From the Pastor's Keyboard

"Freedom"

One of the challenges in Biblical Scholarship is placing yourself in the context of the world in which the narrative was written. To understand the intended meaning of the authors, the reader has to understand the world in which the authors lived, their lives and agendas, and view the narrative through those lenses. Yes, it is important to apply those narratives to our current context, but before we do that, we have to understand the narrative in the context in which it was written.

The same principle can be applied to the rest of our lives, as well. To truly understand the writings of another culture in our current time, the reader has to understand the world in which it was written. To interpret writings of others through our own lenses causes distortion and mistrust. We can't understand the author until we have "walked a mile in their shoes" or at least attempted to learn more about their world.

We tend to do this when we talk about the American Revolution and the concept of "freedom." We view it through lenses developed in the 20th century and refined in the 21st century. The 20th century was a time of evolution for our country, much of it not in step with the teachings of Jesus. Though Jesus taught humility and empathy, our US culture grew more arrogant and detached from humanity. The 20th century saw the rise of individualism, often to the point of isolationist policies rooted in narcissism and xenophobia. People began believing that the freedoms we share as United States citizens are rooted in individual freedom instead of communal freedom. The idea that individual freedom was more important than community responsibility began being trumpeted by many, especially those who knew they could use that narcissistic idea to consolidate their power.

This practice led directly to the actions of the extreme right-wing militants who committed acts of domestic terrorism in our Nation's Capitol on January 6. Their justification was that the Capitol belonged "to the people" so they could occupy it as they wished, and do what they wished. They were wrong. Their actions were an affront to the people, and to the idea of freedom. The Capitol does not belong to individuals, it belongs to the community; it belongs to the people, not to individual persons.

This is not what the framers of our country had in mind when they talked of freedom. Their idea of freedom was freedom of the community, not freedom of the individual. They believed in the freedom of the community to act in the best interests of community. They did not believe in the freedom of the individual to do whatever they choose. Our nation was built on freedom, but not the freedom of the individual; the freedom of the community (country).

Martin Luther wrote about this in 1520 in a treatise called, "On the Freedom of a Christian." His goal was to link the ideas of spiritual freedom and servitude, and he began his treatise by laying down two seemingly contradictory principles. He wrote, "A Christian is the freest lord of all, subject to none; a Christian is the most dutiful servant of all, and subject to everyone." He then explains that though our faith in God frees us from sin and offers us salvation, freedom also binds us to Christian principles of love, service, and humility. Though free, we are duty bound to each other by the ties of Christian love. The same ties that free us also bind us.

As we celebrate Independence Day this month, this principle is also applicable to the secular community. The same freedoms that form the basis for our community (country) are also what binds us. Our freedom as a community (country) is not based in doing whatever we want to whomever we want to please our own self interests. Our freedom as a community (country) is based on serving each other, serving other communities (countries) as we are able, and in being dutiful servants of all in the world, just like Jesus.

Martin Luther King Jr. said, "No one is free until we all are free." This is something we would do well to remember this Independence Day. Who is not free in our community, and how can we share the gift of freedom with all, as we serve one another?

GENERAL SYNOD 33, JULY 11-18

General Synod is the gathering every other year, of the members of United Church of Christ who are involved in every setting of the church. Clergy and lay members from all across the US and even other countries attend, offering workshops and educational incentives, participating in transformative worship, making prophetic witness to social justice issues of our day, and doing the business of the church. A typical General Synod brings 8000-10,000 people together in one place to celebrate, worship, learn, and serve.

Due to COVID concerns, General Synod 33 will be entirely online. If you would like to participate, you can do so by registering online at this link: GS 33 or by going to www.generalsynod.org. The General Synod website has registration information, agendas, biographies of worship and workshop leaders, and more. Even if you are not able to participate in the online experience, the website has much information to offer.

