Then in a moment of triumph and brilliant improvisation, she unlocks her cage (even if for a brief moment during this performance)—such a powerful sonic journey.

What have you uncovered this month? How are you helping others unlock their cages and tell their story? A direct way to honor Black History Month's possibilities is to begin asking ourselves questions about our practices and how we move forward to a more equitable present and future. As you think about the questions below, how can we move beyond Black History being limited to a month, but rather the opportunity to understand that Black History is American History?

- 1. What groups have been historically and/or are currently being marginalized in our church or community?
- 2. What does it mean to acknowledge that a group has been and/or is currently being marginalized in our church or community?
- 3. How does data support this? How has CUCC contributed to or helped fight against this marginalization?
- 4. How have our beliefs and actions contributed to this?

These are difficult questions to answer with no readily available solutions. However, exploring them and thinking about possible solutions speaks to our commitment as a congregation to indeed welcome all. By honoring Black History, recognizing marginalized voices, and thinking deeply about improving our obligation to love and include all in our community of faith, we make the sum of Black History Month (all 28 days) impact the whole year (all 365 days).

AMISTAD AND THE UCC

Some of you may be familiar with the story of the Amistad, the ship that was transporting slaves from Africa in 1839 when the slaves revolted and took over the vessel. The story has been lifted up in movies and other media. But did you know the UCC connection?

The slaves sought Sanctuary in the US, but were arrested and tried for mutiny. However, United Church of Christ Congregations (then Congregational) heeded the call for Inclusion of these oppressed individuals (the Mendi slaves) and took up their defense. They gave them shelter and comfort, and paid for both their legal defense and, after they were exonerated of any wrongdoing, their passage back home. For two years the UCC (Congregational) churches stood firm, defending the Amistad slaves. We have a long history in our denomination of standing with the oppressed, even when society stacks the odds against them. Inclusion of all God's children is part of our UCC heritage!

Austen Hartke is the author of *Transforming: The Bible and the Lives of Transgender Christians*, a book on theology and personal narratives published by Westminster John Knox Press in 2018. He is also the founder and director of <u>Transmission Ministry Collective</u>, an online community dedicated to the spiritual care, faith formation, and leadership potential of transgender, nonbinary, genderqueer, and gender-expansive Christians.

From 2015 to 2018 Austen created one hundred videos for the *Transgender and Christian* YouTube series, which sought to share parts of the Bible that relate to gender identity and the lives of transgender individuals.

He is a graduate of Luther Seminary's Master of Arts program in Old Testament/Hebrew Bible Studies, and is the winner of the 2014 John Milton Prize in Old Testament Writing from the same institution. He has spoken at conferences all over the country, including events for The Reformation Project, Gender Spectrum, Evolving Faith, Q Christian Fellowship, the Philadelphia Transgender Health Conference, and the Why Christian Conference.

Austen is a 2019 Bush Foundation Fellow, and is currently researching the use of online ministry as support for gender-expansive Christians. As a transgender person of faith, Austen's greatest passion is helping other trans and gender-expansive people see themselves in scripture.

CUCC SCHOLARSHIP FUND NOW ACCEPTING APPLICATIONS

Did you know there is a Scholarship fund at CUCC? The Memorial Education Fund, established in 1972 by Professor H. H. Krusekopf, and contributed to over the years by many others, was redefined in 2019 as "The Columbia United Church of Christ Scholarship Fund." (The definition of this fund is available on request; copies have been available for the past year on the wooden rack by the Sanctuary doors.) By definition, scholarships awarded from this fund are available to all active members of the congregation who are pursuing an education beyond High School.

There is an application process and qualification criteria. Application forms are available in the church office. *All applications are due by April 1, 2021*, and will be considered by a team composed of the Vice Moderator, the Nurture and Education Ministry Team Chair, the Finance and Stewardship Ministry Team Chair, and Pastor Rick. Awards from the fund will be disbursed after July 1 for the fall semester.

2020 YEAR END FINANCIAL UPDATE

The spirit of stewardship is very much alive in this congregation! In a year that has been largely uncertain, one thing that has been certain is the spirit of faithful stewardship in this community. As we entered March, we were already significantly behind in our budgeted Joyful Giving amount. Throughout the year, we closed the gap, and we ended year having met our Joyful Giving budgeted goal for 2020.



