From the Pastor's Keyboard

"Thru Epiphany to Lent"

January 6, 2021, was the feast of Epiphany; the day commemorating the visit of the Magi to the manger. Their visit "revealed" Jesus' true nature as the Messiah, and their expression of faith caused Mary, Joseph, and Herod to begin to ponder the implications of that expression. The word "Epiphany" means "to be revealed" or "to reveal," and what was "revealed" that day would change the world forever.

January 6, 2021, was the day of another revelation. Is it a coincidence that on the day of revelation armed domestic terrorists attacked the bastion of democracy, desecrated the flag, killed police officers, and attempted to assassinate Mike Pence, the Vice-President of the United States?

This fact that this event happened on Epiphany is not coincidental, for it was certainly a revelation. It revealed the extent of narcissism present in our country, the depth of racism that is part of our national identity, and what happens when people are corrupted by one person's lust for power. It revealed the extremes that hatred, if left unchecked, can cause. It revealed that, as a society, we are very much in need of healing, but we also have issues we need to address.

As a society, we cannot heal by simply sticking our head in the sand and pretending the Epiphany Revelation of 2021, the armed insurrection against the United States, did not happen. We cannot just "move on." We must confront the demons that have plagued our country since its inception; the demons of racism, narcissism, and greed. We must shed light on the darkness of evil, wherever it has taken root, revealing the evil so healing can begin. As Christians who champion the Good News of Jesus Christ, it is up to us to be this beacon of light, this beacon of hope.

In February, we continue the Epiphany journey we began in January. The Epiphany journey contains many elements. After the visit of the Magi, we hear about Herod's Massacre of the Infants; we see Anna and Simeon proclaim baby Jesus' divinity as he is presented in the Temple; we celebrate Christ's baptism; we witness Jesus calling his Disciples; and we climb with Jesus up a mountain where he communes with God, Moses, and Elijah and is Transfigured. In each of these stories, Jesus' true nature is revealed to those who witness the moment. All are amazed, and the presence of God in each of their lives is revealed in the true nature of this man, this Messiah.

Epiphany is about revelation, but it is also about reaction. In each of the instances listed above, those who receive "Epiphanies" react, based on the revelation they received. The Magi react, defying Herod by taking another road. Anna and Simeon react, proclaiming the Messiah for all to hear. John's disciples react at Jesus' baptism by telling everyone what they saw. Jesus' disciples react at his call, dropping their fishnets and immediately following him. Peter, James, and John react at the Transfiguration, proclaiming their faith in the Law and the Prophets by offering to construct tabernacles for them. Receiving an Epiphany is the first step; how one reacts afterward brings definition to the moment of Epiphany.

How we react to the 2021 Epiphany Revelation, the armed insurrection against our country, will bring definition to that moment. If we react in unity, denouncing acts of domestic terrorism and racist abuse while seeking ways to lift up and affirm the worth of all God's children, the 2021 Epiphany Revelation will be defined as a call to justice, reconciliation, and reform, a call to true unity emblematic of Martin Luther King's dream, Jesus' prayer in the Garden of Gethsemane, God's Vision for Creation. If we react with increased division, or if we try to stick our heads in the sand and "just move on," pretending it did not happen, the 2021 Epiphany Revelation will be defined as just an incident of cowardly domestic terrorism with no redemptive value.

This month, we move through Epiphany and enter the Season of Lent. Ash Wednesday is February 17 and we will celebrate it together, with in-person worship for the first time in a long time. Let us do so together; united, learning and growing from the revelations Epiphany brought us, and reacting as God's children, living God's Vision in the world.

UPDATES ON CONGREGATIONAL MEETINGS

May 16, 2021 — Annual Congregational Meeting hosted by the Church Council. This will be our first Annual Meeting under our new programming structure! Lunch will be served prior to the meeting. Mark your calendars!

2021 BUDGET — The 2021 Budget was approved unanimously at our Budget Meeting on November 8. This Budget calls for a modest 5.2% increase in spending for 2021. If you would like a copy of the 2021 approved budget, contact **April** in the church office, and she will send you a copy. (Our fiscal year is still the calendar year; it did not change when the By-Laws changed the programming year to an academic schedule. The programming year is now June 1-May 31.)

CUCC LIVESTREAMING-NEW EQUIPMENT UPDATE

Our new livestreaming equipment was installed December 1, and over the past two months, James Melton and Mike Pierson, along with Brent Marcks, Pete Jaberg and others, have been honing their skills at using it.

Our two new cameras are controlled from the Technology Booth (formerly the Sound Booth) remotely, to zoom in on worship leaders. What was once a one person job in the old Sound Booth has quickly evolved into a three person job; one on sound, one on cameras, and one advancing slides.

