From the Pastor's Keyboard

"Why Celebrate Black History Month?"

February has been a time to focus on Black History in the United States since 1926, when Carter G. Woodson began a campaign to recognize it. Originally a week was proposed, the second week of February. This week included the Birthdays of President Abraham Lincoln (the great emancipator) on February 12 and Frederick Douglass (the former slave and activist in the cause for abolition of slavery) on February 14. Expanded to a whole month by (Republican) President Gerald Ford in 1976, Black History month has become a time to celebrate the achievements of Black and Brown Americans in the development of our country.

But why the need for Black History Month? Some debate this question, including some Black and Brown American scholars who claim that designating one month as "Black History Month" actually encourages the segregation of Black History from the common curriculum. They argue that we should encourage a more inclusive common curriculum that lifts up Black History all year, alongside the White History that has been taught for generations. Proponents of Black History Month argue that although the contributions of Black and Brown Americans **should** be integrated into the entirety of our historical curriculum, there is still a need to give Black History a designated month to focus specifically on their contributions, in light of the neglect Black History has received over the years.

I tend to fall on the side of the latter argument. I see the celebration of Black History Month as important for the same reasons we observe every other celebration all year long: History, Identity, and Dignity (Worth). The origins of every holiday we celebrate are shrouded in these three factors, from Christmas to St. Patrick's Day, and even our more personal celebrations. When we celebrate, we are recalling the **historical** significance of that date, we are articulating our **identity** as people of that event or practice, and we are claiming and elevating our **worthiness and dignity** as we set that day aside. Christians celebrate history, identity, and dignity when we celebrate Christmas; Jews celebrate history, identity, and dignity when we celebrate our birthdays. All celebrations are really about those three elements. Black History Month is no different; and no less important.

For example, when March 17 comes around, many of us like to wear green and eat corned beef and cabbage, even though we have no discernable Irish ancestry of which we are aware. We celebrate an event that originated in oppression. While St. Patrick's Day was a holiday in Ireland as early as the 1600s, its popularity is due to the Irish diaspora that were scattered around the globe during the age of colonialization and as a result of the Great Famine of 1845-1852. During that time, many Irish refugees found both sanctuary and oppression in North America, as they were welcomed but excluded, denied dignity and worth. These oppressed Irish refugees popularized St. Patrick's Day as a way to **recall their history, articulate their identity, and claim their worth/dignity** alongside those who were trying to deny them the same. This popularization led others to join in the celebrations, and today all nationalities recognize the name and history of an otherwise obscure Catholic Saint as they drink green beer and eat corned beef and cabbage. Rarely does anyone complain about lifting up the Irish people on St. Patrick's Day. Black History Month should be celebrated in similar fashion; a chance for all of us of every color and ethnicity to participate together in an exploration of history, identity, worth, and dignity.

The Inclusion Team at CUCC will be celebrating Black History Month all month long in February with special bulletin inserts and observances in worship. Tricia Price will be sharing several books during Children's Time that focus on Black History, and Alisa Lau-Sieckman will be lifting up some other prominent figures in Black History including Mary Field, the first Black Woman letter carrier; Kizzmekia Shanta Corbett, a professor of immunology who helped create the COVID vaccine; and Grace Dolan-Sandrina, an 18 year old Black/Latinx Trans activist. On February 20, in worship, we will talk about the book we read in January/February "Better, not Bitter" by Black activist Yusef Salaam. We hope you will join us for these special observances as we celebrate Black History Month together!

Those joining on Zoom were Sue Ann Schaefer, Kristy Odneal, Tricia Price, Kurt Heine, and Linda Neale.

- Pastor Rick introduced our new book for discussion called "Neighborhood Church."
- Empty spots were filled for stewardship duties for February and part of March.
- The chancel lighting is ready to be installed.
- Parts for the additional security on the south basement door should be here next week and hopefully installed by the first part of February.
- The sealing for the driveway is done, and rest of parking lot will be finished in the Spring/Summer.

FEBRUARY IS BLACK HISTORY MONTH

In celebration of Black History Month, I want to take a minute to honor the late Sidney Poitier; actor, author, and director.

