"Lenten Vision"

Lent is officially here. Ash Wednesday ushered in the Lenten Season, and we are in the midst of the 40 days (plus Sundays) of Lent. So what are you going to do to observe Lent?

As early as the second century, Christians began observing a period of fasting prior to Easter. This time was spent reflecting on Jesus' sacrifice and preparation for the notable observances of Holy Week. When Christianity was sanctioned by Emperor Constantine in the fourth century, Lent took on an even greater purpose; to prepare catechumenate Christians for baptism and entry into the church. Novices would spend months being educated in the ways and doctrines of the church, but the 40-day period prior to Easter would be a time of intense study, dedication, and sacrifice. Easter Sunday would then be the day the catechumenate would be baptized and become members of the church.

In the centuries since, Lent has become more focused on penance and reflection than on preparation for baptism or preparation for church membership. Christians have used the time of Lent to reflect on Christ's life and ministry, specifically the final week/weeks of Christ's life as he headed toward and entered Jerusalem. While the church may focus on Old Testament lessons or Epistles during the rest of the year, Lent is specifically dedicated to focusing on Christ.

This year in worship, we are focusing on Christ's ministry through the lens of the Gospel attributed to John. The author of this Gospel wrote a narrative that is very different than the other three; his Gospel is very focused on the Divinity of Christ and the very real presence of God in Jesus. As we explore the Gospel attributed to John, we will explore how the early disciples adopted the Vision that Jesus shared with them through parable, proclamation, and action. We will begin with Jesus calling disciples (in a way that differs from the synoptic Gospels) and how John the Baptizer played a significant part in articulating the vision that inspired those first disciples to follow Jesus. Our Lenten Vision series will continue with stories about Nicodemus, the Samaritan woman at the well, a blind man with his sight restored, and the story of Mary, Martha, and Lazarus. Through them all you will be encouraged to articulate your Lenten Vision as well.

Traditionally, during Lent, the church has encouraged people to "give something up." This is to model humility and focus on our understanding of God's grace in our lives during the 40 days of Lent. The early church imposed dietary restrictions on people. Faithful church members were only allowed to eat one meal a day, after sunset, and fast during the rest of the day. These practices evolved over the years so some people would give up only foods that they particularly craved; such red meat or caffeine. Eating fish became a common practice during Lent to observe this idea of fasting. One of my Lenten practices in years past was to give up Diet Dr. Pepper for Lent (back when I used to drink soda). The idea of this practice was that sacrificing some of our pleasures reminds us of the sacrifice Jesus exemplified at the time of crucifixion.

This year, I want to ask you to take a different approach to Lent. Instead of sacrificing something, how about taking on something new? Dedicate yourself to praying more; to going to church more often; to spending more time reading the Bible. Here is a thought– the Gospel attributed to John has 21 chapters and there are 40 days of Lent (plus 6 Sundays; so– 46). If you read a chapter every other day, that Gospel could be your Lenten guide. Read a chapter one day, journal your thoughts, then read the same chapter the next day. Do new thoughts arise? If you do this, you could read the whole book in 42 days.

Don't let the season of Lent pass you by! Spend some time with Jesus this Lent and work on refining your Lenten Vision.

WHAT IS LENT?

- Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, lasts 40 days, and ends just before Easter.
- In most Protestant traditions, Lent ends on Holy Saturday evening, but in some traditions Lent ends on Maundy Thursday evening.
- Sundays are not "included" in the 40 days of Lent.
- During Lent, we remember Jesus in special ways
- Lent is a time to think about Jesus' life; to think of some ways we can be more like Jesus.
- Lent is a time to give to others to remind us of what Jesus gave to us.
- Lent is a time to remember Jesus' last week; from his Triumphal entry into Jerusalem, through his betrayal, arrest and crucifixion, through the Resurrection of Easter.
- Lent is a time to make sacrifices, to spend time reflecting on Jesus' ministry with us and to be humble, remembering God is God and we are not.
- Lent is also a time we can take on something new, instead of sacrificing. What are some new things you can take on? Maybe more time spent in prayer, going to church, or studying the Bible?
- Just as Advent prepares us for Christmas, Lent prepares us for Easter (which is April 12 this year).

