From the Pastor's Keyboard . . .

“Stay”

“*Stability is not about standing still.*

It is about remaining faithful when everything else is in motion.”— St. Benedict

Benedict of Nursia was a Catholic monk who lived in central Italy in the sixth century, the son of an affluent Roman family. He was sent to Rome for a classical education, but was disappointed in setting of academic rigor void of spiritual development. He ran away from school. He wound up coming under the care of a monk named Romanus; a hermit who lived in a cave in central Italy. He adopted this hermetic lifestyle for three years, learning from Romanus before venturing out on his own.

Benedict was called to be the abbot of a nearby monastery, but that relationship was not a good fit. After an attempt on his life, he fled the monastery and founded his own religious order. He eventually founded 12 monasteries in central Italy, which became the basis for the Benedictine Order, one of the largest Catholic orders in the world today. Members of the Benedictine Order follow “The Rule of St. Benedict,” which is a series of wisdom principles designed to bring the adherent closer to God through the common choices we make every day.

St. Benedict lived in a time when everything was falling apart. The fall of the Roman Empire, which was occurring in the early years of his life, wreaked havoc on the common people. Moral codes were collapsing, economies were shrinking, cruelty was being normalized, and minorities were seen as a threat. In those moments, people were fleeing and fighting and lashing out with hostility towards one another. It seemed, at times, that all was lost.

But Benedict and his wisdom orders did not advocate either fight or flight. He did not try to save the world by propping up the failing cultural systems, but he also did not advocate abandoning the world. Yes, his monastic orders were a retreat from the world, but they were not modeled in the hermetic lifestyle of his younger years. They were modeled on lifestyles based on stability, shared labor, prayer, and care for the vulnerable. These monasteries did not prevent the collapse of the Roman Empire, but they did preserve humanity within that collapse. They became places where intellectual pursuit survived, along with spiritual development. They became places where the poor were fed, where dignity was restored, and where power was dismissed. But they did not do this by being boastful or boisterous; they did so by being steadfast and stable. They did so by “staying.”


Rev. Cameron Trimble shared this wisdom about St. Benedict and his stability recently in her devotional series, “Piloting Faith.” She equated this stability to our current cultural dumpster fire and how we, as progressive Christians, are called to be stable. She tells us that *“being stable is about committing to a place, a people, and a way of living that resists chaos without mirroring it. Stability is not passivity. It is disciplined faithfulness. It is the refusal to let fear decide who we will become.”*

In our world, it would be easy to fight, it would be easy to flee, it would be easy to check out and bury our heads in the sand of apathy. But, following St. Benedict, we must rise above all of those intuitive practices. The counter-intuitive practice of simply being is resistance as well. If we can simply be the loving people who God calls us to be, despite the pressures against us, we are following the wisdom of St. Benedict and the Benedictine orders of stability (and Jesus).

This stability comes in the form of prayer, education, restorative justice work, lifting up the dignity and value of each person, caring for those in need, and trying to apply the wisdom teachings of Jesus in our every day life. If we can just continue being Jesus’ hands and feet to those in need, we are being the resistance. We do a good job of that here at CUCC. As we live into 2026 (what a year it has been already) it will be even more important for us to simply “stay.”

We have had some great worship events this year already, as we celebrated Epiphany, remembered our baptisms, investigated the peaceful ministry of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., and celebrated the seven-year anniversary of our Open and Affirming/Inclusion Covenant. As we head into “love month” let us remember that the most loving thing we can do is to “stay.” Stay faithful, stay true, stay strong, stay in love with Jesus Christ and all that he empowers you to do. We are the church, together and they will know we are Christians by our Steadfast- “staying” love.

ASH WEDNESDAY WORSHIP - FEBRUARY 18

Ash Wednesday is the beginning of the Lenten Season for the liturgical church; a time for Christians to examine their own mortality and God's blessed gift of life eternal, in this world and the next.



On February 18, at 7:00 p.m., we will celebrate our eternal communion with God as we reflect on the parable of Creation found in Genesis 2 where God forms humankind from dust and lovingly breathes life into them. We will have the traditional imposition of ashes as a symbol of penance, and receive communion as well. We hope you will join us as we kick off the Lenten season and our 40-day walk with Jesus to Jerusalem and the cross.

The annual Open and Affirming Convocation in St. Louis will be here before you know it! We would love to have you join us. There will be several guest speakers and workshops. SOLARIZE UCC UPDATE

We are awaiting our turn on Dogwood Solar's list of 2026 installations and expect the work to begin around April. Meanwhile, we're preparing for the necessary paperwork to receive the federal tax credit once installation is complete. Generous financial support from the congregation (\$50,500 donated as of this writing) will reduce the need to withdraw funds from other investments. If you wish to contribute, just select "Solar Panel Designated Fund" on Kindrid or write it on the memo line of your check.