Our *FINAL* Joyful Giving total for 2020 was \$353,970! Our *BUDGETED* Joyful Giving total was \$330,223, so we *EXCEEDED* our goal by \$23,747, or 7%! We exceeded our 2019 Joyful Giving total by \$30,159.

I want to take this time to thank each member of the congregation for their generosity and for finding new and faithful ways to support the church when, most of the year, we couldn't place our offerings in the offering plate. I also want to encourage this faithful stewardship to continue into 2021. Like last year, January and February have already been low giving months. It is time to catch up. Hopefully in 2021, we won't be playing catch up all year, like we did last year! I am looking forward to seeing what 2021 will bring for our congregation.

DESIGNATED FUNDS UPDATE

If you read the CUCC Annual Report for 2020, you may have noticed the Designated Funds Activity Report (page 61). It detailed the amounts that were received and disbursed from our Designated Funds in 2020. A more thorough explanation of Designated Funds Disbursements was also included on page 15. To highlight, some of the funds that were working for you in 2020 include the following:

50 for 50 fund: This fund received \$66,292 in 2019, in recognition of the 50th anniversary of this building. It was designated for five projects. So far we have spent \$50,474 on three of those designated projects: Sanctuary technology, sound system and livestreaming equipment, (\$26,036); Landscaping Improvements (\$10,544); and encasing the Sanctuary eaves (\$7,265). We also donated a Biblical Tithe to four mission agencies (\$6,629). The two final projects, replacing the Shelter House floor (\$8,600) and upgrading our security system (\$7,000) will complete the 50 for 50 projects this spring (hopefully both will be done before the Congregational Meeting).

Scholarship Fund: We awarded two scholarships in 2020 to Marcella Dolezal and Carissa Graves, totaling **\$2,000**. We added **\$50,000** from the Mader Estate to this Fund; and, with unrealized gains and growth, the fund total at the end of 2020 was **\$147,574**. This Fund will be used for more Scholarships in the future, as well as our Organ Scholar Program.

Building Fund: We have been growing this Fund in 2020 with contributions from members, a directed amount from 2020 Joyful Giving (3%), and directed Funds from the Mader Estate. As of the end of 2020, this fund totaled \$55,716, but more gifts in 2021 have been received. We are anticipating major repairs and replacement of HVAC units in the next few years, as well as a need to reseal our entire parking lot. Growth in this fund will allow those projects to happen.

Often he would spend much of the day walking to a local water source and carrying back buckets. His mother, Josephine, did not like to make the journey alone; it was not safe. There was not much time to go to school. And



when he did go to school, Joshua Mumbi was very tired during the day. It was hard to focus; it was hard to learn.

But thanks to your gifts through One Great Hour of Sharing, Joshua Mumbi and his family — and all of the other families in his village — have a safe, clean water source close to home. With a new solar-powered borehole well, they have water for cooking, water for drinking, water for bathing and keeping things clean and sanitary. Now the whole community is empowered to provide for their needs, plan for their future, and pursue new opportunities for growth.

LET'S SUPPORT FUNDING FOR MEDICAID EXPANSION

The UCC General Synod has declared that "Health is harmony with self and others, the environment, and with God—a continuum of physical, social, psychological, and spiritual well-being." Health insurance coverage is essential to achieve that harmony—people without it often have poorer health and shorter lives.


Missourians, including many committed Christians, voted last August to expand Medicaid coverage to include 275,000 more low-income, uninsured people, with or without children. Most of the newly covered people are workers in low-paying jobs that do not provide insurance. The new coverage is set to start on July 1, 2021.

The next step is for the legislature to appropriate funding for it. Fortunately, Governor Parson included the funds in his budget request, and he was still able to balance the budget without any tax increase or cuts to other programs (despite opponents' fears about the potential cost). 90% of the costs will be covered by our federal tax dollars. The state will also benefit from the increase in jobs and economic activity that results from the expansion.

The legislature may try to cut the Governor's funding proposal, so we'll keep you informed as the debate occurs beginning in March. Please consider contacting your legislator (by phone, email or letter) to encourage them to support full funding for Medicaid expansion in accordance with the Governor's recommendations. ADULT EDUCATION SERIES - YOUR BIBLE

Have you ever wanted to participate in a basic, beginner's level Bible Study? A "Bible 101" that takes you back to your first steps in Biblical knowledge and reintroduces you to the basics? Have you ever felt that you don't know enough about the Bible to go to a Bible Study class, that before you can study the Bible you need to start at the beginning?