MODERATOR'S MOMENT



Greetings and many blessings to everyone! As this year's council gets underway we are coming together as a group, setting aside our individual priorities and focusing our efforts on the shared goals of our church family. One of the ways in which I pray that we can be effective at our tasks is to truly focus on strengths rather than our weaknesses.

As a Council we will be taking a closer look at a book titled, "Living our Strengths: Discover your God-given Talents and Inspire your Community." As we embark on this journey, I shared the devotional reprinted below with Council and I want to share it with you. This was written by Rodney Cox and posted November 5, 2013. The words, actions, and scripture really resonate with me. As we enter the season of Lent, and in March highlight the ways in which we are good stewards of God's gifts, I think it is great to reflect how understanding our God-given strengths can help us accomplish God's work in the world.

"Understanding Your Strengths-Focus on the A's, Not the F's."

Your weaknesses or your strengths: which are easiest for you to recognize? To find out, try this exercise. On one side of a 3 x 5 index card, record your three greatest weaknesses. Turn the card over. On the second side, write down your three greatest strengths. Which list was easiest for you to write?

If you're like most people, you are already an expert when it comes to identifying your weaknesses and failings. In fact, you may have had to limit yourself to just three items on your "weakness" list. But when it comes to identifying and articulating your strengths, most of us have a harder time.

Although it's normal for people to focus on areas in which they're weak, it's not God's intention.

A recent Gallup poll underscored our orientation for weaknesses over strengths. Researchers presented parents with a scenario in which a child brings home a report card with the following grades: an A in English, an A in social studies, a C in biology, and an F in algebra. When asked, "Which of these grades would you spend the most time discussing with your son or daughter?" 77% of the parents chose to focus on the F in algebra. Meanwhile, just 6% focused on the A in English and only 1% focused on the A in social studies.

The carefully-worded question sought to discover what draws parents' attention and how they invest their time; developing a child's strengths or compensating for a child's weaknesses. Parents in the study invested 11 times more time addressing weaknesses than strengths. Answers revealed an orientation towards weakness, even while A's in both English and social studies represent strengths in processing information, communicating well, and analyzing material.

Our human perspective is skewed toward weakness, even to the detriment of cultivating our strengths.

To orient yourself to your weaknesses and ignore your strengths may be commonplace. Yet in doing so you deny both the uniqueness in how God made you and the power of God working through you.

Whatever strengths you possess have been woven into your being by God with the express purpose of imparting God's grace to the world around you. The Apostle Paul underscored this truth: "For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works" (Ephesians 2:10, NIV). Naturally, Christ-followers are called to face weaknesses head on and seek to overcome them. Yet we're also specifically called by God to identify, cultivate, and use our strengths.

In other words, God tells us to focus on the A ... not the F. Look at the index card on which you recorded your strengths on one side and your weaknesses on the other. You may be tempted to leave the weakness side face up on your desk. Don't leave it. Flip it; and focus on your strengths instead.

GATEWAY OPEN AND AFFIRMING ANNUAL CONVOCATION "LIFE CHANGING AND LIFE SAVING"

The Gateway Open and Affirming Annual Convocation will be held on Saturday, March 7, 2020 from 9:00 a.m.-4:00 p.m. at Parkway United Church of Christ in West St. Louis County. MMSUCC WOMEN'S RETREAT

The 2020 Missouri Mid-South Women's Retreat will be at Camp MoVal May 1-3, 2020. The program is "de Colores" and features Lois Werner, a member of Southwood UCC who has spent many years in mission with the people of Guatemala. In 1991 Lois made her first of many trips to Guatemala. She loved the country, but the profound poverty gnawed at her. When her husband, Ken, retired in 2006, the two decided to spend some time there. In November 2008, they made their move permanent.