His parents lived on Cat Island in the Bahamas and came to Miami often to sell their tomato crop. Mr. Poitier was born, 2 months premature, on one of those trips, which automatically made him a US Citizen. He spent his youth on Cat island.

I read his book, *The Measure of a Man*, multiple years ago, and parts of it are still with me. He carefully selected the acting roles that he accepted. His characters were always complex and fully developed via his talent.

In the 1968 movie "In the Heat of the Night," he plays a respected New England police detective (Virgil Tibbs) passing thru the deep south. He is subjected to racial profiling, but ends up being asked to help the local authorities solve a murder. In the course of his investigation, he has a pointed discussion with a local, rich, racist landowner, who slaps his character in the face. Mr. Poitier felt that his character would slap the landowner back. He felt so strongly about that scene that it was written into his contract that the scene could not be deleted from the film.

Mr. Poitier won multiple acting awards during his career. He was also a dedicated Civil Rights Activist and received the Presidential Medal of Freedom for his work in that area.

My personal favorite movie of his is "Guess Who's Coming to Dinner?" The plot centers around Mr. Poitier's character falling in love and wanting to marry a white woman. It was filmed in the mid 1960's when interracial marriage was still illegal in many southern states. The film has comedic moments, but mostly, it will make you think. The discussion that Mr. Poitier's character has with his film father, who is against the relationship, is riveting. Spoiler alert, it ends like this....

"Dad, I love you. I always have. I always will. But you think of yourself as a colored man. I think of myself as a man."

Black History Month

Music has been an integral part of the African American experience. Enslaved Africans were not allowed to sing the songs or beat the drums from their native land because their owners didn't want them communicating and sending secret messages, therefore a new genre emerge . . . the Spiritual.

There were many types of spirituals including: call and response, sorrow songs, jubilee songs, work songs, and freedom songs. In the beginning they were more like folk music as opposed to the concert spirituals to which we have grown accustomed. Spirituals had secret meanings hidden in the text. "Wade in the Water" meant to go into the water so that the dogs can't follow their scent. "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot" was about the conductors of the underground railroad coming to take them to the north. In "Steal Away" the owners thought they were singing about stealing away to Jesus, but they were really singing about stealing away to the north. There are many examples like those in Spirituals.

After the civil war, composers like R. Nathaniel Dett, Harry T. Burleigh, and William Dawson started arranging spirituals for the concert stage. College choirs such as the Fisk Jubilee Singers, the Hampton

Singers (from what is now known as Hampton University) and others popularized the genre by touring nationally and internationally. These songs come from a long history and have influenced several genres including blues, jazz, and gospel music.

The Music Ministry is looking forward to sharing this music with CUCC during Black History Month.

New Year, New Worship & Music

At this month's Council meeting, the Church Council approved hiring two section leaders for the Celebration Singers for a three month time period, roughly February 1 — May 1. This has been a request from both our former and current Music Coordinator/Choir Director to provide leadership in a couple of the sections of the choir as it is being successfully implemented in several other churches across Columbia. Pay for the positions will be \$30/session (rehearsal, worship); \$60/week. \$1560 (maximum) was allocated for this for the term (\$120/week x 13 weeks) from the Worship & Music Designated Fund. The integrity and professional discernment the Council (and we hope, the Congregation) is seeing in our current Music Coordinator, Brandon Brown, was a factor in their decision to go ahead with this plan. Council is looking at this as a "new idea" that they want to try for a period and see how it works; and if they like the results, look for ways to make it happen again this fall. If this program is successful this semester, they will bring it to the Congregational Meeting on May 15 for the Congregation's approval.

Phase two of the update to the sanctuary technology will begin this spring. New lighting will be installed to better illuminate the chancel, organ, and bell choir areas. These areas have long been the least lit areas when

they naturally should be the brightest areas. The addition of these lights will also improve the picture quality in our streaming, allowing the cameras to zoom in closer without the image getting "grainy." These lights will be similar to theatrical lighting and be suspended from the ceiling on two sides of the center aisle.

Phase three of the update to the sanctuary including carpet, windows, window coverings, other flooring, handrails, etc. is still in the works.

