From the Pastor's Keyboard

"Epiphany"

As we head into January, we are still in the midst of the Christmas Season, but we are headed towards Epiphany, which is January 6. The word "Epiphany" literally means, "A moment in which you suddenly see or understand something in a new or different way." In the Christian Church, Epiphany is the day we celebrate the visit of the Magi. It is the "Twelfth Day of Christmas" (as popularized in that annoying song) and is always on January 6, the twelfth day after December 25.

On Epiphany, we celebrate the Magi visiting Jesus and the sudden epiphanies that incident brought to the world. Their tribute suddenly caused Mary and Joseph to understand the identity of their son in a new and different way. The proclamation of the angels to the shepherds caused the world to see things in a new and different way. The denial of Herod's majesty caused his subjects to see him in a new and different way. There are many sudden revelations contained in the story of the Magi and the gifts they bring, and those epiphanies are what we celebrate each year on Epiphany, January 6.

There is another thing we will observe on Epiphany this year. One year ago on January 6, armed terrorists, traitors to our nation, tried to usurp our government, overturn democracy, assassinate our leadership, and install a fascist regime to control our populace. The perpetrators of that event are just now being held accountable for their actions, and the repercussions of their actions will resonate in our world for generations to come. For the first time ever, for a brief time, domestic terrorists occupied the seat of our government.

The fact that this happened on Epiphany (sudden revelation) is not a coincidence. I believe the actions of these terrorists were a sudden revelation to our country that there is something very wrong in the way we interact with each other in the world. There is something very wrong with our collective obsession with individualism and our mistrust of community. There is something very wrong with the way we choose to interact with each other and the narcissistic tendencies that are so much of our national identity. There is something very wrong with the way we, as a country, have confused patriotism with nationalism.

In the world of the Magi, King Herod tried to convince them with slick talk and lies that they should pay tribute to him, not to Jesus. The Magi were Wise enough to see through the schemes of this slick charlatan and pay homage where it was due; to God, incarnate in the person of Jesus. In our world, many do not have the vision of the Magi. Many in our world fall victim to lies and manipulation that cause them to commit acts of domestic terrorism, such as the one we experienced last year on Epiphany. As we emerge from 2021 and the cowardly actions that ushered in the year, it is more important than ever that we have clear enough vision to call out those who would place fear over faith, anger and greed over humility and love. We must call them out so a new world can emerge into being, a world closer to the perfect vision of peace we see on Christmas.

The actions of the Epiphany Terrorists have nothing to do with a political party. They do not represent anyone other than themselves; and it is up to good people on both sides of the partisan divide to come together and call them out. This year, on Epiphany, I hope our sudden

revelation is not about how divided we are, but about how united we can be.

The Magi's faith in action suddenly revealed the folly of King Herod on that first Epiphany; the actions of the Epiphany terrorists last year suddenly revealed to us the many problems with our world today. What will be suddenly revealed as we emerge into 2022? Will we, as people of God, follow the way of the Herod or the way of Jesus? That is our choice this Epiphany and always.

CHURCH COUNCIL NOTES

The Church Council met on Tuesday, December 21, 2021. Those present were Pastor Rick Oberle, Brent Marcks, Jessica Lucas, Mike Pierson, Kristy Odneal, Lorry Dreier, Sue Ann Schaefer, Mark Duncan, Keith Birkes, Linda Neale, and Audrey Lasley.

- Mike Pierson led a discussion from chapter ten in the book, *Piloting Church*.
- Empty spots were filled for steward duties for Christmas Eve services and 12/26, as well as January.
- All parts for the new Chancel lighting have been received and hope to get installed the week between Christmas and New Year's.
- We are still waiting on a part for the additional security on the south basement door.
- Part of the driveway sealing project has been done (entryway) and the rest will be finished when LODO is on Spring Break or in the Summer.
- Another HVAC unit will be replaced 12/22/21.
- There is no change in church procedures pertaining to COVID.
- There will be a Sabbatical committee formed in January. It will have five members consisting of one representative from each team of Membership/Care, Worship/Music, Nurture/Education, Clergy Personnel Committee, and Council Personnel Committee.
- We received a total of \$25,585 for "Giving Tuesday." 5% went to City of Refuge and 5% to VAC.
- Pastor Rick encourages everyone to write a Google review for CUCC.
- A policy will be improvised to address virtual voting at Congregational meetings.
- A new sign for LODO will be placed at the church driveway entrance and also above the door where the LODO children arrive. Total cost will be \$2100. Donations have been received to offset this.
- The Worship & Music Ministry team submitted a proposal to hire section leaders for the choir. After discussion, a motion was made to table this proposal. Motion passed.
- Council approved Audrey Lasley to fill in as role of Secretary through the end of May.
- Pastor Rick encourages everyone to sign up for Eat With Eight.
- Ministry teams will be reviewing and setting new goals for the Five Year Strategic Plan beginning in 2022.
- It was reported that we are \$13,000 short of budget as of now. There is one more Sunday and two weeks of giving on Kindrid.
- Submitted Team reports were viewed.
- Cookies by the Pound brought in \$561.
- LODO t-shirts are in and being distributed.
- The Christmas eve offering will go to Mobility Worldwide.
- Blessing of the children during communion will start on Jan. 9.
- Passing offering plates during worship will begin on Jan. 2.
- The organ is in need of minor repair and maintenance. Pastor Rick is getting in touch with a representative and will find out information about a service contract.
- The next Council meeting is January 18.

