From the Pastor's Keyboard

"Justice"

April 20, 2021 was a day that will be remembered for generations to come. It was a day that the judicial system worked for those who have been historically oppressed; Derek Chauvin was convicted on two counts of murder and one count of manslaughter; and he remains imprisoned for his crimes. His sentencing will be on June 16, and could result in him serving anywhere from 12 to 40 years in jail. Was this justice?

The American justice system is based on retribution, not reform. When people commit crimes against others, including murder, as in this case, we seek not to reform the criminal, but punish them. Our judicial system is punitive against the offender, but the overall system that caused offense is forgotten. Individuals such as Derek Chauvin, witless pawns in a broken system, are punished for the sins of society that formed him. Is this justice?

While many people were crying out that "justice was served" on April 20, others, commenting on the murder conviction of Derek Chauvin, pointed out that this was not justice. Justice would be the assurance that no Black Body will be killed again simply for being Black. That did not come from this conviction. Justice was not served on April 20; for the next day another Black Body was killed simply because they were Black. What is justice?

God's economy of justice is built on reformation, not retribution. God is interested in reform, not revenge. God's idea of justice is to bring things into justification with one another; to bring things into alignment.

As I sit here typing this in a Word Document, I am looking at four buttons on the top of my screen: Left Justify, Center Justify, Right Justify, Text Justify. By highlighting my text and hitting these buttons, I bring the words on my page into alignment with each other. Suddenly, they are together, united, aligned; left, right, center, or full text.

This is what Justice means to God; justification. Bringing disparate things into alignment with each other. Bringing Black and White, Brown and Beige, Gay and Straight, Police officers and citizens all into alignment with each other. Wouldn't it be great if it was as easy to do this as hitting a button on the screen? Wouldn't it be great if it was as easy to do this as convicting one fallen police officer?

The conviction of Derek Chauvin was not justice, but perhaps it was a wake-up call to the unjust systems of oppression that operate in our police forces, our judicial system, our economic sector, our educational sector, our business sector, and our cultural life. When we, as individuals and as communities, can begin to address the policies and attitudes that cause murders such as this to take place, then maybe justice can finally be done.

There are times when people ask why we bother with our Inclusion efforts at CUCC, and why the United Church of Christ spends so much time talking about Inclusion. This is a prime example of why we do what we do. Only by talking and studying and growing as individuals and as a congregation, can we hope for society to change. Only by doing our work can we hope for God's justification of the world to take place. By studying Inclusion, we are incarnating God's Justice in the World!

CHURCH COUNCIL NOTES

Secretary's Report (from our April 20th meeting)

The Church Council met in person at 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, April 20. We began with a discussion of the book, <u>Piloting the Church</u>, by Cameron Trimble, who is a pastor, pilot, and church consultant. The book lays out a plan to "transform your leadership and get your congregation flying toward a bold new future."

Agenda items included scheduled CUCC improvements for the safety of all, including upgrades to the church security system in late April and the repair of the shelter house floor in mid-May. In the summer we will move to a more efficient use of energy in the educational wing downstairs with the installation of new LED lighting.

The Council recommends resuming, with continuing vigilance, distribution of communion elements for those who wish to partake during the service on Pentecost, May 23. We will modify handling to keep members safe and to comply with Boone County COVID-19 guidelines.

A job description for a part-time custodian was approved and will be posted beginning in late April. This position was been vacant since Lloyd Viehland's retirement in early 2020. As we resume church activities & events in the upcoming weeks and months, this position will be increasingly important. The targeted start date is June 1.

Some new opportunities for volunteers have come up, including: training to help operate the Technology Booth during worship, planting & maintaining a garden plot, and brainstorming ideas to enrich our sanctuary visually. As we return to a new post pandemic "normal," we encourage each member to think of ideas you have—then join one of our dynamic committees/ministry teams to transform those ideas into action. Our upcoming annual congregational meeting on Sunday, May 16, will highlight CUCC accomplishments in 2020, both in ministry and

in service to the community, despite the restrictions of COVID-19.

A MATTER OF DIGNITY-BANNING "CONVERSION THERAPY" IN THE US

This July, the General Synod of the United Church of Christ will meet using Zoom technology to do the business of the church, one of which is to speak to Social Justice issues prevalent in our society today. This year there are 11 Resolutions that will be discussed and shared with Local Congregations for their discussion, as well. All eleven Resolutions can be read in their entirety by clicking here: **GS RESOLUTIONS**

One of the Resolutions that we will be discussing here at CUCC in June is a Resolution calling for a ban on the practice of "Conversion Therapy" in the US. The text of that resolution can be read in its entirety here: GS BAN

General Synod Resolutions of Witness do not speak FOR local churches; they speak TO local churches. They provide us with a theological framework to address Social Justice Issues in our communities, as the Prophets of our traditions spoke to the people of Israel about similar issues. It is up to us to process these issues and act as we feel the Spirit is moving us. We will be doing just that here at CUCC in June. An edited synopsis of the General Synod resolution is copied below:

Conversion therapy has existed in one form or another since the late 19th century. While the practice has caused demonstrable harm to the mental and physical health of LGBTQ+ persons, conversion therapy continues to be legal throughout the United States. According to practitioners of conversion therapy, the sexual orientation or gender identity of LGBTQ+ persons is a disease, defect or developmental disorder. This claim has been repudiated by every professional association in the field of health care, many of which have advocated for a ban on the discredited practice.