Human Trafficking is the recruitment, transportation, transfer, harboring, or receipt of people through force, fraud, or deception, with the aim of exploiting them for profit. The STOP Human Trafficking Coalition of Central MO (CMSHTC) has been working in the local and surrounding communities, combatting Human Trafficking, for over thirteen years. Visit our Facebook page to see upcoming meetings, events, and volunteer opportunities.

February is Black History Month. Did you know that, according to Grantmakers for Girls of Color, "40% of sex trafficking victims were identified as black women," and "compared to their racial counterparts, black girls are more likely to be trafficked at a younger age . . . Socioeconomic status is one of the top contributors [for this]." This source also states that an interview with the Urban Institute reveals that a trafficker would receive less jail time for trafficking a black individual than they would if the victim were white. (Source: Rights 4 Girls, Urban Institute, as stated in Black Women and Girls: Sex Trafficking in the U.S.)

In a world where we are fighting for equal rights for minorities, including women and black individuals, this news (sadly) does not surprise me, but it does further my knowledge that things must change, and my passion to be a part of that change. All people, no matter who they are, what they believe, where they came from, or where they are going, deserve the right to a life that is their own. Human Trafficking is also called modern day slavery. Black people have already been oppressed in this way and I will not stand for that history to be

repeated, nor for any individual to live this reality. Will you join me in the fight? Change starts with you!

Ronald McDonald House Charities

BIG MOVES ARE AFOOT AT RONALD MCDONALD HOUSE

(condensed from a letter to CUCC by Terri Gray, Executive Director of COMO Ronald McDonald House)

Mid-Missouri

As you may be aware, MU Healthcare made the decision to move Children's Hospital from Keene Street back to their main medical campus. While we understand their need to consolidate facilities, we firmly believe families should be within steps, not miles, of where their child is receiving treatment. Because of this, our Board of Directors has made the decision to sell the existing RMD facility and construct a NEW Ronald McDonald House close to where the new Children's Hospital Tower will be located.

We have a buyer for our current facility! St. Raymond's Society will take ownership of the house in early 2023. We are working with MU Healthcare to secure a temporary location to serve families until construction of our NEW Ronald McDonald House is complete.

Based on current construction estimates, less net proceeds from the sale of our existing facility, we will launching a campaign to raise an additional \$4 million for the NEW Ronald McDonald House. Located on the northeast corner of College Ave. and Stadium Blvd., the 27,000 square foot home will include 24 bedrooms, more communal areas, private spaces to relax and ample outdoor living space. The new facility will have six more bedrooms than our current house and will increase our space by 9000 square feet. This will allow us to serve more of our community in need. Plan now to participate in our "Building Love, Expanding Hope" campaign to raise the funds needed for this NEW Ronald McDonald House.

Families come to Ronald McDonald House in search of a place to stay within steps of their child receiving critical medical treatment. The Ronald McDonald House keeps families together near the care they need and that gives them hope—hope for a positive recovery, for seeing their child smile again, and for taking their child home. This move and expansion will allow us to serve more families and keep them close to their hospitalized children.

We will keep you posted on our progress; and you can keep track of what is new with our mission by visiting our website (rmhcmidmo.org). Please consider becoming a member of our RED SHOE SOCIETY. For only \$65/year, you can support Ronald McDonald House and receive regular news and updates about our work.

(Note from Pastor Rick: Ronald McDonald House in Columbia is a private, not-for-profit agency that is partners with the McDonalds Corporation, but is not owned or operated by them. They receive philanthropic support from McDonalds franchisees in this market and from donations made at the counter in McDonalds restaurants; but that only accounts for around 20% of their income. The rest of their annual income comes from fundraising events, such as pull tab collections, dinners, and from private donations and grants. Some people believe that RMD House is fully funded by McDonalds—it is not. 80% of their operating budget comes from sources other than McDonalds. They are truly a community organization!)

