

From the Pastor's Keyboard . . .

"From the President"

General Synod, the United Church of Christ general meeting of delegates, representatives, and visitors from all across the world, took place in Kansas City, MO July 11-15. There were many business items discussed; but there were also opportunities for inspirational worship, educational forums, and spiritual growth. There were 36 different workshops on topics on spiritual formation, strengthening the church, leadership development, climate action, and decolonization. The keynote speaker was Jennifer Butler, a faith-based activist and author who spoke about how to bring faith into practice in daily life. Sunday brought a vibrant worship service, with diverse faith leaders from all across the world bringing God's wisdom to the gathered community in wonderful ways, glorifying God in the process.

Other commitments kept me from attending in person, but I did try to keep up with the proceedings by watching the livestream and videos that were presented. One video that really spoke to me was the "State of the Church" address given by the General Minister and President of the United Church of Christ—the Rev. Dr. Karen Georgia Thompson. In this address, she talked about the numerical decline of all mainline protestant denominations, including the United Church of Christ, and the anxiety this produces.

As she names the decline of mainline Christianity, she offers a bit of hope. She asked the gathered crowd, "How do we begin to talk about the things we are doing together, rather than counting the empty seats on Sunday mornings and thinking that is a measure of the vitality of who we are?" She goes on to say, "Our attention to the life of the church has to be disinvested from the ABCs that continue to distract us- Attendance, Buildings and Cash. These ABC distract us from the ways in which our congregations are showing up in the world in meaningful ways."

These are powerful words. I agree with them to an extent. We cannot *simply ignore* the ABCs of the church; they are factors of importance. *But her point is not that we should ignore the numbers; her point is that the church should not let the ABCs deflate us and distract us from all the good the church is doing.* Yes, the UCC is in decline, like every other denomination; but the good, prophetic work that is being done by our denomination to lift up Jesus Christ and glorify God is monumental. *We may not be big and powerful; but we are causing good trouble.* She then went on to detail some of the amazing work the UCC is doing.

Let's bring that message home to CUCC. While we don't want to ignore the ABCs of the church, we also don't want to let them distract us from the good work we are doing. Over the past few years, CUCC has made an amazing impact in God's world, and has brought a beacon of hope to the Columbia Community, just by being us. Our Vacation Bible Schools are legendary, our work with Pridefests, the annual MLK Day celebration, and Earth Day festivals are groundbreaking, and our musical reputation is stellar. Who else in Columbia can say that they host four very active Scouting America units, a queer choral ensemble, <u>and</u> the annual "Quilts for Valor" festival? Not to mention our Little One's Day Out Preschool, with its reputation for being one of the best preschool offerings in Columbia. We do amazing ministry here at CUCC, and we have a reputation in Columbia as being an amazing church. Yes, we do need to grow. We can't keep doing ministry the way we have been without concerning ourselves with the ABCs. But the trick is, not letting the ABCs get us depressed and distract us from doing the work we do so well. We are all only human; and worrying about the ABCs is a very human thing to do.



But- We are called to be something more than merely human; we are also called to be divine. We are all divine reflections of God's presence in the world, and 21st century incarnations of the wisdom of Jesus Christ; and as divine beings, we are called to put aside the human baggage that distracts us from the work of the church. As GMP Thompson said, "We may not be big and powerful; but we are causing good trouble."

Churches that work together in unity despite the challenges of the ABCs grow and thrive; churches that let the ABCs divide them spend so much time worrying that they die out. Though we must not disregard the challenges of the ABCs, we must keep doing the work of Jesus Christ, and not let these challenges cause factors of division to overwhelm us.

We are beacons of light, vessels of hope, heralds of God's joy. Let us -Pastor Rick embrace that identity as we celebrate all the challenges of community!

2025 FESTIVAL OF SHARING

As a cooperative response to hunger, poverty, and justice in Missouri and beyond, the Festival of Sharing hopes to support projects and programs that help neighbors experience healthy and full lives. Their efforts include: providing funding, resources, and goods; sharing information on agency efforts in Missouri; and praying for the collective work of people of faith. This year, CUCC's focus is "Missouri Reading and Writing Packs." Beginning August 3, lists of needed items along with gallon size zipper storage bags will be available in the Gathering Area. Filled bags need to be returned by August 24. The cost of filling a bag is approximately \$15. Each bag will include six new pencils with erasers, one box of 10 markers (10 only,) one pair of child size metal scissors, one 12" ruler, two 70 or 80 page spiral or tape bound notebooks, one zipper pencil holder, four folders with pockets, one large eraser, and two medium point ink pens. The need is great. In 2024, over 2,100 packs were requested, with 1,300 shared. With back to school sales going on, this is a good time to fill a bag!

PASTORAL RELATIONS COMMITTEE

The Pastoral Relations Committee met on June 23 to review feedback from the annual Pastoral Evaluation Survey. These were completed by Council members and provide Pastor Rick an opportunity to reflect on his strengths and develop ideas for change or progress. As they do each year, the results led to rich discussion and goal-setting.

We would like to thank Pat Forward for serving on the Pastoral Relations committee for the past three years. Sue Ann Shaefer has joined the committee as of June to replace Pat, and Mark Duncan was appointed by the Council in July to fill the unexpired term of Mike Pierson. We will continue to meet throughout the year to support the important relationship between Pastor Rick and the congregation.