According to a report published the Williams Institute at the UCLA School of Law (June 2019), 698,000 adults in the United States have experienced conversion therapy, and 20,000 LGBTQ+ youth will be subjected to conversion therapy if state legislatures refuse to act. Also, according to the Williams Institute (June 15, 2020), LGBTQ+ people who were subjected to conversion therapy have shown a greater risk of suicidal thoughts and attempted suicide than LGBTQ+ people who had never experienced this therapy, including

- 92% greater odds of lifetime suicidal ideation
- 88% greater odds of attempting suicide
- 75% greater odds of planning to attempt suicide.

The consensus of the mental health care profession was summed up in the "Position Statement on Attempts to Change Sexual Orientation, Gender Identity, or Gender Expression" released by the American Psychoanalytic Association in 2012. They found: "Psychoanalytic technique does not encompass purposeful attempts to "convert, repair, change or shift an individual's sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression. Such directed efforts are against fundamental principles of psychoanalytic treatment and often result in substantial psychological pain by reinforcing damaging internalized attitudes."

BIBLICAL AND THEOLOGICAL RATIONALE: Biblical tradition affirms that all human beings are made "in the image of God." (Gen. 1:27) The church's witness affirms that "in Christ Jesus, you are all children of God through faith" and that "all of you are one in Christ Jesus." (Gal. 26-28) We are therefore to "love our neighbor as ourselves" (Lev. 19:9-18 and Matt. 22:40) and act with empathy towards all others. The capacity to love and seek love is God's gift to all human beings. Human love in its many expressions is therefore God's design for humanity, and is offered to all without regard to sexual orientation or gender identity. The psychological and spiritual damage inflicted by "conversion therapy" on LGBTQ+ people, especially youth, violates the image of God that is embodied in every human being, harms our neighbor, and denies to others the grace we claim for ourselves.

THEREFORE: (this is the part that is calling local churches to action, if they so choose) The Thirty-Third General Synod of the United Church of Christ, affirming the dignity and worth of all people, deplores the practice of "conversion therapy" or "reparative therapy" that denies LGBTQ+ youth and adults the opportunity to experience the blessings of love and human integrity, and urges parents, authorized ministers and care-givers in the United Church of Christ to protect those in their care from any practice or program that purports to "cure" their sexual orientation or gender identity, and urges congregations and all other settings of the church to advocate for state and federal laws protecting adults, youth and children from "conversion therapy" by banning the practice, and urges congregations and other settings to strengthen their efforts to reach their LGBTQ+ neighbors, especially youth, with the Good News that their sexual orientation and gender identity or expression are gifts from God.

In Matthew 6:25-34 Jesus says, "Do not be anxious about your life, what you eat or drink or wear. Is life not more than that? Look at the birds of the air: they neither reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow. They neither toil nor spin, yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these. Therefore, do not be anxious, saying, what shall we eat or drink or wear? Your heavenly Father knows that you need them all. But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things shall be yours as well."

When Jesus visited Mary and Martha, he told Martha not to be anxious and troubled about serving everything perfectly, but to listen to Jesus teachings. Luke 10:38-42

Again in Luke 12:22-31, we hear not to be anxious for your life and consider the lilies. If God can clothe them so beautifully, surely God will take care of your needs.

There are so many things in the world today that cause people to worry. It's normal to worry and be anxious about some things, but it can get out of control. Why is it so hard to stop worrying? When you believe worrying IS the problem you can face it.

- **Tip 1:** Create a daily "worry" period. Take 20 minutes each day just for worrying. You can write them down during the day, but only worry during the worry period.
- **Tip 2:** Challenge anxious thoughts. Do you look at the world as worse than it really is? Do you expect the worst-case scenario to happen?
- **Tip 3:** Distinguish between solvable and unsolvable worries. If the worry is solvable, start brainstorming. If the worry is not solvable, accept the uncertainty.
- **Tip 4:** Interrupt the worry cycle. Get up and get moving. Take a yoga class, meditate, practice progressive muscle relaxation, or try deep breathing.
- **Tip 5:** Talk about your worries with a trusted friend or family member.
- **Tip 6:** Practice mindfulness. I have a little plaque from childhood on my wall now that goes along with these thoughts. It's called Overheard in an Orchard. Said the robin to the sparrow, "I should really like to know why these anxious human beings rush about and worry so." Said the sparrow to the robin, "Friend, I think that it must be that they have no heavenly father such as cares for you and me."