I-70 Drive NW 445-7931 Churches of the Missouri Mid-South Conference have travelled to Chiapas four times in the past six years, working alongside the Institute for Intercultural Studies and Research, one of our Global Ministries Mission partners in Chiapas. We have worked alongside them in towns and villages, learning about the people of Chiapas and the ways of life in the communities of Chiapas. We have also helped construct a new facility on the grounds at The Institute, a facility that has more than tripled their institutional capacity and ability to do ministry with the people of their communities.

<u>The Institute</u> is not the only Global Ministries Mission partner in Chiapas. On our last trip, we had the opportunity to work with another one of our Mission Partners, <u>Melel Xojobal</u>, an agency that works solely with children in need. <u>Melel Xojobal</u> means "True Light" in the indigenous Tzotzil language, and they focus on being a light of hope for children whose only other alternative is the dark of hopelessness.

The work of Melel Xojobal can be broken into three areas: early childhood work, support and advocacy for the rights of child workers, and work with young people. Melel Xojobal's early childhood work focuses on girls and boys from 0 to 4 years old. Melel Xojobal works with children and their parents to address topics such as nutritional, physical, and social skills. Their work with child workers seeks to defend the rights of indigenous children who work in the streets, markets, and public areas of the city. Melel Xojobal seeks to see the children's working conditions improved through self-care strategies and risk reduction. Melel Xojobal also works with young people ages 13 to 18 to encourage and promote healthy lifestyles and self-protection strategies that revolve around prevention of substance abuse, as well as finding dignified work.

Our next "Mission Trip" to Chiapas will be summer, 2022! We will leave St. Louis on July 8 and return on July 15. While we are in Chiapas, we will spend most of our time in the city of San Cristobal, working with The Institute and Melel Xojobal. We will have the opportunity to see several indigenous museums, including the Chocolate Museum, and immerse ourselves in the culture of Chiapas. We will spend time in the marketplaces, and worship at an indigenous church. We will learn about the life and context of the Indigenous Mayan communities that make up Chiapas, and we will even do some work; but work is not the focus of the trip. Education and relationship is the focus. The work will be suited for all abilities; all are welcome to come along, from age 16 up to age 90+! (Due to the nature of the trip, we are not encouraging anyone under 16 to participate.)

The cost for this trip is \$1450. This includes airfare, lodging for 7 days and 6 nights, food for that timeframe, transportation to and from the airport in Tuxtla Gutierrez and other transportation, and other incidentals. All expenses are included in that price, except souvenirs you may wish to buy. For a week long mission trip, it is very economical. Everyone who participates must be able to show proof of COVID vaccination, and have a current passport. We may have to take a COVID test before returning home, as well.

There is a limit of ten people for this trip – so make your commitment early! Due to transportation issues, we cannot have more than this number. If you would like to go, talk to Pastor Rick. He has packets with detailed information and registration materials. Registrations must be turned in by March 1. We will be purchasing tickets at that time, so get yours in early! Registration will include the completed registration form, a copy of your passport, and a copy of your COVID vaccination card.

This will be an amazing, life-changing experience! Make plans now to come along!



Melel Xojobal in Tzotzil, an indigenous Mayan language, means "True Light." They are a social organization founded in San Cristobal de las Casas, Chiapas, Mexico in February 1997. Melel Xojobal primarily works with indigenous populations through education, advocacy, health services, and community engagement.

During its first years, the organization focused on educational programs with children living on the street. Subsequently, their work has been transformed and expanded to contribute more effectively to the fulfillment of the rights of indigenous children, and other children and youth in situations of marginalization and social risk.

Melel Xojobal works with the indigenous children and young people of the state of Chiapas in the promotion, defense, and exercise of their rights through participatory processes for the improvement of their quality of life. They strive to be a sustainable organization with a focus on rights and gender perspective.

The work of Melel Xojobal can be broken into three areas: early childhood work; support and advocacy for the rights of child workers; and work with young people. They work with children and their parents to address topics such as nutritional, physical, and social skills. Their work with child workers seeks to defend the rights of indigenous children who work in the streets, markets, and public areas of the city. They also work with young people ages 13 to 18 to encourage and promote healthy lifestyles and selfprotection strategies that revolve around prevention of substance abuse, as well as finding dignified work. Their work seeks to change the conditions that exclude and marginalize indigenous children and youth.
