From the Pastor's Keyboard ...

"Covenant"

The United Church of Christ *Manual on Ministry* states, "Because we belong to God, we belong to one another. Because we belong to one another and to God, we are accountable to our covenantal relationships on earth and in heaven. The Covenantal relationships between parts of the Body of Christ are characterized by mutuality, transparency, accountability, and a desire to represent Christ together for the glory of God."

I know, most of you probably are unaware that a *Manual on Ministry* exists, but it does. It is a common guide that instrumentalities of the United Church of Christ share to coordinate faith expressions in our practice of ministry. It details processes for the oversight and authorization of clergy, the reception and recognition of churches, and the polity of the United Church of Christ. It exists because of, and enhances, our mutual covenant.

But what is "covenant?" I feel that word is often tossed around lightly. Our society often uses the word "covenant" interchangeably with "promise" or even "expectation," but there is more to "covenant" than that. True covenant must involve God. Covenant describes our promises to God, God's promises to us, and our promises to one another with God as our guide. Our *Manual on Ministry* defines covenant as "the commitment of God to God's people, of the people to God, and of the people to one another as the Body of Christ." Covenant is about our relationship as God's people and expressing that relationship in a Godly way. Covenant is central to who we are as the United Church of Christ.

The idea of covenant is expressed in John 17 while Jesus is in the Garden of Gethsemane. In this passage, Jesus is preparing for his impending crucifixion. He is praying, knowing full well that Judas is about to betray him. As he prays, he expresses his most fervent desires to God: that we may all be one, just as Jesus is one with God. Jesus' most sincere desire is to bind us in covenant relationship with Them.

"After Jesus had spoken these words, he looked up to heaven and said, '... the hour has come; glorify your Son so that the Son may Glorify You. Now, I am no longer in the world, but they are. Protect them in your name so that they may be one, as we are one. I ask ... that all may be one. As you ... are in me and I am in you, may they also be in us ... "

-(John 17, selected verses)

So how do we live Jesus' desire for covenant in our lives? How do we express covenant with God? We will be exploring that in worship in May and at our Congregational Meeting on May 21. There, we will celebrate how our covenant has resulted in enhanced ministries in Columbia for 100 years and how we will live into even more enhanced ministries in the next 100 years. But covenant is not just about us as individuals, it is about the community, and how that community can Glorify God more united than we ever could divided. Covenant does not mean we will always agree, but it does mean that we are all part of one Body of Christ.


Covenant calls us to justice. If we are in covenant relationship with each other, that means we must be committed to each other. We must commit ourselves to doing justice and working for equity, not because of mere passion for



social causes, but in order to live into our covenant. As members of the Body of Christ, when one part of that body is diminished by hatred or oppressive policy, we hurt, too. Our justice work is rooted in covenant with each other and with God.

Covenant also calls us to commitment. As members of the Body of Christ, our covenant calls us to work together in all our efforts, and that cannot happen if you are not here. Your presence in our community of faith is essential to the covenant we share with each other and with God. Without you present, our work is diminished. As we move into the summer months, I hope you will keep covenant in mind. Together, we are the church, and in covenant relationship, we are working towards Gods' vision of justice, righteousness, and shalom!



(Ms. Rhinehart was diagnosed with depression at 14. She experiences anxiety and body dysmorphia-a feeling that the body is severely flawed. She practices meditation and a form of energy healing called *Reiki*. She is a Christian.)

WHAT IS MENTAL HEALTH?

MentalHealth.gov definition: "Mental health includes our emotional, psychological, and social well-being. It affects how we think, feel, and act. It also helps determine how we handle stress, relate to others, and make choices. Mental health is important at every stage of life, from childhood and adolescence through adulthood."

We all have stressful periods that may impact our mental health. Early signs of concern include:

- \Rightarrow Eating or sleeping too much or too little
- \Rightarrow Pulling away from people and usual activities
- \Rightarrow Low energy
- \Rightarrow Feeling that nothing matters, hopelessness
- \Rightarrow Unexplained aches and pains
- \Rightarrow Mood swings
- \Rightarrow Thinking of harming yourself or others
- \Rightarrow Inability to perform daily tasks

Mental health issues are common, and sometimes, transient. It is important to stay connected with trusted friends and family and to get professional help, if needed. Those actions can assist with positivity and help one develop coping skills.

You are NOT alone.

