

From the Pastor's Keyboard ...

"Why Pride?"

As we move into the month of June, you are going to be hearing a lot about Pride; especially from the Queer Community, but also from the Black Community as we recognize Juneteenth. "Gay Pride" and "Juneteenth" are opportunities to celebrate people who have been disenfranchised by others; but some may inquire as to the importance of these observances. Isn't setting some people apart from others the opposite of what Jesus calls us to do in his prayer for unity in the Garden of Gethsemane?

Well, no. When Jesus calls for unity, he is not talking about homogeneity; that is, pretending that everyone is exactly the same. In fact, Jesus' prayer for unity is about everyone having the faith that is exemplified in Jesus' ministry; that is, love for one another. If we live as Jesus lived, we will be united as one. But we won't all be exactly the same. To truly be united is to recognize each other's diversity and lift them up as examples of God's magnificent Creation. Jesus is not calling for us to "not see" color, sexual orientation, or diverse gender identity or expression. Jesus is calling us to see and celebrate these diversities, and recognize that our diversity is an expression of God's Creativity.

Pride Month originated out of oppression, following the events of the June 28, 1969 Stonewall Rebellion, where a cadre of "secret" police officers raided the Stonewall Inn, a local gay bar in Greenwich, NY. Over 200 members of the Queer Community were assaulted in that raid, and two dozen were arrested. A crowd of supporters gathered that evening and in the days that followed, protesting the oppression and supporting those who had been assaulted. The following year, on June 28, 1970, the first "Pridefest" was held in Greenwich to commemorate the Stonewall Rebellion. The following June, in 1971, there were Pridefest celebrations in Boston, Dallas, Milwaukee, London, Paris, Berlin, and Stockholm; all recognizing the Stonewall event and the need to uplift the marginalized Queer Community. Since then, Pride events have mushroomed all across the country. Today, nearly every major city has some sort of "Pridefest."

The first Juneteenth celebration was on June 19, 1866, in Galveston, Texas. Juneteenth recognizes and celebrates the final end to the institution of enslaving people in the U.S. Despite the Emancipation Proclamation, issued by President Abraham Lincoln on January 1, 1863, which ordered an end to the institution of enslaving people by presidential decree, many southern states continued the practice. It was not until June 19, 1865, that the final vestiges of slavery were abolished; the final holdout was Galveston, Texas. To commemorate this emancipation, Juneteenth celebrations began the following year. The celebrations, usually organized by churches, spread throughout Texas and the southern states; in 2021 the US Senate *unanimously* passed a proclamation making it an official national holiday.



Both of these observances were born out of oppression. They are expressions of history, identity, and dignity. Historically, it is important to remember what was so that this sort of horrific oppression never happens again. Identity – oppressed people have an inherent need to express their identity as a people. Dignity – when others have tried to steal your dignity from you, it is important to reclaim it. History, Identity, and Dignity are all elements of Pride Month, Juneteenth, and, quite frankly, every holiday we celebrate.

As we lift up our siblings in Christ this month and pray for unity, let us do so remembering their history, celebrating their identity, and affirming their dignity. "That All May Be One" is the prayer of our Savior; and it is our prayer as well. Pride Month, Juneteenth, and similar observances are how that unity may finally be achieved.

Lorry Dreier made a motion to approve the agenda with a second from Jerry Kiesling. The motion passed. Tricia Price made a motion to approve the March minutes with a second from Lorry Dreier. Motion passed.

Unfinished Business:

- Policy and Procedures Manual Update Personnel Committee will met May 15 at 6:30 p.m.
- Land Donation Update Sue Ann Schaefer has sent the contract, but hasn't received it back.
- Nominating Committee Jerry Kiesling said the slate is mostly complete, still waiting on a few more positions.
- Trivia Night Trivia Night will proceed on May 11.
- Car Show August 24 After some discussion it was decided to table the Car Show for now and to consider having a fall harvest party/talent show.

"When I Came Out" is a website with a collection of "coming out" stories.

In honor of Pride Month, we share some here . . .