WOMEN'S FELLOWSHIP

The CUCC Women's Fellowship will host their monthly gathering on February 12 at 9:30 a.m. in the Gathering Area. Moderator's Moment

Christ's love is unconditional, freely given, and endlessly expansive- and he invites us to share that same love with others.

As we enter this sacred season, may we walk with Jesus attentively, love boldly, and remain open to the ways God is calling us to be a blessing.

So I leave you with this Lenten question: **How will you share that love?**

The meeting was called to order at 6:33 p.m. on December 16, 2025 by Jerry Keisling. Pastor Rick began with a devotion from 1 Thessalonians 3 highlighting the importance of fellowship and the bonds that we share as a church family. Pastor Rick followed with a prayer. Present: Pastor Rick, Jerry Kiesling, Ted Dachroeden, Christine Staelens, Corrine Remeika, Judi Privitt, Ashley Ramirez, Deborah Birkes, Edie Diel, Mary Lorber-Solt, and Kristin Veteto. Edie Diel made a motion to approve the 12/16/25 meeting agenda with a second by Ashley Ramirez. The motion passed. Christine Staelens made a motion to approve the November minutes with slight changes (remove Edie's name from present because it is mentioned twice and change "Kasper" to "Ashley" for the motion at the November meeting to adjourn - Judi will make edits). Motion second by Mary Lorber-Solt. The motion passed.

Unfinished Business:

- ♥ Volunteer Sign-Up: most spots filled for January.
- ♥ New Light for Sign: Ted is still waiting to hear about choices and options for the light.
- ♥ Nominating Committee for 2025: a member is interested and will observe at next month's meeting.
- ♥ Solar Columbia: motion passed and Solar committee members will be meeting this week to sign the contract and pay the initial downpayment of \$7,000.
- ♥ Historical Documents/Photos - Alexandra will continue to work on this project.
- ♥ Accompanist update: We had a candidate that was going to be hired today and they changed their mind. The search continues with a few prospects in mind.

New Business:

- ♥ LODO: New Ministry Team Member recommended (Mona Dachroeden) - Motion made by LODO Chair (Kristin Veteto) and motioned passed
- ♥ Christmas Bonuses: Motion made by Edie Diel to allocate Christmas bonuses to CUCC staff in the following amounts (Pastor Rick \$450; Alexandra \$350; Mike & Caleb \$200). Council members recommended that the budgeted bonus for the "accompanist" position be given to Gina and Connie (\$100 each). The motion passed.
- ♥ Vision and Strategic Planning (Corrine Remeika) - Corrine is hoping to attend each Ministry Team's next meeting and engage the team in a discussion of their evaluation of how they have moved towards their goals this past year and where they need/want to go this coming year. Ministry Team chairs provided dates for their next meetings.
- ♥ Closed Session Discussion: Committee was appointed to develop a security policy: Edie Diel, Jerry Kiesling, Judi Privitt, Corrine Remeika, & Pastor Rick

Pastors Report and Ministry Team Reports are attached throughout.

It was mentioned that as a church we need to schedule a Safe Church Training and have all Sunday school teachers, nursery aides, and anyone involved in Nurture and Education of children attend the event and sign the Safe Church form.

Pastor Rick closed us in prayer. Motion to adjourn by Ashley, second by Edie. Motion passed. The meeting adjourned at 8:22 p.m.


A GOOD ENDING FOR 2025 IS A GOOD BEGINNING FOR 2026

The financial condition of CUCC was very good at year end and that bodes well for 2026! For the last three years, our Joyful Giving has fallen approximately \$40,000 short each year; but 2025 ended only \$4317 short and that is a huge improvement. Thank you to all members and friends of CUCC. Our expenses slightly exceeded our budget but only because we had unexpected expenses connected with ice and snow removal and large trees which fell in our parking lot and required professional removal.

The 2026 budget decreases spending by approximately \$25,000 compared to the 2025 budget and anticipated Joyful Giving is decreased by approximately \$38,000. These decreases do not suggest that CUCC reduce any of our current activities but anticipates more efficient operations and that will slightly reduce the amount of Joyful Giving necessary to support all our important activities.

The Finance & Stewardship Ministry Team has resolved to regularly inform our congregation about all of the important activities we support every year and their cost. We will do that through direct reports at church services and with monthly articles in the Communicator. The table above is a summary of our 2025 income and expenses. For a finer look, check out the Annual Report for more details.

Inclusion and Affirmation Ministry Team

The Columbia Values Diversity Celebration has taken place each January since 1994 to celebrate Dr. Martin Luther King's teachings. I have attended for several years, and I always find it inspiring just looking around at all the hundreds of people who have taken time out of their busy lives to gather and commemorate Dr. King. Along with individuals who purchase tickets, many churches, schools, and businesses purchase whole tables' worth of tickets and send representatives. Each year, different incredible local musical groups perform and keynote speakers come in; if you've never heard Rochara Knight sing the national anthem, that in itself is worth the price of the ticket!