Having recently sustained the illness and loss of my husband, the support from this church family has been a lifeline. I certainly have my challenges: sad days, low energy, changes in appetite, other items included in the list above. I'm blessed to have this caring/thoughtful congregation, supportive friends, and loving family members nearby. Not everyone is so lucky.

In this month of May, let's be very aware of, and reach out to, our neighbors and friends who might be struggling with their mental health. A card, a call, or a visit could make a huge difference in that individual's outlook on life for that day or week or longer.

From Your Student Pastor . . .

Companioning: The Gift of Presence

I took an impromptu trip back to Colorado last week. A dear friend of mine has retired from her ministry. The last several months, she was embroiled in a controversy that, by ethical standards, prohibited her from telling the entire story. And when people don't have the full story, what do they do? Often, they fill in the blanks with the worst version of the situation they can conceive. To say my friend was embattled during the last months of her ministry would be a gross understatement. People she loved and trusted turned away from her, betrayed their friendship, and hurt her.

Her retirement party – a small affair with just about thirty people who had stayed in relationship with her during this difficult time – was last Saturday. I hadn't planned to go. I'm always busy with my seminary courses, with my day job, with my work at CUCC, with plenty of things to do at home.

But last Tuesday, my heart told me I had to go. Over the past several months, there was little I could do to help my friend through the turmoil. But I did my best to be present to her pain, to listen as she expressed the frustration, the pain, and the feelings of betrayal, to offer compassion and love. I walked beside her, not able to fix anything, just there to accompany my friend through a difficult time. And this gathering last Saturday was a part of that companion journey for which I needed to be present for my friend.

And I'm so glad that I was there with her and for her.

I tell you this story because I know for many of us – me included – we want to fix things. We want to make things better. We want to take away our beloveds' pain. But we can't always do that. And that's ok. We can walk with our beloveds. We can bear witness to their pain. We can listen with our hearts. We can stay when others keep their distance.

Often people who are in pain or grieving a loss can feel alone because those around them feel uncomfortable and keep their distance as a result. What should I say? How should I act? Should I bring up the source of the pain? How can I fix it? And when we can't answer those questions, sometimes we just avoid the person, leaving a beloved who is grieving alone.

And I just want you to know that you don't have to fix it. Your presence is enough. It's a precious gift that you can give to someone you love.

Remember that God means for us to be in community with one another, to love one another, to take care of one another. Our presence and our love are enough. Shelly Adams, Student Pastor



General Synod

Every two years, members of the United Church of Christ come together for a family reunion: a time for education, action, business, and worship. This event is called "General Synod," and this year it is being held June 30 - July 4 in Indianapolis, Indiana.

<u>General Synod</u> gathers over 700 delegates from local churches across the country for the worship and work of the church. In addition, over 2000 visitors, presenters, and honored guests convene with the Synod delegates to constitute the gathered community of faith.

Each gathering of <u>General Synod</u> also features Resolutions of Witness that are brought to the Synod from Local Churches, Conferences, and Associations. It is important to note that these Resolutions are not "handed down" from denominational officers, but they are "handed up" from local congregations. Most of these Resolutions advocate for justice issues, such as affirming the rights of Women to Comprehensive Healthcare (which includes abortion access), affirming the worth of educators in the light of oppressive legislation (such as the draconian anti-education laws in Florida), and affirming the worth of transgender people facing oppression by numerous state legislatures across the country. Each of these Resolutions represents issues that are important to various churches across the denomination, and because we are in community together, we lift up their right to advocacy.

This year, there are 15 Resolutions of Witness being brought to <u>General Synod</u> by various Local Churches, Associations, and Conferences across the country. Copies of these Resolutions are available in the coatroom at church, or they can be emailed to you by request. As you read them, prayerfully consider the children of God who are being impacted by these situations. CUCC in the 1960s

The 1960s was a big decade for The Chapel. Rev. Herb Gessert was the new minister as the 60s began. He and his family lived in the parsonage next door to The Chapel. The resident congregation was growing a lot. The two morning services filled the pews, and there was a need for more Sunday School Classes. Many students were involved in activities and worship all week long, not just on Sundays.

In 1960, a young girl from Wright City named Melba came to Mizzou as a freshman student. She was invited by a Chapel member to participate in the activity there. Soon, she was involved in Chapel activities and stuck with the group. Sixty plus years later, she is now writing this article! Chapel members were always welcoming of new people and college students.