One of the aspects of General Synod is the Resolutions that are discussed. There are 11 Resolutions that will be discussed at GS 33, speaking about issues such as: the injustice of the Bail Bond System; Calling for Just Peace in Israel/Palestine; Declaring Racism a Public Health Crisis; and the one we have been discussing at CUCC, A Call to Ban the Practice of Conversion Therapy (see page 8). These resolutions speak to the churches, not for the churches, and challenge us to be in conversation about them. CHURCH COUNCIL

CHURCH COUNCIL NOTES

(from the June 22 Meeting)

After Pastor Rick's opening prayer, Kristy Odneal gave a summary of Chapter 4 of <u>Piloting Church</u>. The book emphasized the importance of developing strong teams and good leaders. Good leaders equip others to get things done and are clear about their mission. A good leader inspires, directs, and gives feedback, then lets others "fly." The book also emphasizes the importance of celebrating success, even small ones. Also, it is important to debrief everything to clarify improvements and importance. Trust is paramount in a healthy congregation. Council discussion expressed that CUCC does well in some areas, but can improve in others.

- Council members reviewed their duties when opening and closing the building on Sundays and when serving communion. Clarified that communion stewards need not be Council members.
- The Executive Committee recommended, effective immediately, that masks are optional for vaccinated adults and are encouraged for unvaccinated adults. Recommendation carried by common consensus.
- LED lighting in the Education wing will be completed in July.
- Mike Pierson is putting together a committee to organize the renovation of the sanctuary. He still needs two more members. The first meeting will be in early July.
- Pastoral evaluation has been completed.
- Sue Ann Schaefer reported the financial audit is complete.
- The Vision Team will meet in July. This is earlier than usual because a new 5-year plan needs to be developed.
- Pastor Rick is scheduled for a three month sabbatical, August through October, 2022. His tentative plan is for 4 -6 weeks in Guatemala and Mexico. The remaining weeks will be spent in theological reading and study. A committee will be formed to coordinate church coverage in Pastor Rick's absence.
- Jolene Kirchhoff and Jo Ellen Grace were approved as LODO Ministry Team members.
- Mike Pierson presented a recommendation from the Worship and Music Team to purchase two sound monitors for the chancel area costing \$573.75. Recommendation was approved.
- Pastor Rick reviewed the names of several guests who are attending church. He wants to ramp up our ministry for possible new members in the fall. We need to make their experience "spectacular." There will be a Fall Back to Church theme to bring members back to church in the fall.
- On July 15, the missionary from Chiapas will speak at CUCC. She will review the work being done in Chiapas. We will have a Mexican Dinner that evening.
- Sue Ann Schaefer reported a bit of headway made in the joyful giving totals. Brent Marcks plans to send out a mid-year giving statement.
- The Ministry Team reports were submitted and reviewed.
- Mike Pierson reported that Lucy is stepping back as organ scholar until September.
- Next Council meeting will be on July 20 at 6:30 p.m.

CLERGY PERSONNEL COMMITTEE

CLERGY SABBATICAL

Sabbath is a gift from God, because rest is as important as work for the health of all Creation. The Seventh Day was consecrated as a day of rest, and God ordered all of Creation to cease from work on the Sabbath. Jesus frequently left his followers and his disciples to pray by himself, spending time reflecting on his call, listening to God's voice, and receiving strength and direction for his ongoing ministry.

Rooted in these Biblical commands for Sabbath, a Sabbatical is a significant time of rest, renewal, and refreshment for Pastors. For Pastors, the Sabbatical time is a time to nourish their relationship with God, recommit to their call, and provide renewed vision and focus for ministry. A Sabbatical is not vacation, but it does provide time away from the daily work of ministry. Sabbatical leave may include study or a project, but its first goal is reconnecting with one's sense of vocation through rest, reflection, and prayer.