Pastor Rick is leading a "beginner's Bible Course" in February and March! For six Sunday mornings, we will share a course called, "Your Bible – the Study Begins." This is a Kerygma series that introduces participants to the Bible on a very beginning level, but enjoyable even for more advanced students.

The Series outline is broken up into several units:

By exploring these topics with the <u>Pastor Rick</u> and the class, you can lay the foundation for a much more comprehensive understanding of the Bible. The class will meet Sunday mornings at 9:00 a.m. in the downstairs Fellowship Hall starting February 21 and running thru March 28 (Palm Sunday).

LENTEN BOOK/BIBLE STUDY— THE LAST WEEK

Join Pastor Rick for six Wednesdays during Lent as we take a look at the last week of Jesus' life and the crucial events that took place that week. We will be focusing our study around the book "The Last Week" by Marcus Borg and John Dominic Crossan. Other materials will be incorporated, as well, and we will be looking at and comparing Gospel narratives.



We started on Wednesday, February 24, looking at Palm Sunday, Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, and what that meant to the first century world. The next five Wednesdays (March 3, 10, 17, 24, & 31), we will look at each day of Jesus' last week, examining what these Gospel narratives would have meant to first century readers, and what wisdom these narratives hold for us today.

While you can certainly join the discussion without having read the book, it is recommended that you do so to get the full impact of the class. Invest in the Anti-Trafficking Movement Globally

In less than four weeks I will be riding 300+ miles, from Fort Myers, FL, through the Everglades, and on to Key West. Myself, along with a couple dozen others, will #praypedalrepeat over 47 bridges, one of which is 7 -miles long, with Ends of the Earth Cycling (a ministry of New International). This will be done in Jesus' name for the youth of Romania. We are riding to raise prayers, donations, support, and awareness for the wonderful ministry called Missio International (MI). https://missiointernational.org/

MI provides wholistic services for children and youth who live in rural or marginalized areas and have little-to -no education, in a country that still suffers from the realities of the aftermath of a Communist rule. Romania is second in the top countries-of-origin (the country where a trafficked person came from before being trafficked) for victims of human trafficking in the EU. Many of the youth served by MI are incredibly susceptible to falling into the hands of traffickers. MI's Children-At-Risk programs currently serve over 750 marginalized children and youth annually, meeting the

spiritual and material needs of these at risk children and youth.

WORSHIP AND MUSIC MINISTRY TEAM

THIS IS MY STORY, THIS IS MY SONG

Acts 16:25 – "About midnight, Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God, and the prisoners were listening to them."

Love God, love neighbor. In the Gospel of Mark, Jesus was asked what the two greatest commandments are. Simply put, they are to love God and to love your neighbor. While music is constantly referenced in scripture, Acts 16:25 is an amazing story that quietly expresses the power and purpose of prayer and music, to love God and to love others. To offer glory to God and to uplift, enlighten or build up our neighbors.

Paul and Silas were thrown into a Roman prison for healing a slave of her power to foresee the future — basically, her owners lost a source of income, and they were upset. While in jail, this one verse describes how they continued in prayer and song to praise God...and the prisoners were listening to them. Can you imagine the impact that their song had on the other prisoners who were listening to them, especially as you go on to read about the earthquake and their calming presence? Can you imagine the impact of your song when others are listening? We all have a song to sing, and you will never know how you might impact another person for good.

My first memories of church and faith happened when I was a young boy in Phoenix, AZ. I remember my dad and my grandfather singing in the church choir, and on Sunday night, my dad directed the hymns and the special music. At that same church, I was in the Primary Choir – if we had perfect attendance and memorized a hymn, we would, at the end of the year, receive a hymnal with our name engraved on it. I still have and treasure this hymnal. While I do not remember the names of the Primary Choir leaders, their song impacted my life in ways I may never fully understand.

My first memories of our youth group in Silver Spring, Maryland, were centered on the choir, led by an energizer bunny who loved us and taught us the joy of service to others through music. From that choir, there are five full-time ministers working around the country and the world. Our choir director's name was Rayma, and as we listened to her song, we began to sing our own.

