

From the Pastor's Keyboard ...

"The Toy of Church"

When the Rev. Dr. John Dorhauer was with us for our Centennial Celebration on September 30/October 1, one of the things he talked about was "The Joy of Church." He talked about introducing people to the United Church of Christ, people who had been hurt by churches in the past, told they don't matter, or are condemned because of how God Created them, and the joy they felt as they experienced the United Church of Christ and our Inclusive Love for the first time.

He told us about his experiences as General Minister and President of the United Church of Christ and how he was able to share the Joy of Church with people all across the world. Travelling in delegations to Europe, the Middle East, Africa, and South America, he shared with people all over the world that Jesus Christ came to us to give us Hope, Peace, Love, and Joy, not condemnation. This was his main job descriptor, he said, to share The Joy of Church, and he was quick to tell us that he loved his job.

The Joy of Church is something we embrace fully at Columbia United Church of Christ. There are many Christian denominations that focus their efforts on condemnation, guilt, and the personification of sin and evil. More conservative churches are well known for using guilt and accusation as motivators to manage and manipulate the populace. Marcus Borg, the renowned theologian, talks of pastors who focus on this sort of shaming as "finger shaking pastors."

This way of being church is quickly fading from our culture, and good riddance. Many people love to quote John 3:16, but in fact, John 3:17 is much more telling: "God did not send Jesus into the world to condemn the world, but to save it." Jesus came to bring joy.

As we move into the Advent Season, we will be celebrating the Joy of Church each Sunday, focusing on the Psalms. Each Sunday in Advent will be special; you won't want to miss any!

Sunday, December 3: First Sunday of Advent and the Confirmation of Sofia Marienfeld-Crenshaw Theme: "God's Presence Brings JOY!" Focusing on Psalm 16 & Luke 1:5-23

Sunday, December 10: Second Sunday of Advent, Advent Cantata (Bells and Choir) and **Advent Banquet** Theme: "God's Peace Brings JOY!" Focusing on Psalm 118 & Luke 1:26-38

Sunday, December 17: Third Sunday of Advent and the Sunday School Christmas Program Theme: "God's Steadfast Love Brings JOY!" Focusing on Psalm 100, Luke 1:39-56

Sunday, December 24: Fourth Sunday of Advent with special choral music Theme: "God's Justice Brings JOY!" Focusing on Psalm 97 & Luke 1:57-80

Sunday, December 31: First Sunday of Christmas/Christmas Hymn Sing Theme: God's Glory Brings JOY!" Focusing on Psalm 96 & Luke 2:8-20

Our Christmas Eve evening services will be at 7:00 & 11:00 p.m. with special music from Kristin Veteto, Casey Wood, and Steve Jannetti. We will focus on "The Gift of Joy" at both of these services, reflecting on Jesus' presence in our midst.

The gift of joy that we share this season is not something to be kept to ourselves either. Corporately and Individually, it is up to us to take that joy into the world and share it with everyone we meet. Maybe they will know we are Christians by our . . . JOY!

The joy of the Advent Season, as we prepare for Christ's birth, is contagious. But in order to be "infected," you must be present. There is much to celebrate here at CUCC this season, and we hope you will avail yourself of the "Joy of Church"!

One of the aspects of our CUCC life that is foundational to who we are as a church is our intentional focus on planning and self assessment. In fact, our CUCC By-Laws actually stipulates (Article I, Section 2) that we will have an active Strategic Plan, evaluated annually by the Vision Team and implemented by our Congregation. This year, the Vision Team met four times to review and restructure our Strategic Plan. The plan that was developed was presented by Jerry Kiesling, Vice Moderator, at our Congregational Planning and Assessment meeting on November 12.

Finance and Stewardship Ministry Team

Though the calendar year may be coming to an end, the season of giving is just beginning. People throughout the country will flood stores and online marketplaces in search for the perfect gift. What if the gift is a donation to Columbia United Church of Christ? If you have funds in an IRA and you're currently taking a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD), consider making a QCD (Qualified Charitable Distribution) to CUCC.

