From the Pastor's Keyboard



Being Thankful

In the 1980s, there was a commercial that ran in the St. Louis market for Tipton Appliances. In that commercial, the sales people were arguing over who had to unlock the doors for their Black Friday sale. One sales person, with a bandaged head, said to another "I did it last year." Another one with their arm in a sling said, "I did it two years ago." Someone said, "What about you, Joe?" The picture switched to a man, assumed to be Joe, in a wheelchair, bandaged head to toe. He just groaned. Finally, they convinced the new guy to unlock the door. He walks to the front doors of the appliance store with trepidation, and you see the crowd of people on the outside, banging on the doors to be let in so they could grab up all the Black Friday sales.

Black Friday grew from a joke in the 1980s to an obsession in the early 2000s. Black Friday took over Thanksgiving, with people forsaking Thanksgiving dinner with family to line up outside retail outlets, waiting hours to get the best deals. I remember one Thanksgiving around 2005 when our family was going from one house to another, visiting family for the Thanksgiving holiday. As we headed from my in-laws' house to my mother's house around 3:00 on Thursday afternoon we passed Best Buy. There was a line of people around the corner, at 3:00, waiting for them to open their doors at midnight. What happened to Thanksgiving?


Luckily, things have changed for the better. "Black Friday" is fading into a distant memory as seasonal discounts now start on November 1. Retailers have resumed the practice of closing on Thanksgiving Day. The supply chain "crisis" is actually more of an opportunity. It is an opportunity to shift our focus from obsessive greed to what really matters. Perhaps the COVID crisis helped us in that way. The light of truth has been shined on the more destructive tendencies of our culture; and we are forced to reevaluate.

So, as we reevaluate, how will we be thankful? How do we express our thanks? One way is through Giving Tuesday. This day was created as a response to the greed of Black Friday; a day to give back instead of accumulating more; a day to shift our focus from the material world to the world of service. Giving Tuesday is a day to lift up all that is good in the world, and support that good financially.

You will hear a lot about Giving Tuesday the next 30 days, not just from CUCC but also from other service agencies. There are two ways to look at the information you will be receiving. You can consider it an annoyance, or an opportunity. I would encourage you to see it as an opportunity to change God's world for the better by giving back generously. We have all been blessed with so much; Giving Tuesday is an opportunity to be Thankful.

Whether you give to CUCC on Giving Tuesday (November 30) or some other worthy non-profit organization, I encourage you to participate in that event. Expressing our thanks through time, talent and treasure is foundational to our call as Christians. Happy Thanksgiving!

- Explore ways to work with other UCC Congregations
- Explore ways to increase our advocacy efforts
- Explore possibilities of hosting a PFLAG chapter or a Grown Ones Day Out program for people with special needs
- Practice Inclusive Evangelism

CHURCH COUNCIL

CHURCH COUNCIL NOTES

The Church Council met on Tuesday, October 19, 2021. Kristy Odneal gave a summary of Chapter 8 of <u>Piloting Church</u> by Cameron Trimble. The author emphasized the importance of communication. Trimble described the call and response pattern, which ensures communication is understood from both directions. Ineffective communication sets us up for misunderstanding. Council needs an atmosphere of trust and understanding even though we may not always agree. We must use all modes of communication available to communicate as effectively as possible, including common forms of social media. People must hear a message seven times before they remember it. Getting a message out multiple times using multiple tools is imperative.

- Council members signed up for stewardship duties. The building should be opened by 8:30. The stewards serving as greeters, ushers, and worship leader should arrive by 9:00. The closing steward should arrive by 10:30.
- Communion stewards signed up for November 7.
- Pastor reported that the new Music Coordinator, Brandon Brown, began 10/1 and is off to a great start.
- Additional Security for south basement door will be completed when parts are received.
- Sealing parking lot will be completed next Spring or in the Summer when LODO is not in session.
- HVAC Unit will be installed when parts arrive.
- COVID-19 numbers are down. CUCC will not change its current mask policy at this time.
- Services on Christmas Eve will be at 4:00, 7:00, and 11:00.
- Cantata and banquet are on 12/12. Children's program is on 12/19.
- Council accepted the Strategic Plan 2021-2026 as presented by the Vision Team.
- Team leaders were reminded to contact people who showed interest through the Time and Talent worksheets.
- The Church received six new members. There are a few more people planning to join in early November.
- Council approved the Council Member Job Description as presented with one minor change.
- Bids from four snow removal companies have been requested. When received, the information will be communicated to Council by email. To expedite the decision, Council will vote by email whether to accept a bid
- The Western Association Meeting was on 10/23 from 9:00-12:00 via Zoom. Volunteer delegates are needed. The Conference Meeting is 11/6, 9:00-12:00, via Zoom. Three delegates are needed in addition to Pastor.
- Council accepted the proposed 2022 budget with a minor change. It is a deficit budget, due to Pastor's Sabbatical.
- With George Zimny's resignation as Chair, the Finance & Stewardship Team will need a person to complete his term through May, 2022.
- Council approved using the \$5000 designated for a Special Mission Project for Afghan refugee relief through Catholic Charities and/or City of Refuge.
- Council approved replacing a second HVAC unit with a cost not to exceed \$8,000.
- November 30 is Giving Tuesday. This year's goal is \$25,000, with 90% designated for Joyful Giving and 5% each for VAC and City of Refuge.
- Quilters asked to move their work space from Followship Hall to the back of the sanctuary. Council did not see this as a viable move, since all space in the sanctuary is needed for worship.
- All members are asked to do a review of CUCC on Google. The more people who review, the more the church will pop up in searches. On Facebook, it helps to SHARE rather than to just LIKE for the same reason.
- The current Confirmation Class started with six members. It is now down to three.
- Sunday will be the last Sunday for the Jaberg family. Pastor will have them come forward for recognition.
- Nov 7 is Quinn Rosenthal's ordination in Chicago. Pastor will contact the church to inquire what CUCC can do to recognize Quinn during the service.
- There is a deficit of approximately \$33,000 in Joyful Giving.
- LODO is selling T-shirts as a fundraiser. CUCC members are encouraged to support this effort. Their goal is to sell at least 75 shirts.