The Inclusion and Affirmation Ministry Team has purchased a table on behalf of our church for the last several years. Some years we haven't filled all ten seats, but the people who attend always comment that it's a great experience, and it's a shame that more people can't come. Granted, it is a breakfast event that takes place from 7:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m. on a weekday morning, so that doesn't fit in everyone's schedule.

This year, our own Pastor Rick was nominated for the individual Diversity Award, awarded annually to an individual or family who has made a great contribution to promoting appreciation for diversity in Columbia, along with an award for a group or organization doing diversity work. This Communicator will go to print before the celebration on Jan. 28, so as I'm writing this, we don't know yet if Pastor Rick got the award, but it is quite an honor to be nominated. Past winners include Elliot and Muriel Battle, Beulah Ralph, Almeta Crayton, Barbra Horrell, and Dr. Peter Stiepleman. Organizational award winners include Rock Bridge Christian Church, Church Women United, Show-Me Central Habitat for Humanity, Columbia CROP Hunger Walk, Wilkes Blvd. United Methodist Church, Room at the Inn, and City of Refuge; which means we can all take a little bit of the credit, because many CUCC members have been involved with several of those groups!

As a teacher, one of my favorite parts is the writing program. Students submit writings around the annual theme, which varies but is always based on Dr. King's teachings. This year's theme is "Our Beloved Community: Why We Stand Together," which seems very timely given current national and international events. Student writings are published in a booklet given out at the celebration and a select few students are chosen to read their writings aloud on a video which is played at the celebration. I always enjoy the video and take the booklet with me to read later. Many of the students' writings give me hope for the future.

Between the musical performances, the inspiring keynote speakers, the student writing video, hearing about the great work the award nominees are doing, and just seeing how many people are committed to doing the work of appreciating diversity and promoting inclusion in our community, I would highly recommend attending the Columbia Values Diversity Celebration. It's too late for this year, but we'll let you know when the date for the 2027 one is announced!




MEET ME WHERE I AM: AN ALZHEIMER'S CARE GUIDE A CUCC Book Study in March

GLOBAL MINISTRIES MISSIONARY ELENA HUEGEL TO SPEAK AT CUCC ON FEBRUARY 22

Elena Huegel is “our” missionary in Mexico. She is a mission co-worker at the Instituto de Estudios e Investigación Intercultural, A.C. (IESII), as the coordinator for Retoños en las ruinas: esperanza en el trauma (Roots in the Ruins: Hope in Trauma) in Chiapas, Mexico. Highlights of her ministry in Chiapas include learning from the wisdom of the Mayan and the Mexican cultures and traditions and bringing together the people and threads of the Retoños en las ruinas program to create an intricate tapestry of personal and community stories and experiences around diverse themes including trauma healing, resilience development, nourishing of dignity, grief process accompaniment, and exploring different paths for justice.

Originally from Houston, Texas, she is a graduate of Houston Baptist University and Eastern Mennonite University. She began working with Global Ministries as a Global Mission Intern from 1996 – 1999. She also served as the project director, international education coordinator and chaplain at Shalom Center in Chile. The author of several publications, she received the first place literature prize in the 2018 Eastern Mennonite University’s Center for Justice and Peacebuilding Alumni Storytelling Contest for a piece entitled: “Acompañamiento: The Privilege of Walking Alongside.” She is a member of Iglesia Cristiana del Buen Pastor, Chiapas, Mexico and Iglesia Cristiana Ebenezer, Los Fresnos, Texas. She enjoys outdoor activities, painting, journaling and crafting.

Elena is the person with whom we coordinate most closely in Chiapas, as we participate in our Mission Immersion Experiences. She is our host and translator, educating and empowering us as we build relationship with Chiapas. She has hosted delegations from CUCC twice in the past few years, welcoming 13 CUCC members with open hands and an open heart. She also helped coordinate Pastor Rick’s sabbatical in 2022, and the wedding of Keith and Deborah Birkes in 2023!

Elena is currently touring the US and will be with us the week of February 16-22. She will be at Fastnacht and Ash Wednesday services, and will lead worship at CUCC on Sunday, February 22. She will also be hosting an educational forum during the 9:00am Sunday School hour on February 22 in the Fellowship Hall. If you would like to arrange a personal visit that week, let Pastor Rick know. She has a lot of availability that week!

We are also negotiating dates for a Mission Immersion Experience to Chiapas in October, 2026. More information will be forthcoming when we have those dates firmed up. If you are at all interested in participating in this experience, talk to Pastor Rick!