Clergy Sabbaticals encourage longer pastorates, refocus ministries, contribute to pastoral and congregational spiritual growth, prevent burnout, establish new patterns for self care for both pastors and congregations, and promote the self sufficiency of a congregation. Clergy are not the only ones who benefit from a Sabbatical; a Sabbatical done well brings new life and vitality to a congregation, as well.

Typical Clergy Guidelines call for Pastors to receive a three month Sabbatical after five years of service. This is part of Pastor Rick's Call Agreement with CUCC. On September 1, 2022, Pastor Rick will celebrate five years of ministry with CUCC, so the Church Council and the Clergy Personnel Committee are working to negotiate a Sabbatical Plan for Pastor Rick and CUCC. This Sabbatical will probably take place in the fall of 2022. Watch for more details as plans unfold!

INCLUSION AND AFFIRMATION MINISTRY TEAM

Hello again. With Ministry Team Chair Tricia Price's permission, I will be continuing to contribute to the Communicator for this team.

In July we celebrate the anniversary of 'The Americans With Disabilities Act' becoming law. One in four adults is living with some type of disability in the US. The stats break down like this:

Almost 14% have difficulty with mobility

Almost 11% have cognitive difficulties

Almost 7% have difficulty doing errands alone

Almost 6 % have a degree of deafness

4.6% have trouble seeing

Almost 4 % cannot take care of themselves





The law ends discrimination in regards to housing, education, health care, transportation, public access, voting, etc. for the disabled. However, according to the CDC, one in three individuals with a disability either do not have a routine health care provider or have unmet healthcare needs due to cost. One in four have not had a routine check-up in the past year. (Thankfully, the Supreme Court upheld the Affordable Care Act, again.)

What can we, as individuals and as a church, do to support those with these challenges? CUCC is blessed in that this congregation is already "doing." We have a crew that works the foodbank. We support a local elementary school. We have used our voice, via voting, to: support an increase in public services and personnel to implement those services; we have written legislators urging them to support bills that positively impact the health and safety of individuals with challenges. There are members of CUCC who routinely provide rides to those who, otherwise, wouldn't be at church. We offer zoom church services and internal programs so as many as possible can join.

We have members and regular attendees that do all of the above items and more to support our community and the world. CUCC is so blessed. The Spirit of the Living and Loving God is active in this congregation. And, as Pastor Rick says every Sunday, "Go out into the world and (continue to) be a blessing. Amen.

A MATTER OF DIGNITY-BANNING "CONVERSION THERAPY" IN THE US

This July, the General Synod of the United Church of Christ will meet using Zoom technology to do the business of the church, one of which is to speak to Social Justice issues prevalent in our society today. This year there are 11 Resolutions that will be discussed and shared with Local Congregations for their discussion, as well. All eleven Resolutions can be read in their entirety by clicking here: **GS RESOLUTIONS**

One of the Resolutions that we will be discussing here at CUCC in June is a Resolution calling for a ban on the practice of "Conversion Therapy" in the US. The text of that resolution can be read in its entirety here: **GS BAN**

General Synod Resolutions of Witness do not speak FOR local churches; they speak TO local churches. They provide us with a theological framework to address Social Justice Issues in our communities, as the Prophets of our traditions spoke to the people of Israel about similar issues. It is up to us to process these issues and act as we feel the Spirit is moving us. We will be doing just that here at CUCC in July. An edited synopsis of the General Synod resolution is copied below:

Conversion therapy has existed in one form or another since the late 19th century. While the practice has caused demonstrable harm to the mental and physical health of LGBTQ+ persons, conversion therapy continues to be legal throughout the United States. According to practitioners of conversion therapy, the sexual orientation or gender identity of LGBTQ+ persons is a disease, defect or developmental disorder. This claim has been repudiated by every professional association in the field of health care, many of whom have advocated for a ban on the discredited practice.