If you are interested in learning how to operate this equipment, contact <u>Mike Pierson</u> or <u>James Melton</u>. They are putting together training videos and would love to do some personal training for interested parties. With the new process, it will be more important than ever to expand our pool of volunteers.

With this new technology, our livestream is much more sophisticated, but it cannot be streamed to both You Tube (our website) and Facebook at the same time; so from now on, we will only be streaming to You Tube (accessible through our website on Sunday morning) and not Facebook. The service will be uploaded to Facebook later that day.

VAN CONTRIBUTION RECEIVED- FUND TO START WORKING!



Austen Hartke is the author of *Transforming: The Bible and the Lives of Transgender Christians*, a book on theology and personal narratives published by Westminster John Knox Press in 2018. He is also the founder and director of <u>Transmission Ministry Collective</u>, an online community dedicated to the spiritual care, faith formation, and leadership potential of transgender, nonbinary, genderqueer, and gender-expansive Christians.

From 2015 to 2018 Austen created one hundred videos for the *Transgender and Christian* YouTube series, which sought to share parts of the Bible that relate to gender identity and the lives of transgender individuals.

He is a graduate of Luther Seminary's Master of Arts program in Old Testament/Hebrew Bible Studies, and is the winner of the 2014 John Milton Prize in Old Testament Writing from the same institution. He has spoken at conferences all over the country, including events for The Reformation Project, Gender Spectrum, Evolving Faith, Q Christian Fellowship, the Philadelphia Transgender Health Conference, and the Why Christian Conference.

Austen is a 2019 Bush Foundation Fellow, and is currently researching the use of online ministry as support for gender-expansive Christians. As a transgender person of faith, Austen's greatest passion is helping other trans and gender-expansive people see themselves in scripture.

Parenting in a Pandemic: Tips to Keep the Calm at Home

Fear, uncertainty, and being holed up at home more to slow the spread of COVID-19 can make it tough for families to keep a sense of calm. But it's important to help children feel safe, keep healthy routines, manage their emotions and behavior, and build resilience.

Here are some tips from the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) to help your family get through the stress of the pandemic.

- Address children's fears. Children rely on their parents for safety, both physical and emotional. Reassure your children that you are there for them and that your family will get through this together.
- Answer questions about the pandemic simply & honestly. Talk with children about any frightening news they hear. It is OK to say people are getting sick, but remind them that following safety steps like hand washing, wearing cloth face coverings, and staying home more will help your family stay healthy.
- Recognize your child's feelings. Calmly say, for example, "I can see that you are upset because you can't have a sleepover with your friends right now." Guiding questions can help older children and teens work through issues. ("I know it is disappointing not to be able to do some of the things you did before the pandemic. What are some other ways you can have fun with your friends?")
- ♦ Keep in touch with loved ones. Children may also worry about a grandparent who is living alone or a relative or friend with an increased risk of getting COVID-19. When safe, physically distanced visits aren't possible, video chats can help ease their anxiety.
- ♦ Model how to manage feelings. Talk through how you are managing your own feelings. ("I am worried about Grandma since I can't go visit her. I will put a reminder on my phone to call her in the morning, and in the afternoon until it is safe to see her.")
- Tell your child before you leave the house for work or essential errands. In a calm and reassuring voice, tell them where you are going, how long you will be gone, when you will return, and that you are taking steps to stay safe.
- Look forward. Tell them that scientists are working hard to figure out how to help people who get sick, how to prevent it, and that things will get better.
- Offer extra hugs and say "I love you" more often.


TIME, TALENT AND TREASURES DURING A PANDEMIC

CUCC SCHOLARSHIP FUND NOW ACCEPTING APPLICATIONS

Did you know there is a Scholarship fund at CUCC? The Memorial Education Fund, established in 1972 by Professor H. H. Krusekopf, and contributed to over the years by many others, was redefined in 2019 as "The Columbia United Church of Christ Scholarship Fund." (The definition of this fund is available on request; copies have been available for the past year on the wooden rack by the Sanctuary doors.) By definition, scholarships awarded from this fund are available to all active members of the congregation who are pursuing an education beyond High School.

There is an application process and qualification criteria. Application forms are available in the church office. All applications are due by April 1, 2021, and will be considered by a team composed of the Vice Moderator, the Nurture and Education Ministry Team Chair, the Finance and Stewardship Ministry Team Chair, and Pastor Rick. Awards from the fund will be disbursed after July 1 for the fall semester.

2020 YEAR END FINANCIAL UPDATE

The spirit of stewardship is very much alive in this congregation! In a year that has been largely uncertain, one thing that has been certain is the spirit of faithful stewardship in this community. As we entered March, we were already significantly behind in our budgeted Joyful Giving amount. Throughout the year, we closed the gap, and we will end the year having met our Joyful Giving budgeted goal for 2020.