During my ministry here in Columbia, I would go once a quarter to The Terrace retirement community to help lead a service of communion. Virginia Edens is a wonderful friend of our family, and she is one of the most faithful servants for God that I have ever known. Her mother lived at The Terrace and was an Alzheimer's patient. During the service, we would sing some old hymns, and Virginia's mother, though she could not remember my name, knew every

verse of every hymn, and she sang them with great delight. These hymns were the story of her faith, and she sang them so that others would listen and believe.

This is our story and our song – to use our voices in whatever way we can, to sing God's glory, and to hope that others are listening.

CORONAVIRUS AND CUCC UPDATE

The pandemic is not over yet, and we must continue to be vigilant and safe as we slowly emerge into more inperson activities and public gatherings. However, as the month of February draws to a close, the 5-day average for new COVID cases in Boone County has dropped to 22 new cases/day! This is down from our high of 168 new cases/day, reached on November 8, when we decided to close our Sanctuary for in-person worship for the time being. In September and October, when we were worshipping in person, the 5-day average was 60-70 new cases/day. We hope that everyone investigates opportunities for vaccination, to reduce the risk of infection to even lower levels. For information about vaccination options, CLICK HERE.

With this data in mind, the CUCC COVID Response Team and the Church Council decided to reopen our Sanctuary to in-person worship on February 21, with appropriate precautions, including social distancing and mask wearing. Our reopening resulted in 55 people in worship, and others participating in Adult Sunday School class and our Lenten Bible School Program. (For reference, our pre-COVID average Sunday morning attendance was around 140.)

Throughout this pandemic, the leadership of CUCC has been very vigilant, never lax in their monitoring and response efforts. The congregation has been exemplary, as well, following our new hygiene standards admirably, thereby limiting the transmission of the virus and keeping CUCC a safe place. As we move towards emergence together, let us continue to be vigilant in our efforts at living with the Coronavirus.

CUCC IS WORKNG IN LESOTHO



The Lesotho Evangelical Church in Southern Africa (LECSA) is one of Africa's oldest Protestant churches. LECSA, a partner church of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) and the United Church of Christ through Global Ministries, has approximately 580 primary and secondary schools in the country. In many classrooms, students are crowded around a single desk, sitting on benches, or sitting on the floor without a place to work and take notes. Teachers have no place to set teaching materials. Fortunately, LECSA also operates the Leloaleng Manufacturing Centre (LMC), which builds school furniture. LECSA partners with LMC to build school furniture, giving the community increased employment opportunities. LECSA seeks to provide teacher tables, student desks and chalkboards to improve learning and teaching.

The LECSA is a Global Missions Partner of Columbia United Church of Christ through Global Ministries, our shared mission agency with the Christian Church/Disciples of Christ. Global Ministries provides foundational support for this organization and support for their ongoing efforts. Please keep Global Ministries and LECSA in your prayers!

CUCC IS WORKING IN MEXICO

The Round Table for Mission Development in Mexico, a Global Ministries partner, consists of three UCC/DOC partner congregations united in service. Since 2006, the Round Table has been a space for the three churches to do God's mission and live out God's reconciliation in a united way within the volatile context of Mexican churches and society.

Projects that the Round Table for Mission Development in Mexico have developed include projects by women of the three member churches. These projects are micro-credit efforts through which women take out loans at a low interest rate for family income-generation projects. Then, they pay back the loans from the proceeds of their project in order to benefit additional women with loans.

One project included a couple who has purchased 32 goats with a loan provided by the project. From these goats they will sell the goat's milk and meat as they reproduce. Another micro-credit project is of pig-raising. Pastor Claudia and

her husband have adult and baby pigs. They will keep some to reproduce and others will be sold for meat. Another project involves Karen and her husband. They purchased 15 sheep that were expecting and 20 young males. They are fattening the sheep and selling the lambs for meat. Other micro-credit projects include a woman who sells items at a bazaar, two women who cook and sell food from their home, and another woman who makes tamales using the church's kitchen and sells them.

Looking towards the future, The Round Table hopes to increase and develop its capacity for more projects and conferences, in order to enrich, empower, and sow solidarity between women and their communities around the world.