Residing in Guatemala, they could not ignore what they saw. In every village there was an absence of running water and medical care, along with chronic malnutrition in children, houses with dirt floors, women cooking over open fires, and contaminated drinking water causing diarrhea and death in children.

The couple founded "People for Guatemala, Inc." in 2010 for the purpose of raising awareness and donations in the United States for projects in Guatemala. The couple volunteer their time for this organization as well as the Guatemala organization "Hombres y Mujeres en Accion." Come hear Lois tell her story at the Women's Retreat, and experience spiritual care and worship opportunities. For registration information, pick up a brochure in the church office. SEMINARY SUNDAY AT CUCC

On March 29 we will have a special guest in worship with us; Rev. Mary Schaller Blaufuss, the Vice President for Institutional Advancement at Eden Seminary will share news and information about Eden with us.

Eden Seminary has a special place in our hearts as the "school of the church" that formed so many of our church leaders, including Pastor Rick. CUCC member Rev. Dr. John Bracke was Professor of Old Testament at Eden for a number of years; and many of our CUCC members have gone on to ministry, receiving their Education at Eden. Eden Seminary is definitely an institution near and dear to many of us.

Eden Theological Seminary was established in the summer of 1850 in Marthasville, Missouri, to fit the needs of frontier churches. These Evangelical congregations required better-educated pastors who were less focused on European traditions and more suited to North American religious life.

An ecumenical spirit lies at the heart of Eden, the seeds of which were planted from the very start. A Methodist and Mennonite joined six Evangelicals to form the very first graduating class of Eden. The hard work of that first class laid the foundation for Eden to branch out west of St. Louis, serving more frontier congregations and in turn recruiting new students who discovered their own calling.

Since then, Eden has actively pursued the progressive Christian movement. To fit the growing urbanization of the country, Eden moved to the outskirts of St. Louis in 1883. The Seminary's first African American student enrolled in 1933, and the next year Eden merged with Central Theological Seminary and Oakwood Institute of Cincinnati, Ohio. Eventually this partnership and a continued focus on ecumenical discussion, which included Eden President Samuel D. Press, lead to the formation of the United Church of Christ in 1957. In 1965, Cardinal Joseph Ritter of the St. Louis Archdiocese was the first Roman Catholic Cardinal to address a Protestant Seminary graduating class.

Now and throughout its history, Eden affirms that Christian faith and critical scholarship are compatible and dedicated discipleship is neither alien nor hostile to the truth of love. Faith is nurtured and openly affirmed at Eden, and we feel these discussions will serve us well into spreading the greater good into the twenty-first century and beyond.

Join us in worship on March 29 as we celebrate the CUCC/Eden Seminary connection! A special offering will be received to benefit the programs at Eden.

As you can see by the two graphs above, Joyful Giving for 2020 has been significantly lower than budgeted. While December 2019 was the largest month for giving in the past five years, January and February 2020 have been the lowest two months for giving in the past five years. As of January 31, Joyful Giving was behind by **\$9275.12**. At the end of February we anticipate being approximately \$20,800 *behind* in giving for 2020 compared to what we have budgeted. We are hoping for significant contributions to be received in March and April to offset the low giving in January and February.

CUCC SCHOLARSHIP FUND NOW ACCEPTING APPLICATIONS

Did you know there is a new fund at CUCC? The Memorial Education Fund, established in 1972 by Professor H. H. Krusekopf and contributed to over the years by many others, has been redefined as "The Columbia United Church of Christ Scholarship Fund." (The new definition of this fund is available on request; copies are on the wooden rack by the Sanctuary doors.) With this new definition, scholarships awarded from this fund are available to all active members of the congregation who are pursuing an education beyond High School.

There is an application process and qualification criteria. Application forms are available in the church office. All applications are due by April 1, 2020, and will be considered by a team composed by the Vice Moderator, the Nurture and Education Ministry Team Chair, the Finance and Stewardship Ministry Team Chair, and Pastor Rick. Awards from the fund will be disbursed after July 1 for the fall semester.