Serenity Prayer by Reinhold Niebuhr-1943: God, give us grace to accept with serenity the things that cannot be changed, courage to change the things that should be changed, and the wisdom to distinguish the one from the other.

DESIGNATED FUNDS UPDATE

If you read the CUCC Annual Report for 2020, you may have noticed the Designated Funds Activity Report (page 61). It detailed the amounts that were received and disbursed from our Designated Funds in 2020. A more thorough explanation of Designated Funds Disbursements was also included on page 15. To highlight, some of the funds that were working for you in 2020 include the following:

50 for 50 fund: This fund received \$66,292 in 2019, in recognition of the 50th anniversary of this building. It was designated for five projects. So far we have spent \$50,474 on three of those designated projects: Sanctuary technology, sound system, and livestreaming equipment, (\$26,036); Landscaping Improvements (\$10,544); and encasing the Sanctuary eaves (\$7,265). We also donated a Biblical Tithe to four mission agencies (\$6,629). The two final projects, replacing the Shelter House floor (\$8,600) and upgrading our security system (\$7,000), will complete the 50 for 50 projects this spring. Hopefully both will be done before the Congregational Meeting.

Scholarship Fund: We awarded two scholarships in 2020 to Marcella Dolezal and Carissa Graves, totaling \$2,000. We added \$50,000 from the Mader Estate to this Fund, and with unrealized gains and growth, the fund total at the end of 2020 was \$147,574. This Fund will be used for more Scholarships in the future, as well as our Organ Scholar Program.

Building Fund: We have been growing this Fund in 2020 with contributions from members, a directed amount from 2020 Joyful Giving (3%), and directed Funds from the Mader Estate. As of the end of 2020, this fund totaled \$55,716, but more gifts in 2021 have been received. We are anticipating major repairs and replacement of HVAC units in the next few years, as well as a need to reseal our entire parking lot. Growth in this fund will allow those projects to happen.

CORONAVIRUS AND CUCC UPDATE

The pandemic is not over yet, and we must continue to be vigilant and safe as we slowly emerge into more inperson activities and public gatherings. However, as the month of April draws to a close, the 5-day average for new COVID cases in Boone County has dropped to 10 new cases/day! This is down from our high of 168 new cases/day, reached on November 8, when we decided to close our Sanctuary for in-person worship for the time being. In September and October, when we were worshipping in person, the 5-day average was 60-70 new cases/day. Currently, there are only 81 active cases of COVID in our county of 180,000 people.

Throughout this pandemic, the leadership of CUCC has been very vigilant, never lax in their monitoring and response efforts. The congregation has been exemplary, as well, following our new hygiene standards admirably, thereby limiting the transmission of the virus and keeping CUCC a safe place. As we move towards emergence together, let us continue to be vigilant in our efforts at living with the Coronavirus.

Moving forward, we will continue to practice safety protocols, guided by the Boone County Health Department and the City of Columbia orders. These include wearing masks and social distancing.

There is one way for us to fully emerge safely from this pandemic — vaccination. We hope that everyone receives their COVID vaccine, for herd immunity in our community and to reduce the risk of infection to even lower levels. For information about vaccination options, CLICK HERE.

CUCC IS WORKING ON THE US/MEXICO BORDER

Southwest Good Samaritan Ministries, a UCC/DOC Global Missions Partner, was established in 1985 with the specific purpose of providing assistance to refugees (primarily coming from Central America) seeking asylum in the United States. The mission of Southwest Good Samaritan Ministries is to teach the love of Jesus Christ by building a renewed sense of wholeness and dignity and by standing with those who have been traumatized, especially refugees and those who are disenfranchised and displaced. The Good News of salvation is lived out by addressing spiritual and material needs, including emergency shelter and food, clothing, transportation, legal aid, advocacy, and job referral through a cooperative effort with other agencies and religious organizations.

They continue their work by providing legal aid, shelter, food, clothing, and bus tickets for migrants so they can be with relatives in the U.S. until completing their asylum-seeking process. "We are always receiving caravans. Some attract the lens of the press, but migration from Ciudad Juárez is always flowing," said Rev. Feliberto Pereira, Executive Director. "Our deepest and permanent concern is the situation and the well-being of the children. We are more active in the process of providing legal aid to asylum seekers. Very recently, we stopped the deportation of a Peruvian woman, who had had four administrative trials while appearing at the Bridge in Ciudad Juárez, without success. In the fifth trial, we were able to intervene, and the woman was able to appear in court and successfully request asylum."

Southwest Good Samaritan Ministries carries out this mission through their work with refugees and asylum seekers. Working closely with the U.S. Department of Homeland Security and Church World Service, Southwest Good Samaritan Ministries has helped more than 20,000 refugees begin life anew by sharing the love of Jesus Christ through gifts given to refugees and asylum seekers whatever their need may be. Services offered refugees and asylum seekers include housing, food, clothing, legal aid, transportation, family reunification, and counseling.