Money was always a problem since The Chapel was not self-supporting. As a mission church, the Missouri Conference was always there to help. The Conference purchased the property south of The Chapel and renovated it for Sunday School classes and a kitchen.

In 1961, Rev. Bill Kerr was called as Associate Minister. He focused on campus ministry while Rev. Gessert worked more with the residential groups. Working together, many great things happened at The Chapel. They took mission trips to St. Louis to work at *Caroline Mission*. They organized retreats at Camp Redbud. In 1963, they entered into a campus ministry program with five other denominations, which became the *Campus Ecumenical Center*. Vacation Bible School began at this time, too. At the end of 1965, The Chapel had a membership of 74 families, with 145 in Sunday School. There was much discussion at this time about how to best accommodate the growing congregation and address the diversity between the students and the town residents.

On December 30, 1965, a fire damaged the front part of the Sanctuary. The building did not burn to the ground, but there was a tremendous amount of smoke and water damage. The congregation was at a crossroads: What to do? Rebuild or relocate? We began meeting at the Baptist Student Center while they decided the next steps. There were no simple answers. Many people thought we should stay on Hitt Steet to be available to the students. Others thought we should move to another property, maybe near a growing area, and just give students a ride to church. Finally, Madeline and Merle Muhrer donated of 5 acres of land west of Columbia, and the decision became clear.

The entire congregation worked to make plans for the future. On May 25, 1966, the congregation voted to move to the land donated by the Muhrers. The Missouri Conference gave the property rights to The Chapel and the parsonage to the congregation, so they could sell these properties. Half the proceeds would go to the new church and the other half to the *Campus Ecumenical Center*. A number of families disagreed with these decisions, and they left the church. It was a sad time for us all.

Rev. Gessert left in 1966, and Rev. Jerry Jordan arrived in 1967. He led us from the "old" church to the "new" church. In September 1966, preliminary plans were drawn up for the new building, and bids were sought. In January 1967, all the bids received were rejected, and the congregation decided to do their own contracting. George Ianke, a local contractor and church member, took the lead in the building project. Ground was broken on Palm Sunday, April 7, 1968. The cornerstone was laid on October 27, 1968.

It was an exciting time, waiting for the new, round church to go up. Families drove to the construction site to watch the builders and imagine the finished church. The Muhrer family had an all-church picnic at their house in the summer of 1968. We could see the new, round church rising from their property. In the summer of 1969, that summer picnic was held on the church property.

Many people gave their time and talents. The Women's Fellowship saved money by making all the drapes. Each month, two couples volunteered to serve as custodians to save money. They also gave rides to students on Sunday mornings. The service of dedication for the new church was September 21, 1969. Before entering the church for the first time, we all walked around the building. There was music, singing, and joy. It was a very special time!

The 1960s began on a high note for The Chapel, and ended on a high note for Columbia United Church of Christ. In between, we suffered tragedy and controversy and a lot of difficult decisions, but as we ended the 1960s, we were once again open for God's business.

Working with <u>The Institute for Intercultural Studies and Research</u> in San Cristobal de las Casas, Chiapas, Mexico, the word "Esperanza" comes up frequently in workshops and presentations.

"Esperanza" in Spanish means "Hope."

In a culture where a history of oppression from multiple sources has fractured the very idea of community, <u>The</u> <u>Institute</u>, one of our Global Missions Partners, is a beacon of Hope: "Esperanza" for the people of Chiapas.

<u>The Institute</u> helps facilitate hope through the workshops they offer, from sustainable living initiatives, to reforestation, to recovering from trauma and healing the heart. All of these, and other programs offered by **The Institute**, bring healing, health, and hope to the participants. It is an infectious hope, as participants bring it back to their communities and share it with their people. The Institute trains people to be trainers, prepares participants to be leaders. Hope shared is hope multiplied, and communities in Chiapas are changed as **The Institute** nurtures their already-present seeds of hope.

The Institute is served by Elena Huegel, our Global Ministries Mission Co-Worker in San Cristobal de las Casas, Chiapas. In a recent workshop, "Esperanza en el Trauma" (Hope in the midst of Trauma), Elena taught the participants about resilience, the capacity to recuperate and thrive despite adversity. She taught them techniques to build resilience, restore dignity, and to address somatic memory issues related to trauma. The participants left with tools not only to nurture hope in the midst of their own trauma, but to be nurturers of others, as well. Nurturing hope in the midst of trauma is the work of our mission partners at **The Institute** distilled to its purest essence.