Managing the finances of the church has been challenging during the pandemic, and we are running behind the Joyful Giving budget number projected for this year. November 30 is Giving Tuesday. The goal will be \$25,000. The funds will be used for Joyful Giving, and 10% of the funds received will go to the local City of Refuge and the Voluntary Action Center. DEFICIT BUDGET PRESENTED FOR APPROVAL IN NOVEMBER

make Giving Tuesday a success.

For the past several months, the Finance & Stewardship Ministry Team and Church Council have been working with the CUCC Ministry Teams to prepare a 2022 Budget that reflects the growth and ministry opportunities of this congregation. The Budget, which was presented to the Congregation on October 24, is a Deficit Budget.

The idea of passing a deficit budget is uncomfortable for some, but there is a reason for our proposed deficit. In 2022, Pastor Rick will be taking a well-earned three month sabbatical. During that time, we will be partnering with a part-time Sabbatical Pastor who will lead the congregation in Pastor Rick's absence. At this time, we do not know what the compensation package for that person will be, but we are budgeting \$12,000. Our anticipated deficit for the 2022 budget is \$12,760, due to that sabbatical expense.

Over the past four years, we have realized a surplus of \$57,692 in excess General Fund revenue after budgeted expenses. Other years, prior to 2017, we have finished the year with an unplanned deficit. Though it is uncomfortable to actually plan for a deficit, there are times when it is prudent to do so to enhance and enable the long-term ministry goals of the congregation to thrive.

Copies of the proposed budget were distributed in worship and via email on October 24; copies are also available in the church office. The 2022 budget will be presented for approval at our Congregational Meeting November 7.

HVAC REPLACEMENT PROJECTS TO COME FROM INVESTMENT FUND

We have a new HVAC unit! In October, one of the two big units in the Fellowship Hall was replaced; the second one is still in need of replacement. At our October Council meeting, we approved replacing another HVAC unit (not sure which one yet) before the end of the year, at an expense not to exceed \$8000.

We have 17 HVAC units that are 22 years old, greatly pushing the life expectancy of such an item. Some of them are getting by just fine, others are held together with duct tape. We are planning to replace two units each year, but realize that there will come a year we have to do more. The total projected expense to replace all units is \$170,000+.

Where is the money coming from for these projects? Out of our Building & Grounds Designated Fund, one of our investments with United Church Funds. We currently have \$119,000+ in this investment account, but with \$170,000 in HVAC units needing replacement in the years to come, this fund could be depleted quite quickly. When an HVAC unit goes out, the need for replacement is urgent. We hope to increase the balance of this fund in the next year, so we can have funds ready for emergency situations. Currently, three percent of our Joyful Giving is put in this fund every month to help increase its value.

Many projects are coming up, including resealing our Parking Lot next year-\$15,000, and we need you to help make them happen!



DESIGNATED FUNDS AT CUCC

Did you know there are Ten Designated Funds at Columbia United Church of Christ? Each of these funds was created to enhance our ministry programs, reaching out to the community to share God's Love. Several of these funds are invested with United Church Funds, and have shown tremendous growth in 2021. All of these funds are open to contributions and are great places for stock donations or to be the recipients of estate planning.

Building and Grounds Fund: Invested with United Church Funds. This fund is the source for Building Improvements and repair. Replacement of our HVAC units will come from this fund.

Scholarship Fund: Invested with United Church Funds, provides \$1,000 college scholarships to CUCC members.

Transportation Fund: Invested with United Church Funds, enables our transportation/van ministry.

Chiapas Mission/Mayan Ministries Fund: Works to enable our mission with our ministry partners in Chiapas.

Memorial Fund: Receives donations in memory of friends who have died, for ministry programs of CUCC.

Nurture & Education Ministry Fund: Pays 1/2 camp fees for our youth to attend Camp MoVal.

Outreach & Advocacy Fund: A "fund of funds," this is the pass-thru fund for our monthly mission work.

Worship & Music Ministry Fund: Enables worship upgrades, such as our new sound system and Livestreaming.

Young Adult/Campus Ministry Fund: Provides ministry opportunities for CUCC Young Adults.

Youth Ministry Fund: Used for mission trips and other opportunities to enhance our ministry with our youth.

CITY OF REFUGE AND GIVING TUESDAY

The <u>City of Refuge</u> is a local agency that serves the refugee and immigrant families in our community with a variety of unique services that fall under three categories: Basic Needs Programs, Counselling, and Professional Development.

We are currently welcoming many Afghan refugees to our area, and <u>City of Refuge</u> is one of the agencies providing support for their basic needs. Sixty Afghan refugees have made Columbia their home in the past month, and we anticipate 200 more joining us in by the end of the year.

For <u>Giving Tuesday</u>, the CUCC Finance & Stewardship Ministry Team has set a goal of \$25,000. 10% of the funds raised will be given away (a Biblical Tithe). 5% will go to the <u>Voluntary Action Center</u> and 5% to <u>City of Refuge</u> to address the needs of Afghan refugees.

We hope that you will give generously to Giving Tuesday, knowing that your gift changes lives!

JOIN THE FUN AT THE FOOD BANK!

The Central Missouri Food Bank provides food to over 100,000 people every month in 38 Missouri counties. They rely on volunteer labor to do their work, and CUCC has committed to helping the fourth Tuesday of each month. Many thanks to Jo Ellen Grace, John & Brenda Muench, Phillip Neale, and Tricia Soncasie for processing 1500 pounds of pinto beans in November. For October, we had ten people signed up. HELP FOR AFGHAN REFUGEES

As an end finally comes to 20 years of war in Afghanistan, an estimated 75,000 Afghan refugees are coming to the United States to rebuild their lives. They are fleeing retribution or persecution from the Taliban and have one goal in mind: to live in safety. It is within our power to help them achieve this goal.

The United Church of Christ and Church World Service are both very active in helping Afghan refugees who are migrating to the US. If you would like to contribute to their efforts, click on the blue links above! Both agencies are very low overhead, and the money donated goes directly to the cause.

The Outreach & Advocacy Ministry Team is looking at how we can be a help here in Columbia. We have been looking at the work done by Catholic Charities and City of Refuge to aid in the Afghan situation. CUCC IS WORKING IN LEBANON


On August 4, 2020, a massive explosion at the port in Beirut, Lebanon sent shockwaves across the city shattering windows as far as 15 miles from the blast site. The disaster devastated a country already struggling with the Coronavirus pandemic, a severe economic and financial crisis, distrust in the government and assisting refugees from the decade-long

war in Syria. The Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) and the United Church of Christ mission partner, The Union of Armenian Evangelical Churches in the Near East (UAECNE), quickly assessed the damage to their schools, churches, elderly care home, social services center and offices, all of which were damaged. Repairs were initiated for roofs, windows, pulpits, doors, libraries, classrooms and playground equipment. Additionally, the UAECNE supported families by helping with repairs to homes and small businesses and offering healthcare to the injured. The UCC and DOC join with UAECNE in prayer for and support of the healing of the people of Lebanon.

The UAECNE is a Global Missions Partner of Columbia United Church of Christ through Global Ministries, our shared mission agency with the Christian Church/Disciples of Christ. Global Ministries provides foundational support for these organizations, and support for their ongoing efforts.

CUCC IS EDUCATING IN ARGENTINA

The mission of Ward School in Buenos Aires, Argentina, is to educate children and young people so that, aware of their transcendence and dependence on God, they can contribute to the society in which we live with ethical and Christian values.

The Ward School fosters an education that respects and promotes human dignity and asks students to think about the circumstances that impede or hinder the exercise of that dignity. The school provides an education focused on service to the community. Ward school believes that the education of a Christian Institution leaves no room for any form of discrimination; our differences are part of the wealth of Creation.

Ward School was founded in November, 1913 as a partnership between the Methodist Church of Argentina

and the Evangelical Church of the Disciples of Christ in Argentina. The Ward School's institutional mandate is to create "a Christian" school, of continued democratic inspiration, to serve as a bridge between the Americas."

Ward School currently offers education at six levels: Initial, Primary, Secondary, Upper Level, Special School, and the Adult Baccalaureate Program. In addition, Ward School programs focus on bilingual education and offers programs in communication, economics, administration, teachers certification, musical training, and management.
