From the Pastor's Keyboard ...

"King Protea and the New Year"

On September 23-24, 1989, Columbia United Church of Christ celebrated our 20th anniversary at this location. On Saturday, September 23, there was a fellowship dinner with reminiscence and good food. Rev. Jerry Jordan and his family returned, and many folks brought pictures of the past.

Sunday morning, September 24, 1989, the congregation celebrated again in worship. On that occasion, they also celebrated the joy of burning the mortgage on this building, a loan they had been paying off since 1969. In honor of the occasion, Ed Kaiser presented the church with a King Protea plant. This plant is the national flower of South Africa and has a unique quality. It not only survives, it thrives in the aftermath of wildfires.

When a King Protea plant is part of a wildfire event, the aftermath of the fire causes the seeds of the plant to be distributed across great distances. The young seeds take root in the burnt soil, and the nutrients from the burning actually aid in the new plant growth. A few months after a wildfire event, the ground is covered with King Protea plants. Ed used this analogy to illustrate the growth that he anticipated happening at CUCC in the aftermath of the mortgage burning. The nutrients of the fertile ground that had been prepared in those twenty years would lead to a great flowering of CUCC.

What happened next was incredible! This church grew, spiritually, as well as numerically. Rev. Brandenburg led this congregation in both celebrating the past and embracing to the future. We learned to be a voice for justice and righteousness in our context. We remodeled the Sanctuary that year (1989) and added an educational wing (1999) as well as our LODO preschool ministry (2002). We grew in many exciting ways.

Fast forward to 2023. We are emerging from a wildfire of sorts in our world today, as well. The COVID pandemic has ravaged our country to a great degree, burning our entire culture to the ground in many ways. Now that the pandemic phase of our relationship with COVID is over, and we are in the managed phase (thanks to the COVID vaccines, God's divine intervention), we are rebuilding from the ashes. Like the King Protea plant, we have the opportunity to scatter our seeds to the winds, causing God's will to blossom and grow all over our context. In the ashes of COVID, the opportunity for new spiritual life is present.

In the past three years of pandemic, expression of faith have changed greatly. Many people discovered a yearning for spiritual connection during this time and are now searching for a progressive faith expression such as ours. Others, who had been active church-goers prior to the pandemic, have drifted away from their faith. Our faith expression as a church has changed, most notably in our online expression, but also in the way we interact day to day. We are growing and blossoming in the aftermath of the COVID wildfire.

We are now entering a new year. The year 2023 stretches out before us with hope and possibilities. This year for CUCC is very much like 1989 was. We will be introducing a campaign for Sanctuary remodel, just as this




church did in 1989. We are celebrating an anniversary (100 years as a congregation), just as they did in 1989. And just like in 1989, we are rebuilding: not from the ashes of the mortgage burning, but from the ashes of the COVID pandemic.

It was expressed at that 1989 celebration that "the best is yet to come for CUCC," and in many ways, that was true. The next 15 years or so were a golden age for this church and for God's will being done in this context. I feel that we are entering another golden time for this church, and as we spend this entire year celebrating and blossoming, I think that phrase is fitting once again, "the best is yet to come for CUCC" as we celebrate our past and embrace our future.

If worship is not cancelled, but you feel unsafe venturing out, please stay




home. We will still be livestreaming every Sunday, so you can always enjoy worship from home. You can also view the worship at a time other than 10:30! Past worship services are all on our website.

do about them. *How to Heal Our Divides* features organizations that are taking real action to address these issues and heal divides in effective and practical ways. See how you can help make the world a better place."



Blessings to All as We Enter 2023

The Open and Affirmation Team strives to assist in the welcoming mission of CUCC. We also strive to enlighten and educate on historical and current events. The month of January is set aside as a month to consider what we can do to help those living in poverty, as well as Martin Luther King's vision of peace and prosperity through equality.

Per the US Census of January 2022, 37.2 million Americans live in poverty. To try and put that number into perspective: the entire population of Missouri, in 2022, was just over 6 million. How is poverty measured? By Census Bureau criteria, it involves income, size of family, and inflation index. What does living in poverty look like? By the Family Resources website it means: being "food insecure" or not knowing where your next meal will come from; inability to afford electricity to heat in the winter and cool in the summer; and dependence on public transit which limits ability to get groceries or attend appointments and/or get to work on time.

There is also the issue of homelessness. In the book "Evicted" by Matthew Desmond, a professor of sociology at Princeton, he states, "Without a home, everything else falls apart." Published in 2016, Desmond follows 8 families in Milwaukee that struggle to keep their homes due to being impoverished. One can only imagine how the pandemic has escalated homelessness, food insecurity, etc. for those who were struggling prior to Covid. We will highlight more from Matthew Desmond in bulletin inserts. Spoiler alert: in his research he has found that Habitat for Humanity, and the low-cost housing it provides, makes huge strides in providing relief to individuals living in poverty. Smaller house payments means more money for food, clothing, school supplies.

Be assured that our congregational support for Habitat for Humanity, the food bank, local shelters, and schools make a huge positive impact in people's lives. Our work continues ... As long as poverty, injustice, and gross inequality persist in our world, none of us can truly rest. Nelson Mandela

ONE HUNDRED YEARS OF MINISTRY IN COLUMBIA! The 1920s – the Beginning of Our Congregation

One hundred years ago, a lot was happening in Columbia that would affect us as current members of Columbia United Church of Christ. The Heritage Team will be sharing parts of the story each month in 2023 to celebrate our 100th anniversary. This month, we are looking at the 1920s.