"When I came out, it was to my grandparents. My mom was on a business trip and my dad was, well, divorced from my mom. I told my grandparents that I was gay. They were at first shocked but they both told me that they loved me to death, no matter how I identify. When my mom came home a few days later, I told her I was gay, and she was extremely supportive. My birthday was two days ago and my mom got me the Gay Pride flag and my grandparents ordered me a rainbow cake. They're so loving! Hope you guys are supported as well!"

"When I came out, my dad was full of anger. (My mom passed away when I was 12). He kept calling me a disgrace to our family and that I was a mistake. I was heartbroken because I thought being bisexual would be OK to my dad, which now I know it isn't. My dad still doesn't support me and always talks bad about me to his friends and our family members. After a few months, I couldn't hold my anger anymore and I confronted my dad and told him that HE was a disgrace for being hateful and rude. Me and my dad got into a heated argument that night, so I packed my things and I went to my grandparents' and stayed the night there. My grandparents are extremely supportive and caring, so they were enraged when they found out what my dad said about me. Nowadays, I try my best to ignore my father. It hurts but I don't want to ruin our bond even further."

"When I came out, I was sitting in the park with my family. My dad was throwing the old pigskin around with my brothers and my mom was on the phone with a friend and I was doodling in my sketchbook. I didn't know my mom knew about the LGBTQ and its flags, so when I drew the pansexual flag, she took my sketchbook and asked me if I was pan. Nervously, I said yes, and my mom smiled and hugged me. She called my dad and three brothers over and we celebrated by eating at a fancy restaurant. Now, I live happily with my family and I'm dating a super sweet girl."

"When I came out as non-binary, I had to come out twice. I'd known I wasn't my assigned gender since I was eight years old. I came out to my parents for the first time when I was 12. They told me it was 'just a phase' and that I was 'persuaded into this by the media'. I truly thought that they would be supportive since they already knew I was bi. My friends were supportive, but everyone only seems to use my preferred name and pronouns when texting, never at school or to my face. The second time I came out to my parents, I finally got through to them. I was allowed to style my hair how I wanted... but that was it. No name change, they don't use my correct pronouns, but one day everyone will respect me for who I am. One day, I will be who I want to be, look how I want to look. This is like a mantra I repeat to myself. 'One day... I will be me'."

EXCITING NEW HAPPENINGS AT CUCC!

May was a month of exciting things happening at CUCC! From our Annual Congregational Meeting to our May Council meeting, several decisions were made that will change the future of our church. We hope you are getting excited, because great things are in store for us. The best is yet to come for CUCC!

ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

At our Annual Congregational Meeting on May 19, we elected new Council Members. The entire Council roster is on page three of this Communicator. New members include: Deborah Long Birkes, Treasurer; Lena Muench, Nurture & Education Ministry Team Chair; Jedd Schneider, Worship & Music Ministry Team Chair; and Kristin Veteto, LODO Ministry Team Chair. Ted Dachroeden (Building & Grounds) and Alethea Tennill (Secretary) were re-elected for second terms.

CUCC ENDOWMENT FUND

Also at the Annual Congregational Meeting, the Congregation approved establishing an Endowment Fund. The descriptive language for this fund was distributed to the congregation in March and in subsequent Friday emails. Over the next five years or so, the Finance & Stewardship Ministry Team will be marketing this fund, soliciting donations to grow it to a critical mass. Once it reaches \$500,000 we will utilize a 4% annual draw to supplement our Annual Budget. The goal for this fund is \$2,000,000 and will be achieved through estate donations, stock donations, living trusts, and other donations. Reaching our goal of \$2,000,000 over the next few years will bring a significant level of financial security to this congregation. The fund already has \$50,000 in it, the result of a donation from the Alan Mader Estate.

SCOUTING AMERICA PARTNERSHIP

At our May Council meeting, we entertained a proposal to enter into a charter with an established Scouting America Unit who is looking for a new charter organization. The Council approved entering into this charter agreement, and the new Scouting Unit will begin meeting here in August. This is a very significant relationship for CUCC. This group is not just a rental group; they will be "our" scouts. We will work with them to nurture them and support their work, and they will do the same for us. They will be very visible in the life of our church, and even in our worship life. The unit consists of four troops including a Cub Scout Troop, a boys group, a girls group, and a Venture Troop. Over 100 Scouts and 50 adult leaders are chartered with this Unit. You will be seeing much more of these scouts as they work with us, and as we enable each other's ministries.