MLK DAY CELEBRATED AT CUCC JANUARY 16 – SERMON SERIES

On January 16, we will celebrate the birthday of The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King by sharing in worship some of the wisdom he exemplified in his life. We will kick off a three-part series on this day looking at three of the aspects of "The King Philosophy for Nonviolence." On that day, we will talk about Dr King's vision of "The Beloved Community" and how it intersects with Jesus' vision for humanity and our call as Christians to make God's Kingdom Come on Earth, as it is in Heaven.

The next two Sundays we will talk about other aspects of <u>The King Philosophy</u> as we examine "The Triple Evils and Temptation" (1/23) and "The Six Steps of Nonviolent Social Change" (1/30). These principles will help develop the Gospel stories of Jesus' temptation (1/23) and the extravagance of the Wedding Party at Cana (1/30).

Dr. King often said that he received his inspiration from Jesus Christ and his techniques from Mohandas K. Gandhi; and the intersection of these two examples of Wisdom form a foundation for living a truly joyful life, devoted to God and God's Creation. Don't miss worship in January; this will be an exciting Sermon Series!

THREE YEAR ONA ANNIVERSARY JANUARY 27

On January 27, 2019, CUCC took a bold and courageous step forward – we officially adopted an "Open and Affirming Covenant" and registered with the United Church of Christ as an Open and Affirming Congregation. This move allowed us to proclaim who we are to a broader audience and allow more people to experience God's love in the world. Since that bold step, three years ago:


- We have received 29 new members (not including confirmation students; with them the number is 40 new members) most of whom joined this church because we are "Open and Affirming."
- We have participated in two <u>Pridefests</u> where we shared the news of our congregation with people hurting in Columbia, looking for a place to affirm them as God Created them.
- We welcomed many guests from historically marginalized groups who found new life and light in our worship.
- We hosted several book studies on LGBTQIA, racial and ethnic issues focusing on oppression.
- We brought inclusive artwork to our gathering and worship space, to proclaim visually who we are.
- We brought transgender theologian Austin Hartke to Columbia to share his wisdom with us.

We are just three years into this covenant, and we have done much, but we are just getting started! If you are interested in helping us live into this covenant, talk to <u>Pastor Rick</u> or <u>Tricia Price</u>!

BOOK STUDY ON EFFECTS OF SYSTEMIC RACISM TO START ON 1/13

On April 19, 1989, a 28-year old female jogger was attacked in Central Park, beaten, raped, and left for dead. The weeks following that incident led prosecutors to focus on five Black and Hispanic youth, all of whom were minors at the time and whose whereabouts for that evening were already established. Yusef Salaam was one of the five. He was convicted and spent six years and eight months in jail. In December, 2002, long after he was released, DNA evidence proved he did not commit the crime. He, along with the others, were exonerated.

Yusef's book talks about how he survived prison life being falsely accused, and how he became a better, not bitter person because of what he endured. We will study his book from 6:30-8:00 pm in the Fellowship Hall on January 13, 20, 27, and February 3. Copies of the book are available in the Church Office, or you can order a copy online or at your local bookshop. We will also be looking at other instances of people wrongfully convicted, and how the justice system oppresses minority groups. For more information, talk to <u>Pastor Rick</u>.

HVAC REPLACEMENT PROJECTS TO COME FROM INVESTMENT FUND

Have you noticed the two new condenser units outside the educational wing at church? We replaced two of our old HVAC units this fall. One is a new unit in the Fellowship Hall, the other is a new unit in the West LODO wing. Each unit cost the church \$7800, installed. We spent almost \$16,000 this year replacing old HVAC units.

We have a total of 17 HVAC units in our facility. Two are brand new; the other 15 units are 22 years old, greatly pushing the life expectancy of such items. Some of them are getting by just fine; others are held together with duct tape. We are planning to replace two units each year, but realize that there will come a year when we have to do more. The total projected expense to replace all units is \$170,000+. When the time comes to replace our Sanctuary units, that price tag will exceed \$70,000.