A name to remember is Professor H. H. Krusekopf. He was instrumental in getting students and faculty together who had similar beliefs. He attended an Evangelical Church back home. In 1921, Professor Krusekopf held prayer meetings, hosted speakers, and led worship services in his home, at the YMCA, and at the University of Missouri, where he was a professor in the soils department, School of Agriculture. Other leaders at this time were Ella Parmeier, Elsa Nagel, and Caroline Brautigam. These four started our congregation and were still very involved at our church well into the 1960s.

On January 23, 1923, the group was formally organized, calling themselves "The Evangelical Club." They were officially a mission of the Evangelical Synod of North America (one of the predecessor bodies of the United Church of Christ), providing a college ministry in Columbia on behalf of the Synod.

The first newsletter of the Evangelical Club, dated November 22, 1925, did not have a name, but by the second month, it was "The Elevator." In 1957, the name changed to "The Headliner." "The Communicator" came later.

A motto of the Evangelical Club in 1925 stated their identity and purpose: "To strive after righteousness; to seek only the good in each other; to find the true meaning of life in service; and not to yield to less than the best that is in us." This motto can be just as meaningful to us today as it was back then. Another motto from the 1925 newsletter: "A person cannot sow vice and reap virtue."

The Evangelical Club grew and asked for a permanent pastor. The Evangelical Synod sent an Eden Seminary graduate, Ralph Abele, to serve as part-time pastor while doing graduate work at Mizzou. Meetings were held at the Bible College of Mizzou. He was in Columbia two years and got the group planning for the future.

The next pastor was Waldo Berlecamp in 1927. He instituted two Sunday services: one in the morning and a Sunday evening social service with discussions, speakers, and vespers.

In 1926, the congregation discerned a need for a building of their own to help serve the students, faculty, and residents. In 1926, a Building Fund was started, but it would be 1933 before a facility was constructed on Hitt Street. In 1928, the Evangelical Women's Club, the predecessor of our Women's Fellowship, began meeting.

The Heritage Team is excited about all that is happening this year. Check out next month's Communicator to find out what happened in the 1930s.

MISSION WITH CHIAPAS – IMMERSION EXPERIENCE 2023, JUNE 8-15

Churches of the Missouri Mid-South Conference have travelled to Chiapas four times in the past six years, working alongside the <u>Institute for Intercultural Studies and Research</u>, one of our Global Ministries Mission partners in Chiapas. We have worked alongside them in towns and villages, learning about the people of Chiapas and the ways of life in the communities of Chiapas. We have also helped construct a new facility on the grounds at <u>The Institute</u>, a facility that has more than tripled their institutional capacity and ability to do ministry with the people of their communities.

<u>The Institute</u> is not the only Global Ministries Mission partner in Chiapas. On our last trip, we had the opportunity to work with another one of our Mission Partners, <u>Melel Xojobal</u>, an agency that works solely with children in need. <u>Melel Xojobal</u> means "True Light" in the indigenous Tzotzil language, and they focus on being a light of hope for children whose only other alternative is the dark of hopelessness.

When I was on Sabbatical in October, I spent a month living in Chiapas, in the city of San Cristobal, working with **The Institute** and **Melel Xojobal**. I was able to fully immerse myself in their work and develop an even greater understanding of the culture, the mission, and the identity of the people of Chiapas. I am very excited to return to Chiapas, and I hope you will join me!

Our next "Mission Trip" to Chiapas will be the summer of 2023! We will leave St. Louis on June 8 and return on June 15. While we are in Chiapas, we will spend most of our time in the city of <u>San Cristobal</u> working with <u>The Institute</u> and Melel Xojobal. We will have the opportunity to see several indigenous museums, including the Chocolate Museum, and immerse ourselves in the culture of Chiapas. We will spend time in the marketplaces and worship at an indigenous church. We will learn about the life and context of the Indigenous Mayan communities that make up Chiapas, and we will even do some work, but work is not the focus of the trip. Education and relationship are the focus. The work will be suited for all abilities; all are welcome to come along, from age 16 up to age 90+! (Due to the nature of the trip, we are not encouraging anyone under 16 to participate yet.)

The cost for this trip is \$1500. This includes airfare, lodging for 7 days and 6 nights, food for that timeframe, transportation to and from the airport in Tuxtla Gutierrez and other transportation, and other incidentals. All expenses are included in that price except souvenirs you may wish to buy. For a week-long mission trip, it is very economical. **Everyone who participates must be able to show proof of COVID vaccination and boosters** and have a current passport. I will be talking more about this trip during our Contemporary Adult Education class January 8 & 15. I hope you will join me for these two sessions.

There is a limit of ten people for this trip – so make your commitment early! Due to transportation issues, we cannot have more than this number. If you would like to go, talk to me (Pastor Rick). I have packets with detailed information and registration materials. Registrations and deposits must be turned in by March 1. Registration will include the completed registration form, a copy of your passport, and a copy of your COVID vaccination card.

This will be an amazing, life-changing experience! Make plans now to come along!