According to a report published by the Williams Institute at the UCLA School of Law (June 2019), 698,000 adults in the United States have experienced conversion therapy, and 20,000 LGBTQ+ youth will be subjected to conversion therapy if state legislatures refuse to act. Also, according to the Williams Institute (June 15, 2020), LGBTQ+ people who were subjected to conversion therapy have shown a greater risk of suicidal thoughts and attempted suicide than LGBTQ+ people who had never experienced this therapy, including:

- 92% greater odds of lifetime suicidal ideation
- 88% greater odds of attempting suicide
- 75% greater odds of planning to attempt suicide

The consensus of the mental health care profession was summed up in the "Position Statement on Attempts to Change Sexual Orientation, Gender Identity, or Gender Expression" released by the American Psychoanalytic Association in 2012. They found: "Psychoanalytic technique does not encompass purposeful attempts to 'convert, repair, change, or shift' an individual's sexual orientation, gender identity, or gender expression. Such directed efforts are against fundamental principles of psychoanalytic treatment and often result in substantial psychological pain by reinforcing damaging internalized attitudes."

BIBLICAL AND THEOLOGICAL RATIONALE: Biblical tradition affirms that all human beings are made "in the image of God." (Gen. 1:27) The church's witness affirms that "in Christ Jesus, you are all children of God through faith" and that "all of you are one in Christ Jesus." (Gal. 26-28) We are therefore to "love our neighbor as ourselves" (Lev. 19:9-18 and Matt. 22:40) and act with empathy towards all others. The capacity to love and seek love is God's gift to all human beings. Human love in its many expressions is therefore God's design for humanity, and is offered to all without regard to sexual orientation or gender identity. The psychological and spiritual damage inflicted by "conversion therapy" on LGBTQ+ people, especially youth, violates the image of God that is embodied in every human being, harms our neighbor, and denies to others the grace we claim for ourselves.

THEREFORE: (this is the part that is calling local churches to action, if they so choose) The Thirty-Third General Synod of the United Church of Christ, affirming the dignity and worth of all people, deplores the practice of "conversion therapy" or "reparative therapy" that denies LGBTQ+ youth and adults the opportunity to experience the blessings of love and human integrity, and urges parents, authorized ministers and care-givers in the United Church of Christ to protect those in their care from any practice or program that purports to "cure" their sexual orientation or gender identity, and urges congregations and all other settings of the church to advocate for state and federal laws protecting adults, youth, and children from "conversion therapy" by banning the practice, and urges congregations and other settings to strengthen their efforts to reach their LGBTQ+ neighbors, especially youth, with the Good News that their sexual orientation and gender identity or expression are gifts from God.

BUILDING AND GROUNDS FUND AT CUCC

Did you know that we have a Designated Fund at CUCC specifically for facility renovation projects and major repairs? The Building and Grounds Fund at CUCC was created in October, 2019 by the Church Council by combining the former Building and Major Repairs Fund and the former Building Fund II. Since that time, donations have been received by several individuals, some of whom contribute regularly.

Monies from this fund are held in our investments with United Church Funds. We currently have a balance of over \$112,000 in this fund, but we also have several major repairs coming up in the next few years that will deplete this (including replacing 17 HVAC units and resealing our parking lot/driveway). 50 FOR 50 PROJECTS COMPLETED THANKS TO YOUR STEWARDSHIP!

The 50 for 50 campaign, which began in September, 2019 is officially over!

We started the 50 for 50 campaign on September 22, 2019, with a goal of raising \$50,000 in 50 days in celebration and recognition of the 50th anniversary of the dedication of our current church building (September 7, 1969). We blew that goal out of the water! By November 10, we raised \$66,292; 32% more than we anticipated raising! Our stated purpose for the campaign was to fund five renovations around the church facility and give a Biblical tithe (10%) to our historic mission agencies.



In January 2020, we entered the project phase of this campaign, soliciting bids (three for each project) and managing labor. There were some extenuating factors (including COVID), but the final project was completed in May 2021, and the bill paid in June. The final reporting on the 50 for 50 campaign is as follows:

CUCC SCHOLARSHIP FUND AT WORK

The Columbia United Church of Christ Scholarship Fund is a new fund, created in October 2019, by repurposing the former Memorial Education Fund.