A QCD is a direct transfer of funds from a person's IRA to a qualified charity. *The RMD is excluded from taxable income to the extent the QCD strategy is employed*. For example, if your RMD for the year is \$10,000, and you make a \$7,000 QCD, only \$3,000 of the RMD will be taxed. Before considering the QCD, you should be aware of two rules. First, the maximum amount a person may exclude from income through the QCD strategy is \$100,000 per year. Second, although a QCD can be used to satisfy your RMD, you can actually start QCDs as early as age 70 ½ (which is before the current beginning age for RMDs). Making QCDs prior to RMD age can be a tax-efficient way to meet your charitable goals throughout retirement.

Were you aware you can name an Entity as beneficiary of your IRA or on a Transfer on Death form, in the case of a brokerage account? You can select any percentage of your IRA account or brokerage account to be received by the Church upon your demise. It's a wonderful way for your legacy to live on.

Another gifting option is to donate highly appreciated shares of stock or a mutual fund from a regular investment account. Sue Ann Schaefer will be able to provide instructions on how to make these types of donations. Our congregation is a wonderful group of giving people. Matthew 10:8 says, "Freely you have received, freely give." Whatever God has given us will be used for God's Glory. Thank you for your past, current, and future gifts.

Inclusion and Affirmation Ministry Team

Prior to December 7, 1941, the relationship between Japan and the United States had been deteriorating. Because of that, Japan's dependence on the United States natural and industrial resources was threatened. As the relationship soured, Japan turned to Southeast Asia for those resources. The attack at Pearl Harbor was not intended to start a war with the US. The attack that day was mostly to prevent the United States Navy from interfering with Japan's Southeast Asia plans.

On that fateful day, a Wickes-class destroyer, the USS Ward, fired the first shot. A minesweeper spotted a Japanese submarine's periscope and alerted the crew of the USS Ward. It then fired on the intruder. One source said that, at the time, Navy officials discounted the existence of the submarine. Therefore, a general alarm was not issued. It would be 60 years before there would be confirmation that a submarine was sunk by the USS Ward prior to the Japanese attack.



That attack on Pearl Harbor lasted only 75 minutes. It was a well-organized mission by the Japanese. The sky was blanketed with 353 of their aircraft. A total of 2,335 US service members and 68 civilians were killed that day. On the Battleship Arizona, there were 23 sets of brothers (a total of 77 men) serving together. Only 15 individuals of this group survived. Those families lost an entire generation of young men in one day. The military policy of siblings serving together was changed thereafter.

In the 30 days after Pearl Harbor, 134,000 Americans enlisted in the military. One of the heroes of that day was Doris Miller. He enlisted in the Navy as a mess attendant third class aboard the West Virginia. That post was one of the few open to Black sailors. At the time of the attack, he was cleaning up from breakfast. The Battle Station alarm went off, and he went on deck. There, he was directed to help with several jobs, including carrying wounded soldiers to safer areas. A Lieutenant then ordered Miller to assist with the anti-aircraft machine gun by feeding ammunition to it for the shooter. But when the Lieutenant's attention was diverted, Miller took the initiative and began firing the gun himself. He is credited with downing four to six Japanese planes before the ammunition ran out. He was awarded the Navy Cross for his service in 1942. He was later assigned to the escort carrier, the Liscome Bay. On December 7, 1943, exactly two years after Pearl Harbor, that carrier was torpedoed and sunk within 23 minutes. Doris Miller was listed as 'presumed dead.'

When we fast forward to today, Japan is one of America's strongest allies. Japanese tourists are the largest source of international visitors to the state of Hawaii. Those visitors pay their respects at the Pearl Harbor Memorial just as Americans do. (Sources: Doris Miller and USS Ward: Wikipedia; Pearl Harbor statistics: Pearl Harbor Tours.)

cognitive, physical, and communication. Play allows for opportunities for children to learn how to regulate their emotions, negotiate with others, and develop self-control. Play offers spontaneity, which gives children the chance to develop mental flexibility and executive function skills. Every time a child plays, they are learning multiple skills in their activity.

Crafts/Playdough: Promotes fine motor skills and hand strength, language development, creative and expressive development, and social skills. Children learn cognitive skills regarding colors, shapes, and spatial awareness.

Blocks/Puzzles/Manipulative: Promotes fine motor skills, language development, math skills - trial and error/spatial awareness, and social skills.

Storytime/Circle Time/Music & Movement: Promotes language development, letter and sound awareness and

recognition, book handling skills, and social skills. Additionally, grows development in patience and listening skills to follow teacher directions. Dancing and moving bodies to a beat provides a chance to use the whole body to support social emotional and multisensory skills.