<u>CUCC MISSION TRIP DESTINATION – 2025 AND BEYOND</u>

We also entertained a proposal at the May Council Meeting from the Nurture & Education Ministry Team and the Outreach & Advocacy Ministry Team to make CUCC a mission trip destination for church youth groups all across Missouri and beyond. Modeling after a very successful program in St. Louis (The Urban Mission Experience), we will be working with local non-profit agencies in Columbia to offer service opportunities in the summer of 2025 for churches and youth looking for a mission trip experience. We will be marketing this program to churches across rural Missouri and other states, inviting them to stay for a few days at CUCC and participate in service opportunities we put together.

Mission Groups would sign behavioral covenants regarding their stay at CUCC. The average group would stay three-four nights, in two of our Sunday School classrooms upstairs. During the day, they would work with our mission partners, such as The Food Bank, Ronald McDonald House, Fisher House, etc. participating in service opportunities. Tours of Mizzou, Columbia College, and Stephens College would be offered. We would prepare one meal for them during their stay, and lead them in a program one evening. Groups would pay a set fee per person per night; we anticipate bringing in \$9,600 our first year.

CHURCH VAN PURCHASE

At our May Meeting, the Council also approved a proposal brought by the Membership & Care Ministry Team to purchase a used church van from St. John UCC in St. Charles, MO. They are selling of one of their vans, and offered it to us for \$7,500 (below blue book value). It is a 15-passenger 2006 Ford step van and could be utilized for youth events, Women's Fellowship trips, picking up church members for worship, or other special trips. It is much more versatile than our current van, and much more practical for our purposes. Funds for this purchase will come from the Transportation Fund, one of our investments with United Church Funds. As we will be using this van more than our current van, there may be more expenses incurred. Any donations to the Van Fund to offset maintenance expenses would be appreciated. If you are interested in donating, talk to Kurt Heine, Moderator; Jerry Kiesling, Vice-Moderator; or Deborah Long Birkes, Treasurer.

Membership & Care Ministry

Have you ever made a potholder on a loom? Think of a plastic square with pegs along all four sides, add 20 colorful loops stretched across in one direction plus 20 more loops going the other way, weaved over and under, over and under, again, and again, until you've created something bigger and stronger, a potholder that can withstand 375-degree heat as you take those freshly-baked chocolate chip cookies out of the oven.

I view our CUCC Prayer Team as a potholder, and myself as a single loop. Individually, my prayers can feel somewhat tepid, perhaps a bit whiny and self-involved, depending on the day. Sunday worship provides an excellent framework for consistent, wide-ranging prayer, and the power of our congregation praying together often feels palpable. But what about the other six days of the week? Carving out time for one-on-one conversations with God proves difficult. Being part of our prayer team and praying specifically for others, be they known or unknown, makes me feel more connected to our church and also to God. Being on the team also holds me accountable; I need to show up daily and pray those prayers. Requests have been made; we humbly honor and raise those confidential requests with intention. The prayer team nudges me out of self-serving prayers of petition, confession and/or thanksgiving toward a greater good, a larger world.

Potholders can be beautiful, but don't have to be; potholders can be intricate, but don't have to be. A messy pile of 40 individual loops weaved together becomes something else entirely. Likewise, we pray faithfully, perhaps not always eloquently, to support each other, to lift the needs and hopes of our church family to God.

MAY 7, 2024 OUTREACH AND ADVOCACY TEAM MEETING

PRESENT: Mark Duncan, Mahree Skala, Pastor Rick Oberle, Llona Weiss, Shelly Adams, Audrey Lasley, and Jessica Jenks Meeting called to order at 6:43 p.m. by Mark, who offered reflections on nature as an introduction to consideration of the Creation Justice Covenant.

Pastor Rick led an opening prayer.

Minutes of the 2/6/24 meeting were accepted by consensus, noting minor typographical errors. Next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, 7/2/2024 at 6:30 p.m.