SUNDAY MORNING SAFETY

For the safety and security of our church, and the people present, a Church Council member is available in the Gathering Area each Sunday during worship. The Council Steward is available to greet visitors who arrive after worship has begun, assist those who may not feel well, answer questions and give directions to people who need to step out of worship, and monitor the Gathering Area as needed.

The Nurture & Education Ministry Team has been talking to our children and youth about being safe at church, including walking - not running - inside our church building, and staying only in the Gathering Area or the sanctuary during Worship. We ask that parents and guardians help reinforce these safety standards and ensure that our children and youth follow these guidelines.

Moderator's Moment

I recently watched a TED Talk about a professor who would welcome students on their first day. He told about how a young lady stood in line to get things for her first day, and she was nervous, had apprehensions about her success and fit for college. He welcomed her as he always did and encouraged her. Behind her stood a young man who was noticing this young lady. The professor had a lollipop and he gave it to the young man and told him to give it to the young lady, hoping this would reduce her anxiety. Three years later, he received a wedding invitation and he reached out to the couple. He didn't know why he was being invited. The young man told him he was the one in line that he gave the lollipop to. The two started dating and now were getting married. He called this a lollipop moment: A moment in time when he did something for someone else and had no idea of its positive impact.

I often think about what lollipop moments we have as Christians. We may never know. It could just be showing up in the same place with a warm smile and accepting hug, bringing your signature dish to a church event, or making sure the plants at church get watered so the space is inviting.

We never know what impact we are making by coming together in worship and play Sometimes we do things we know make an impact, but sometimes seeing someone in church every week doing the little things they do in Christ's love can make just as much of an impact. I appreciate each thing you do for each other to make our church a great place to be. We may never know what kind of impact it is making.

STEWARDSHIP THROUGH SOCIAL MEDIA

Social media is a key part in expanding our church's presence and outreach in the modern era. Even if you rarely use social media, like Facebook, Instagram, Snapchat, etc. it is important to interact with social media posts made by Columbia UCC. You might be thinking to yourself "social media doesn't do much for me, why is it so important to do this?" It is important because sharing our social media posts means more people get to learn about CUCC and will be more inclined to join!

So, how does it work? Social media uses algorithms to determine what to show you. You often see things from groups, pages, or people you follow. This is direct content. When you like, comment, save, or share a post, this creates "engagement" and can make the post pop up on other peoples feeds.

When you "like" a post it has a small chance of popping up on a friends feed. "Liking" is a good start, but does very little for the algorithm. Commenting on a post is even better. Commenting on our posts will help boost our post to other people. These can be as simple as "wonderful service today" or "beautiful photo" or you can even put your favorite emojis! This tells the algorithm "this is an interesting post and more people would probably want to see it."

But "sharing" our posts are by far the best thing you can do! "Sharing" a post on your page allows others to directly see our content. People who may not follow our page are then able to see what we have going on without having to go and find our page - you bring it to them! This allows new people to discover who we are and our mission to spread the Good News. They might even end up coming to church the more they see our wonderful congregation and ministry teams at work.




Outreach & Advocacy Ministry Team

The July 21 meal at Loaves and Fishes consisted of spaghetti, chicken alfredo, salad, bread, and brownies as well as cookies. Peanut butter and jelly sandwiches were made and provided by Jessica Jenks. Servers for the evening were Tom & Mary Lorber, Debby (Mary's sister), Jim Loveless, Jessica Jenks, Anne Heine, Wendy Vandegriffe, and Tim & Tricia Soncasie. There were approximately 155 servings.



Many of us are asking "What can I do?" in light of the growing number of people who can't afford the basics of life. Well, one great answer is "I can help feed hungry people" right here! Our volunteer labor is what makes it possible for the Food Bank to help meet this need in our local area.







Team Earth has led CUCC to learn how we can reduce our individual and collective impact on God's Creation. Lowering our electric bills and carbon emissions by generating our own solar power is one potential way to do that, and we have a unique, time-limited opportunity to explore that possibility.

The City of Columbia and Boone Electric Cooperative are offering a new initiative called Solarize Columbia. It's designed to make it easier and cheaper to install solar panels to power homes, commercial buildings, and nonprofits- including churches. Key features are group discount pricing, streamlined installation, and permitting processes, and potential city rebates and loans.

The best news is that they will provide a free onsite analysis to help potential customers determine whether to proceed with solar installation. The CUCC Council voted in July to pursue this free evaluation process and we have signed up for it. Once the results are in, there will be further discussion of the possibilities.

For more information, see https://www.solarcrowdsource.com/campaign/solarize-columbia/. If you're interested in installing solar panels at home you may want to sign up for the free evaluation, available to all customers of Columbia City Water & Light and Boone Electric Cooperative.

In other news, the City of Columbia has given an update on recycling! Effective immediately, the City of Columbia's Solid Waste utility will begin collecting some recyclable materials under new guidelines. Under these guidelines, the City will not be recycling glass or certain plastics.

The City asks customers to use their blue recycling bags for the following materials: plastic bottles, plastic containers, aluminum beverage cans, metal food cans. Material that should **NOT** be placed in blue recycling bags at this time: glass bottles, glass jars, yogurt cups, clamshell produce containers, dairy product tubs, black plastics or takeout containers, Styrofoam containers, packaging material, plastic bags, trash. Mixed fibers, including cardboard and paper can still be bundled and left on the curb for collection. Fibers should **NOT** be in the blue recycling bags.