Our *FINAL* Joyful Giving total for 2020 was \$353,970! Our *BUDGETED* Joyful Giving total was \$330,223, so we *EXCEEDED* our goal by \$23,747, or 7%! We exceeded our 2019 Joyful Giving total by \$30,159.

I want to take this time to thank each member of the congregation for their generosity and for finding new and faithful ways to support the church when, most of the year, we couldn't place our offerings in the offering plate. I also want to encourage this faithful stewardship to continue into 2021. In 2020, January and February were low giving months, and we spent the year behind because of that. Hopefully in 2021, we won't be playing catch up all year! I am looking forward to 2021 and what it will bring to our congregation.



LOAVES AND FISHES UPDATE




CONFIRMATION CLASS OF 2021!

LENTEN BOOK/BIBLE STUDY—THE LAST WEEK

Join Pastor Rick for six Wednesdays during Lent as we take a look at the last week of Jesus' life and the crucial events that took place that week. We will be focusing our study around the book "The Last Week" by Marcus Borg and John Dominic Crossan. Other materials



will be incorporated, as well, and we will be looking at and comparing Gospel narratives.

Starting on Wednesday, February 24, we will look at Palm Sunday, Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, and what that meant to the first century world. The next five Wednesdays (March 3, 10, 17, 24, & 31) we will look at each day of Jesus' last week, examining what these Gospel narratives would have meant to first century readers, and what wisdom these narratives hold for us today.

We will meet at 6:30 each Wednesday in the Fellowship Hall, socially distanced, wearing masks. Copies of the book can be purchased on Amazon for \$10.99 and can also be found at local booksellers. While you can certainly join the discussion without having read the book, it is recommended that you do so to get the full impact of the class. Pastor Rick will be sending out a Study Guide before each class to get us started (and also a Zoom link, if anyone wants to join that way).

ADULT EDUCATION SERIES - YOUR BIBLE

Have you ever wanted to participate in a basic, beginner's level Bible Study? A "Bible 101" that takes you back to your first steps in Biblical knowledge and reintroduces you to the basics? Have you ever felt that you don't know enough about the Bible to go to a Bible Study class, that before you can study the Bible you need to start at the beginning?

Pastor Rick will be leading a "beginner's Bible Course" in February and March! For six Sunday mornings, we will share a course called, "Your Bible – the Study Begins." This is a Kerygma series that introduces participants to the Bible on a very beginning level, but enjoyable even for more advanced students.

The Series outline is broken up into several units:

- "What is the Bible?"
- "How Did the Bible Come to Be?"
- "What is the Old Testament About?"
- "What is the New Testament About?"
- "How Has the Bible Been Preserved and Handed On?"
- "How Shall We Study the Bible?"
- "What is the Place of the Bible in Our Lives?"



By exploring these topics with the <u>Pastor Rick</u> and the class, you can lay the foundation for a much more comprehensive understanding of the Bible. The class will meet Sunday mornings at 9:00 a.m. in the downstairs Fellowship Hall starting February 21 and running thru March 28 (Palm Sunday).

Volunteer of the Month: Ed Kaiser

Volunteer Columbia celebrates 25 years of connecting residents to service opportunities in local government in 2021. Throughout the year, we will highlight the efforts of long-time volunteers.

After an attempt to get into the Air Force, Ed Kaiser subconsciously found himself being a volunteer officer in the Columbia Police Reserves. The reserves were a diverse force of 40 dedicated volunteers serving their community.

Through the Police Reserves, Ed met a battalion chief with the Columbia Fire Department who requested Ed accompany him on an inspection tour for his company to look for hazardous materials. Ed realized storage and disposal of hazardous materials was an issue that needed a solution immediately.

After being made aware of extremely harmful hazardous materials in local buildings, it dawned on him the possible hazardous materials in homes. This concern led him to pen a letter to the City of Columbia.

With his "Ivory tower" experience as he explained (thanks to his Ph.D. in organic chemistry from Purdue University) Ed made it a priority to teach firefighters about hazardous materials. Ed then developed a program for residents to dispose of their hazardous materials in cooperation with the City's Solid Waste Utility. Household Hazardous Waste collection, developed by Ed, accepts your materials on the first and third Saturday mornings, April through November, at the Grissum Building, 1313 Lakeview Ave.

In approaching the 25th anniversary of Volunteer Columbia, Ed responded: "To thine own self be true...". Ed and his wife, Judy, have visited all seven continents. Congratulations to Ed Kaiser on this honor and thanks for your impact as a volunteer.

- ⇒ Volunteer your time, talents, or become a donor—There are many needs to run an anti-trafficking organization successfully. Volunteers are needed, including different talents to help with social media, education, creating platforms for awareness (including artistic ways to reach others), rides, admin work, and so much more. Donors are needed to keep the organizations running.