Through play, children learn about the world and themselves. Play is the foundation of all later communication and cooperative skills that are needed throughout life to create positive relationships with others in school, work, and other social environments. Creating time and space for play opportunities is essential to building the whole child.

Over the past three months, I have served as assistant director for a piece performed by the University's Choral Union. In addition to my involvement, our choir section leaders, Quin Wilson and Shannon Martin, were also involved in the project. The piece we presented at our concert was the Oratorio "Considering Matthew Shepard." This musical composition was written by composer Craig Hella Johnson in 2016. Over the last seven years, it has become one of the most important works in choral music. The reason behind this is the story that brought it into existence. It details the life of Matthew Shepard and his 1998 murder. What makes a composition about this random person's murder touch so many people? A native of Wyoming, Matthew was murdered for his identity as an LGBT individual. I won't go into too many details, but feel free to look the details up online.

We performed this piece with 50 members of Choral Union and 50 members of the University Singers. It totaled about an hour and 40 minutes of music, including about 20 solos and 10 speaking parts.

It is probably the largest musical project I have worked on, and I am very proud of the work we did.

Not only was it a musical achievement, but I felt grateful to present a piece with these important themes. It felt like a "coming together" of communities to speak, not only about incomprehensible hate, but also about a true change that is only possible when society comes together in love.

International Missions

CUCC IS WORKING IN ISRAEL/PALESTINE

In addition to its congregations, the **Episcopal diocese of Jerusalem** is responsible for more than thirty institutions, including hospitals, schools, clinics, rehabilitation centers, guesthouses, vocational training programs, and retirement homes. The parishes and institutions of the Diocese cover five separate countries and territories: Jordan, Palestine, Lebanon, Syria, and Israel. The programs of the Diocese address the need for healthcare and

education in areas where many cannot afford it, making no distinction between religion, ethnicity, or gender. The diocese considers education for the next generation of leaders to be a vital bridge-building contribution that helps bring stability to an otherwise troubled region. In addition, the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem supports peacebuilding efforts, reaching out to interfaith neighbors in mutual respect and cooperation.

Through <u>Global Ministries</u>, CUCC is a partner in mission with the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem, and through them, we are actively working in Jordan, Palestine, Lebanon, Syria, and Israel. In this time of civil unrest in the region, please keep the work of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem in your prayers!



PRAYERS FOR ISRAEL/PALESTINE

As we reflect on the birth of Christ in the Holy Land this Christmas Season, we realize that the Holy Land is very conflicted right now. Violence perpetrated by Hamas against both Israel and their own Palestinian citizens has led to much anguish in the Middle East. As we remember Jesus' birth in Bethlehem this year, let us also keep in our prayers the Palestinians and Israelis who are living in that land today. Remember them this Christmas as we all join together in praying for a lasting peace in the Holy Land and the entire Middle East Region.

LIGHT UP THE NIGHT IN CHINA

Qinghai province in northwest China is ranked fourth-largest in area, has the third-smallest population, and its economy is second-lowest in the country. Due to the insufficient power supply in this plateau region, there are often power outages. The students in those areas must study under candlelight or with oil lamps at night. Such weak light not only affects the effectiveness of the children's learning, but also harms the development of their vision.

To help with this need, the Amity Foundation, a partner of the United Church of Christ and the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) through Global Ministries, started a project called "The Mini Power Station School Bag." The goal of the project is to provide a power supply and light for students and teachers in the western mountainous areas to improve their ability to study, teach, and learn. The power stations are easy to use, portable, safe, and pollution-free. They include foldable solar panels that charge the mobile power supplies and LED lights. The power stations can be carried in a school bag, charged by the sun during the day, and used at night. The cost of one

mini power station is ¥230 RMB (Chinese currency) or \$34 USD. It helps to solve the problem of the insufficient power supply and lighting in the provinces of the western plateau.

Amity Foundation has donated over 9,500 mini power stations to 47 schools in 14 different counties in Qinghai province. Plans are in place to distribute more than 2,000 more sets of mini power stations to the students in Qinghai and Sichuan provinces by the end of 2023.

Please keep the people, mission partners, and ministries in China in your prayers this season as we are reminded of the light in the world, whose birth we celebrate.

LODO PLAYGROUND RESPECT

Please help us keep our playground safe for all children by following these guidelines:
