

From the Pastor's Keyboard

'Freedom''

On **June 26, 2015**, our country became freer. For the first time in history, an entire community of people who had been excluded from legal marriage was recognized and affirmed, granted the freedoms so many others enjoy. On that day, marriage equality became the law of the land. It was a celebration for the LGBTQIA community, to be sure, but it was also a celebration for all US Citizens; for on that day, the practice of freedom in this country expanded a bit more into the ideal of freedom so many patriotic US citizens hold dear in their hearts.

The Supreme Court of the United States, in the case of Obergefell vs. Hodges, ruled that the due process clause and the equal protection clause of the fourteenth amendment to the US constitution guaranteed the fundamental right of marriage to all US citizens, including same gender couples. The ruling stated comprehensively that all 50 states and territories of the US must afford the same rights and responsibilities to same-gender couples as to opposite-gender couples. The idea of freedom grew larger with that ruling.

But on **June 24, 2022**, the idea of freedom in the US contracted critically. On that day the United States Supreme Court, for the first time in history, took away a constitutional right; one that was enjoyed by half the citizens of this country, the right for women to have access to comprehensive reproductive health care. The Attorney General of the State of Missouri, always eager to jump on an oppressive bandwagon, immediately declared access to abortion illegal, making Missouri the first state in the union to do so.

The backlash from this unprecedented ruling has been severe, with protests and demonstrations, angry posts on social media and bickering among friends. The issue of abortion, much more complex than most loud voices tend to trumpet, has become too polarized to fully explore; and people with diverse beliefs on the subject are labeled with extremist positions. This action of the Supreme Court, removing fundamental rights to health care that women have enjoyed for almost 50 years, has divided our country against one another even more than we were before. Perhaps that was their goal all along?

It would be nice to say that the cause of freedom is ever expanding; but we have seen in recent years that not to be the case. In fact, it seems that the cause of freedom expands and contracts; and as a country, it appears we are in a dark time of contraction. Freedoms are being taken away from us by an illegally packed draconian court, justified not by jurisprudence but by extremist religious positions. The question becomes, how many freedoms will we allow to be taken away from us? To be sure, the anti-woman ruling on June 24 was not the end of the contraction of freedom in this country. Associate Justice Clarence Thomas, writing in support of the majority opinion in this case, hinted that other constitutional protections, like marriage equity, will be next.

When freedoms were taken away from the Israelites under the oppression of Pharaoh, God sent a messenger in Moses to deliver them from oppression and bring them into a land where they could enjoy the freedoms denied them in Egypt. While this story brings us hope about God's provision in the midst of oppression, we cannot wait for another Moses to lead us away from the villainy of the sitting Supreme Court. It is up to each one of us to express our discontent with oppression and demand freedom. We must not sit, we must not wait, we must act.

This ruling was not the first time the Supreme Court ruled in error. The ruling against Dred Scott (SCOTUS ruling that the Constitution did not apply to Black people), as well as Plessy vs. Ferguson (SCOTUS ruling that racial segregation was allowed under the US Constitution) and Korematsu vs. The United States (SCOTUS ruling upholding the interment of US citizens of Asian descent during World War Two) are just three such times. Those erroneous rulings were eventually dismissed. Will this one eventually be dismissed as well?

This Independence Day, as we celebrate the idea of freedom, we do so realizing we are less free than we were a few months ago. Please keep all US citizens, especially women, in your prayers as we strive for freedom once more in this country.

CHURCH COUNCIL NOTES

The Church Council met June 21, 2022. Present were Pastor Rick, Kristy Odneal, Kurt Heine, Mark Duncan, Mike Pierson, Tricia Price, Lorry Dreier, Lydia Whitacre, Jessica Lucas, Keith Birkes, and Alethea Tennill. Kristy Odneal led the discussion on Chapter 5 of the book, *Neighborhood Church Sustaining the Vision*. One of the main points in this chapter is that we need to look at church from a Spirit filled perspective. We are spiritual beings in a secular world.

- Worship/Sanctuary updates: The Chancel lighting project is complete.
- Carpet samples are available for members of the congregation to view and provide comments..
- Building Project Updates: One HVAC system has been replaced. A second one is on order. A third unit is failing and will need to also be replaced this summer, as well.
- The sealing of the parking lot is in progress and hopefully will be completed in the next few weeks.
- Sabbatical Team: Jolene Kirchhoff is replacing Anne Heine on the sabbatical team. The team is getting ready to start a campaign in early July.
- The Nominating Committee: We are still looking for a Building & Grounds chairperson.
- The 100th Anniversary committee: The committee currently consists of Doug Privitt, Jolene Hackman, and Melba Shaffer. Other names were suggested and will be contacted to see if they are interested in participating.
- Council Retreat: Council Retreat will be July 6 at 6 p.m. at church.
- Two LODO classrooms will be painted this summer.
- Erika Maltsbarger has updated the LODO personnel policies. They were approved and adopted by the council.
- LODO is purchasing software that allows parents to check their kids in and out and gives them information.
- LODO floors need to be refinished. They have not been done for many years. Jerome Baker will redo the floors.
- Sabbatical Expenses: Report Submitted.
- Sabbatical Expenses for Pastor Rick for his trip to Mexico are estimated to be \$3000. The finance committee suggested that we pay these expenses from the Scholarship Fund. Motion passed.
- Vision Team; Kurt Heine will call a meeting in August with all of the ministry teams to discuss the 5-year plan.
- 2023 Ministry Team Budgets are due to Sue Ann Schaefer by August 31.
- The Combined meeting of Vision team and Budget will be moved to November 13.
- The Personnel Committee recommended to the council that we hire Caleb Berry as our new custodian on a 90-day probationary period starting July 1. Motion passed.
- The Chinese Gospel Choir has requested the use of our church for choir practice; Council approved.
- Camp Scholarships; Church will pay \$300 of registration fees for each camper to attend.
- Pridefest is September 24.
- Brandon is working on a proposal for a Messiah sing-along at our church in December.

The Clergy Personnel Committee (Judy Privitt, Pat Forward, John Graves) met with Pastor Rick on June 15, 2022. The quarterly meeting included taking the pulse of the congregation, discussing issues involving wider church settings (conference, association), as well as relational issues, if any, from Pastor Rick and the congregation. Specific issues for this meeting included an update on the Pastor's upcoming sabbatical and related tasks for the Clergy-Personnel committee. Also discussed was the recently completed pastoral evaluation for year 2021. The evaluations were completed by one member of each ministry team plus members

MUCH ACTIVITY AT CUCC THIS SUMMER

If you are around CUCC this summer, you may find a bustle of activity around the building! We are replacing three HVAC units, two that were scheduled to be replaced and one that decided to surprise us and quit. By fall, all three will be replaced. We are also sealing our parking lot; this project has begun and should be finished by the end of July. We are painting two LODO classrooms, preparing them for the fall. We are also refinishing the floors in the LODO classrooms, the lobby upstairs, the upstairs bathrooms and the stairwell landings. These will all be stripped and sealed, waxed and buffed by our regular cleaning service.

CUCC is a beehive of activity this summer, addressing maintenance issues and prepping our building for an active program year thanks to your generous financial support. Thank you for making this care possible!



CHECK OUT OUR NEW SIGNAGE!

The new LODO signs are installed! Now people passing by on Highway 70 and the Outer Road will know we have a preschool! The new sign gives the preschool phone number, so people can call for directions, and the church sign next to it has our website information.

We also have a new sign on the building, designating where the preschool entrance is. One of the major stumbling blocks for new people entering an establishment such as a church or church preschool is finding what door to enter. We have been trying to update our signage for many years. This is part of that initiative.

FINANCE AND STEWARDSHIP MINISTRY TEAM

I still remember back in 2020 when I couldn't pay cash at some of the businesses that remained open during the pandemic. Those restrictions have largely been eliminated now, but in 2020 it made me think about how I pay for things and how adaptable I can be in a new world. During 2020 and part of 2021, CUCC wasn't passing the offering plates on Sunday morning, so we had to adapt to new ways of offering our financial gifts to the church.

As Recording Treasurer before, during, and post-pandemic, I see that our congregation has adapted incredibly to the challenges brought on by the pandemic. We have found new ways to offer our gifts, or we modified our process based on the current situation. We have truly adapted to this new world!



INCLUSION AND AFFIRMATION MINISTRY TEAM

An Inclusive Environment Begins with Awareness and Intention

Americans with Disabilities Act was signed into law July 26, 1990. Last year we outlined the types of disabilities and the percentage of the population affected by them. This month, we are going to target a couple of challenges that affect individuals that we all know.

Tourette Syndrome increases each year by 200,000 individuals. This is a neurological condition that causes involuntary movements and sounds known as 'tics'. It often begins in children, but can be a life-long issue. Individuals may blink, shrug or suddenly make loud noises, talk incessantly, or say offensive words. Again, these expressions are uncontrollable.

Imagine being an individual in a quiet situation, such as a classroom or church service, and suddenly you shriek. People next to you will jump, everyone will look, and you are now the center of unwanted and unintended attention. People with Tourette Syndrome may protect themselves by avoiding, when possible, those group situations. They may surround themselves with family and friends who are "in the know" about their condition.

"All are welcome here" is CUCC's mantra. If something like Tourette Syndrome is holding you back from joining us, reach out. Let us be part of your circle of friends and family. Jesus welcomed all, as do we.

Another more visible (and rarer) condition that may hold people back from group participation is neurofibromatosis (NF). Sometimes NF is hereditary and sometimes not. It causes tumors to grow along nerves all over the body such as the face, skin, brain, spinal cord, eyes, etc.

These tumors may continue to grow, cause pain, and are quite vascular. They are also numerous. Thus, removal is often not possible due to nerve involvement, bleeding issues, and the sheer number of tumors involved. Knowing how "the public" ridicules individuals who are overweight or wearing the "wrong" clothes, imagine what an individual with NF must deal with while shopping in the grocery store, attending a movie, or just walking down the street.



CUCC members strive to love as God loves, without thought to background, sexual orientation, clothes, physicality, none of that. None of those matters. What *does matter* is: Faith, Hope, and Love. The greatest of these being **Love**.

UCC REFUGEE ASSISTANCE FOR UKRAINE

The United Church of Christ's support of refugees, and currently those impacted in Europe the last few months, have raised some concern on how we can help. One way we have done this at Columbia UCC is through the <u>ONE</u> <u>GREAT HOUR OF SHARING</u>. In addition, through our budget in Outreach and Advocacy, we made an additional contribution of \$1,300 to the UCC Refugee Assistance fund designated to Ukrainians. It is important to find organizations with a proven track record of financial management and ability to deliver aid. We have that resource serving the millions of Ukrainians who have sought refuge outside of Ukraine and others who have remained in the country but are displaced from their homes.

Gifts made to UCC Ukraine Relief Fund are providing shelter, food, and other care to war refugees and internally displaced people. It also will help refugees and asylum seekers from African, Middle Eastern, and other countries who had sought refuge in Ukraine and now are twice displaced, as well as citizens of more than 125 other countries living in Ukraine.

CUCC IS WORKING WITH WOMEN IN GUATEMALA (condensed from www.globalministries.org)

The National Coordinator of Widows of Guatemala (CONAVIGUA) is a Global Ministries partner, founded in 1988 as a response to the suffering of women in rural areas amid the internal armed conflict of Guatemala. These widows were women whose husbands, sons, and daughters had been either killed or had disappeared during Guatemala's civil war. They organized to fight to alleviate and solve the most immediate and urgent needs of food, medicine, housing, and clothing.

In their current advocacy, they work to address several issues. Much of their advocacy is centered on making the Guatemalan government accountable for their actions. This includes demanding that the government assures the education of all children by offering economic support and school supplies when needed. They also demand that the government create laws of protection for widows and mothers. Further, they ask the government to ensure that international aid falls into the correct hands, instead of the pockets of corrupt institutions and opportunists.

CONAVIGUA also works on a local level by developing projects that help Guatemalan women, allowing

opportunities for women to contribute to addressing societal problems. They also work heavily in exhumations of mass graves of victims of armed conflicts. They then offer dignified Christian burials that allow family and friends to honor those who have passed.

In all of this, they demand that their voice is heard and recognized in the political, economic, and social life of Guatemala as they advocate on behalf of those who are oppressed and marginalized.