 Donor partnerships provide access to healthcare, mental and health services, rides, groceries, living assistance, and more.

I grew up in the Washington DC suburb of Rockville, Maryland in a time when there were riots over race and the Vietnam War, when a disgraced President resigned, and when the country grieved the assassinations of the Kennedys and a King. There have always been divisions in our country, but none so ugly as what we are seeing now. Pandemic fights over wearing a simple mask that has been proven to reduce the spread of COVID-19. Airline passengers attacking ticket agents over the size of carry-on luggage. Democracy threatened by attempts to manipulate election results. Rise, O church, like Christ arisen, from this meal of love and grace; may we through such love envision whose we are, and whose, our praise.

And following the meal, "Rise, transformed, and choose to follow after Christ, though wounded, whole;" Then, the text reminds us how to live our days.

Rise, remember well the future God has called us to receive; present by God's loving nurture, Spirited then let us live. Alleluia, alleluia; Spirit, grace by whom we live.

Service be our sure vocation; courage be our daily breath; mercy be our destination from this day and unto death.

What beautiful images for our world today! Grace and mercy from the table of love. Rise, O Church, because we need to lead the way to remind our world that we treat everyone with love, respect, grace, and mercy.

CORONAVIRUS AND CUCC UPDATE – IN PERSON WORSHIP RESUMES 2/17

What do the Coronavirus numbers look like in Boone County? The CUCC COVID-19 Response Team has been keeping a close eye on them. On January 18, the 5-day average for new cases dropped to 78; the high, back in November when we chose to go online-only, was 168. We are definitely seeing improvement!

With the distribution of vaccines and the hope that most Boone County citizens will be vaccinated, we expect numbers to decrease even more in the weeks to come. With this in mind, the CUCC COVID Response Team met on January 18 and put together a recommendation that we continue to livestream-only our worship services through Epiphany, and begin opening to in-person worship for Lent.

Our first in-person worship service will be Ash Wednesday, February 17. Our first in-person Sunday worship service will be February 21. Sunday School will also resume at that time.

We will observe the social distancing policies we implemented in 2020. Masks will be required, distancing policies will be in place, and bathrooms will be limited to one person at a time. The nursery will only be open from 10:00-Noon, with staff, and will not be open for parents to utilize earlier. We will have coffee available in the Fellowship Hall from 9:00-10:30, but we will not have the gathering area (sofas) open upstairs.

The church family did a great job of following these rules in 2020, which kept our congregation healthy. With continued vigilance, we can remain healthy as we all become vaccinated and defeat this pandemic together!

CUCC IS WORKNG IN CUBA




The Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial Center (CMMLK) is an organization of Christian inspiration focused on educating Cubans in critical, liberating and contextual theology. They give hope by organizing social participation, ministering with the Cuban people, and actively striving for social justice. The Trauma Recovery and Income Generation Project for women of the center is a network of social support, skills training, and income generating projects for women from difficult circumstances. Using the model of popular grassroots education, many women find healing from domestic violence situations in the group and find a network of support from women in the community. Each woman in the project learns an artistic skill and means of self-expression such as doll making, sewing, cooking and more. Women in the group use these skills to generate income and to contribute back to the project for other women to join.

The CCMLK is a Global Missions Partner of Columbia United Church of Christ through Global Ministries, our shared mission agency with the Christian Church/Disciples of Christ. CUCC IS WORKING IN MEXICO

Melel Xojobal in Tzotzil, an indigenous Mayan language, means "True Light." They are a social organization founded in San Cristobal de las Casas, Chiapas, Mexico in February 1997. Melel Xojobal primarily works with indigenous populations through education, advocacy, health services, and community engagement.

During its first years, the organization focused on educational programs with children living on the street. Subsequently, their work has been transformed and expanded to contribute more effectively to the fulfillment of the rights of indigenous children, and other children and youth in situations of marginalization and social risk.

Melel Xojobal works with the indigenous children and young people of the state of Chiapas in the promotion, defense, and exercise of their rights through participatory processes for the improvement of their quality of life. They strive to be a sustainable organization with a focus on rights and gender perspective.

The work of Melel Xojobal can be broken into three areas: early childhood work, support, and advocacy for the rights of child workers, and work with young people. They work with children and their parents to address topics such as nutritional, physical, and social skills. Their work with child workers seeks to defend the rights of indigenous children who work in the streets, markets, and public areas of the city. They also work with young people ages 13 to 18 to encourage and promote healthy lifestyles and self-protection strategies that revolve around prevention of substance abuse, as well as finding dignified work. Their work seeks to fundamentally change the conditions that exclude and marginalize indigenous children and youth.