Where is the money coming from for these projects? Out of our Building & Grounds Designated Fund, one of our investments with United Church Funds. We currently have \$120,000+ in this investment account, but with \$170,000 in HVAC units needing replacement in the years to come, this fund could be depleted quite quickly. When an HVAC unit goes out, the need for replacement is urgent. We hope to increase the balance of this fund in the next year, so we can have funds ready for emergency situations. Currently, three percent of our Joyful Giving is put in this fund every month to help increase its value.

If you would like to contribute to the Building and Grounds Designated Fund to make ministry happen at CUCC, talk to <u>Sue Ann Schaefer</u>, <u>Brent Marcks</u>, or <u>Kristy Odneal</u>. This fund is great place to leave a legacy, remembering CUCC in your will. Many projects are coming up, and there will always be more maintenance issues in a building such as this. We need you to help keep things in tip-top shape. Thank you for your help!

CUCC HELPING AFGHAN REFUGEES THROUGH CITY OF REFUGE

<u>City of Refuge</u> is a local non-profit organization created to help refugees recover and regain control of their lives. They help refugees become productive, successful, and contributing members of our community. Many of them do not speak English, arrive with only a few pieces of clothing, and very little money. <u>City of Refuge</u> serves them by helping with immediate needs, building relationships over time, and helping them acclimate to the Mid-Missouri area and overcome the trauma and displacement they have experienced.

If you feel led to support the refugee and immigrant families that have come to our community, there are many ways you can be a part of the work of <u>City of Refuge</u> who is always in need of volunteers, as well as material and financial donations (check out their website by clicking on the blue links above).

CUCC made a donation of \$3,000 to City of Refuge for our Special Mission Project this fall. We designated 5% of our Giving Tuesday funds to City of Refuge as well, resulting in an additional donation that will exceed \$1,250. In addition to these, we also supported Catholic Charities Refugee Resettlement program with a \$2,000 donation.

We now want to collect items of Hygiene through January 9. Hairbrushes/Combs, First Aid Kits, Nail Clippers, Towels and Washcloths, Razors, Toothpaste, Toothbrush, Deodorant, Soap, and Lotion may be place in boxes labeled "Hygiene Items" in the Gathering Area.

Our Outreach and Advocacy Ministry Team is in contact with City of Refuge, and we also have a contact with a member at The Islamic Center of Central Missouri, where many of the Afghan Refugees will find community and faith partners. COLUMBIA CROP HUNGER WALK 2021

Celebrating 26 years of Walks in Columbia, we raised the most ever-\$20,555.66! Heartfelt thanks to all our participating groups and donors! Without you, we would be less supportive of hunger programs in Boone County and around the world through Church World Service.



<u>Together we are CROP – an interfaith Community Responding to Overcome Poverty</u> Columbia United Church of Christ was the top fundraising group in 2021, raising \$4,291.75.

However, we want to acknowledge that while the number of dollars is vital, it is not the whole story as many of our supporting groups increased their fundraising by double digit percentages over 2020. This effort proves that your support for our local food partners and CWS continues to be ever stronger in the face of great need.

Our generous total this year was made possible because most of our participating groups increased their giving this year: Calvary Episcopal (200%), Columbia Friends Meeting (49%), Columbia United Church of Christ (55%), Congregation Beth Shalom (103%), Destiny Worship Center (340%), Fairview Community of Christ (41%), Fifth Street Christian (183%), Hindu Temple Helping Hands (8%), Missouri United Methodist (60%), Olivet Christian (29%), Rock Bridge Christian (164%), Russell Chapel CME (250%), St. Luke United Methodist (120%), and Unitarian Universalist (2%). Churches of the Missouri Mid-South Conference have travelled to Chiapas four times in the past six years, working alongside the Institute for Intercultural Studies and Research, one of our Global Ministries Mission partners in Chiapas. We have worked alongside them in towns and villages, learning about the people of Chiapas and the ways of life in the communities of Chiapas. We have also helped construct a new facility on the grounds at Institute, a facility that has more than tripled their institutional capacity and ability to do ministry with the people of their communities.

<u>The Institute</u> is not the only Global Ministries Mission partner in Chiapas. On our last trip, we had the opportunity to work with another one of our Mission Partners, <u>Melel Xojobal</u>, an agency that works solely with children in need. <u>Melel Xojobal</u> means "True Light" in the indigenous Tzotzil language, and they focus on being a light of hope for children whose only other alternative is the dark of hopelessness.