The original fund was established in 1972 by Professor H. H. Krusekopf as a memorial to his late wife, Nancy. Over the years, significant contributions to this fund were made in memory of Professor Krusekopf, Elsa Nagel, Seth Brandenburg, Wesley Kirchhoff, and Rachel Kirchhoff.

The new fund was established to enable continuing education endeavors among all members of this congregation, expanding the range of financial opportunities to continuing education in general, beyond the scope of ministry. Applications for scholarships are due by April 1 each year and are reviewed by a team consisting of the Finance & Stewardship Ministry Team Chair, the Nurture & Education Ministry Team Chair, the Vice Moderator of the Council, and the Pastor. All applicants must not only be church members, but be active in the life of the church.

This year, for our second class of recipients, we had three applicants: Carissa Graves, Hayley Dennis, and Lindsey Oberle. All three applicants were heartily approved. Each one will receive a \$1,000 scholarship to make their college education more affordable.

This fund is invested with United Church Funds, one of ten Designated Funds that make ministry matters happen in earnest in this congregation. It is open to contributions. To donate, talk to Sue Ann Schaffer or Brent Marcks.

2021 CROP HUNGER WALK COMING UP!

The 2021 CROP (Communities Responding to Overcome Poverty) Hunger Walk is coming up! It is scheduled for September 19, 2021, at Stephens Lake Park.

The CROP Hunger Walk is one of the largest annual fundraising efforts of Church World Service, an interfaith organization formed in 1946 to address hunger and poverty issues around the world in the aftermath of World War II. At that time, 17 Christian denominations came together "to do in partnership what none of us could hope to do as well alone." Currently, 34 faith groups participate in the work of Church World Service.

CROP Hunger Walks began in 1969 by youth who wanted to do something tangible to enhance the work of Church World Service. Teens in Bismarck, North Dakota and York County, Pennsylvania started the first CROP walk that year, and they have grown ever since. CUCC has been participating in CROP Walks here in Boone County for decades.

Last year, CUCC was the top fundraiser for the Columbia CROP Walk, raising \$2,761. This year, our goal is to top \$3,000! We will need your help to do it. 

It may also be of interest to note that Herman Stuempfle, hymn writer and theologian who died in 2007, dedicated his life to stances on social issues. He created day care centers; served on the Gettysburg, PA interchurch social action committee, helped create and support prison ministries and a homeless shelter, and was a tutor for young people after school. He literally worked to paint a beautiful rainbow through his life.

CUCC IS WORKING WITH WOMEN IN GUATEMALA

The National Coordinator of Widows of Guatemala (CONAVIGUA) is a Global Ministries partner, founded in 1988 as a response to the suffering of women in rural areas amid the internal armed conflict of Guatemala. These widows were women whose husbands, sons, and daughters had been either killed or had disappeared during Guatemala's civil war. They organized to fight to alleviate and solve the most immediate and urgent needs of food, medicine, housing, and clothing.

In their current advocacy, they work to address several issues. Much of their advocacy is centered on making the Guatemalan government accountable for their actions. This includes demanding that the government assures the education of all children by offering economic support and school supplies when needed. They also demand that the government create laws of protection for widows and mothers. Further, they ask the government to ensure that international aid falls into the correct hands, instead of the pockets of corrupt institutions and opportunists.

CONAVIGUA also works on a local level by developing projects that help Guatemalan women, allowing opportunities for women to contribute to addressing societal problems. They also work heavily in exhumations of mass graves of victims of armed conflicts. They then offer dignified Christian burials that allow family and friends to honor those who have passed.

In all of this, they demand that their voice is heard and recognized in the political, economic, and social life of Guatemala as they advocate on behalf of those who are oppressed and marginalized.