- <u>Strengthen The Church Offering</u> June 2: Mark will submit Communicator article and Mahree will present the Mission Moment on 5/26.
- <u>CWS blanket</u> June 16: Mark will submit Communicator article and Llona will present the Mission Moment on 6/9.
- <u>Craft Beer and Carts Festival</u> July 14: Flyer will be in the July Communicator.
- <u>Mission Moments</u> will be presented by Jessica on June 30, Mark on July 7 and Pastor Rick will make a quick announcement on July 14. CUCC goal is \$800. Jessica will get a cart to the gathering area for decoration beginning June 30 and Mark will deliver it to Festival on July 14.
- <u>AHL Eraser Collection</u> July 21 and 28: Bring in erasers to help supply AHL in the 24-25 school year.
- Christmas in August Offering August 4: Mahree will present the Mission Moment on July 28.
- <u>CROP Hunger Walk</u> September 15: Jessica will submit an article for the August and September Communicators.
- "Thank You" Notes from VAC Christmas sponsorship recipients and other organizations were circulated.
- <u>Creation Justice Covenant</u>: information was presented by Shelly, Llona, Mahree and Pastor Rick. If approved at the June Church Council meeting, the Covenant will be considered through prayer, discernment, and education over the next 12 months. There are five steps in the process 1) Create Green Team; 2) Discern where the congregation wants to go; 3) Draft Covenant; 4) Vote to adopt Creation Justice Covenant and become a Creation Justice Church; and 5) Submit application. Shelly will submit article for the Communicator.
- <u>Missouri for Constitutional Freedom</u>: Mahree reported that MCF collected double the needed signatures. Signature verification takes time so it will be on the November ballot.
- <u>Urban Mission Experience</u>: UME is a program in which middle school and high school students travel on a mission trip to urban areas. Pastor Rick presented the details of the program. He submitted that this may be a program where CUCC could be a destination and host groups during the summer and coordinate mission work in the Columbia area. Pat Forward, Nurture and Education Team, will present this at the May Church Council meeting.
- <u>Scout Troop Chapter Organization</u>: Pastor Rick reported that, pending Council approval, CUCC will be a chartering organization for a large Scout troop. The Scout troop will be meeting at the church beginning in August.
- Food Bank May 28: Mahree reported there will be no evening volunteers in June and July.
- <u>Loaves and Fishes</u> May 20: Audrey reported the number of people served has greatly decreased since the move to the new location.
- Alpha Hart Lewis Elementary: AHL sends thanks to CUCC for all their contributions. Llona reported they are in need of small size 6-7-8 sweatpants and underwear, both girls and boys. CUCC received a Certificate of Recognition for volunteer service from the Columbia Public Schools. May 14 is the BizTown field trip.

WORLD REFUGEE DAY – JUNE 20

What is World Refugee Day?

World Refugee Day is an international day designated by the United Nations to honor refugees around the globe. It falls each year on 20 June, and celebrates the strength and courage of people who have been forced to flee their home country to escape conflict or persecution.

Why is World Refugee Day important?

World Refugee Day shines a light on the rights, needs and dreams of refugees, helping to mobilize political will and resources so refugees can not only survive, but thrive. While it is important to protect and improve the lives of refugees every single day, international days like World Refugee Day help to focus global attention on the plight of those fleeing conflict or persecution. Many activities held on World Refugee Day create opportunities to support refugees.

When is World Refugee Day and when did it start?

World Refugee Day falls each year on June 20, and is dedicated to refugees around the globe. World Refugee Day was held globally for the first time on June 20, 2001, to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the 1951 Convention relating to the Status of Refugees. It was originally known as Africa Refugee Day, before the United Nations General Assembly officially designated it as an international day in December 2000.

What happens on World Refugee Day?

Each year, World Refugee Day is marked by a variety of events in many countries around the globe in support of refugees. These activities are led by or involve refugees themselves, government officials, host communities, companies, celebrities, school children, and the general public, among others.

City of Refuge and World Refugee Day:

There will be a celebration at City of Refuge here in Columbia on Saturday, June 22, from 9:00 a.m. to noon in observance of World Refugee Day.