The work of Melel Xojobal can be broken into three areas: early childhood work, support and advocacy for the rights of child workers, and work with young people. Melel Xojobal's early childhood work focuses on girls and boys from 0 to 4 years old. Melel Xojobal works with children and their parents to address topics such as nutritional, physical, and social skills. Their work with child workers seeks to defend the rights of indigenous children who work in the streets, markets, and public areas of the city. Melel Xojobal seeks to see the children's working conditions improved through self-care strategies and risk reduction. Melel Xojobal also works with young people ages 13 to 18 to encourage and promote healthy lifestyles and self-protection strategies that revolve around prevention of substance abuse, as well as finding dignified work.

Our next "Mission Trip" to Chiapas will be summer, 2022! We will leave St. Louis on July 8 and return on July 15. While we are in Chiapas, we will spend most of our time in the city of San Cristobal, working with The Institute and Melel Xojobal. We will have the opportunity to see several indigenous museums, including the Chocolate Museum, and immerse ourselves in the culture of Chiapas. We will spend time in the marketplaces, and worship at an indigenous church. We will learn about the life and context of the Indigenous Mayan communities that make up Chiapas, and we will even do some work; but work is not the focus of the trip. Education and relationship is the focus. The work will be suited for all abilities; all are welcome to come along, from age 16 up to age 90+! (Due to the nature of the trip, we are not encouraging anyone under 16 to participate yet.)

The cost for this trip is \$1450. This includes airfare, lodging for 7 days and 6 nights, food for that timeframe, transportation to and from the airport in Tuxtla Gutierrez and other transportation, and other incidentals. All expenses are included in that price, except souvenirs you may wish to buy. For a week long mission trip, it is very economical. **Everyone who participates must be able to show proof of COVID vaccination**, and have a current passport. We may have to take a COVID test before returning home, as well.

There is a limit of ten people for this trip – so make your commitment early! Due to transportation issues, we cannot have more than this number. If you would like to go, talk to Pastor Rick. He has packets with detailed information and registration materials. Registrations must be turned in by March 1. We will be purchasing tickets at that time, so get yours in early! Registration will include the completed registration form, a copy of your passport, and a copy of your COVID vaccination card.

This will be an amazing, life-changing experience! Make plans now to come along!



Missions

CUCC IS WORKNG IN BANGLADESH

Climate change is a major concern for Bangladesh due to extreme and regular cyclones, tidal flooding, and riverbank erosion, among other factors. The amount of saline in the soil and groundwater affects agricultural activities and creates a safe drinking water crisis. The Christian Commission for Development in Bangladesh trains farmers in innovative climate adaptation practices through Community Centers, which are operated by local residents. One

focus for the centers is safe drinking water. Community Centers provide capacity-building courses and provides funds to implement projects including climate change risk assessments for households, climate resilient agriculture, and livelihood opportunities, and installing technology to increase access to fresh water. Through these adaptive techniques, the CCDB is working on long-term solutions toward climate resilient communities in Bangladesh.

The CCDB is a Global Missions Partner of Columbia United Church of Christ through Global Ministries, our shared mission agency with the Christian Church/Disciples of Christ. Global Ministries provides foundational support for this organization and support for their ongoing efforts. Please keep Global Ministries and PCC in your prayers!



CUCC IS WORKING IN MEXICO

The <u>Roundtable of Mexican Partner Churches</u> (a <u>Global Ministries</u> Mission Partner) is made up of three denominations within Mexico. It is focused on the training of lay and clergy leaders for the growing number of congregations.

One of the Roundtables educational programs is the Summer Bible and Theology program. The Roundtable describes this program as *an experience of unity in the midst of diversity*. Drawing participants from across these three denominations, this program prides itself on creating a space for excellent biblical and theological education that is accessible to all. One goal of the program is to make continuing education for both laity and clergy a norm for those in the member denominations. Subjects include Biblical interpretation, pastoral care, and theology. The Roundtable is in the process of developing a diploma program in coordination with the Education Department from the Theological Community in Mexico.

The 2019 program was a witness to the important presence of young people in churches, not only as participants, but also as program facilitators and learners. The development of youth leadership is another top priority of the Roundtable. The summer program has evolved from predominantly adult participants to more youth and young adult participants.

The Roundtable is energized to continue educating clergy and lay members across Mexico and to build upon their growing youth participation. Since the spring of 2020 and the global COVID-19 pandemic, the Roundtable has adapted and is providing virtual education and educational resources now. The summer educational program for 2020 was postponed, but the Roundtable continues to plan for the future and hopes to continue offering its flexible virtual offerings even after it returns to offering an in-person format. We are praying for more in-person activities in 2022 as we emerge from the pandemic.
