## From the Pastor's Keyboard ...

"Out of Focus"

One year for my birthday, when I was around 11 years old or so, my parents gave me one of the best presents ever - a camera. It was a Kodak Ektralite 500 with a built-in electronic Sensalite flash. My father was something of a shutterbug, and I wanted to follow in his footsteps. I learned quickly how to load the film and use the camera; then, I set out to capture the world on film.

I took pictures of my family and friends, of plants and animals, and of attractions we would visit, such as Grant's Farm or the Arch. I took many pictures of us on rides at Six Flags that summer. I learned to have patience in the practice of dropping my film off at the Fotomat and waiting several days for it to be returned. Opening that envelope was always very exciting. At that time, I would find out what photos were winners and which ones missed the mark. Many of my early photos were completely out of focus.

The Kodak Ektralite 500 was not known for precision focus. The built-in flash often threw off the automatic focus, and the autofocus often chose the wrong subject on which to concentrate. The object you meant to be in focus was not, while other objects were clearer. You would not find out until the film was returned several days later.

Forty years later, I have a camera on my phone that is more advanced than the most technical cameras of the 1980s. It is an iPhone 12 Pro, and the camera is supposed to be one of the best. But even today, sometimes my pictures turn up out of focus, or the object on which I intended to focus is not the one the camera chooses. At least these days, I can view the photo after it was taken and delete it if it is no good.

In today's world, our lives are often out of focus. We live in a world that distorts images, warps them to suit the whims of the world, and obscures the lines between truth and deceit. Our social media feeds are constantly assailing us with opinions that twist the truth into something else, a chimera of what truly is. "Trolls" post false information simply to mislead, and we, as a society, fall for it. Our lives are like those early photos I took as a youth: out of focus.

The purpose of the Lenten Season is to refocus our lives. Jesus Christ, the touchstone and center of our faith, often becomes obscured by the narcissism of the world. During Lent, we spend 40 days devoting our lives to focusing on Christ's presence, Christ's ministry, Christ's political demonstration, and Christ's charge to us to exemplify his life with ours. As we focus our lives on being more like Jesus, God also comes into focus. The God that often seems blurry and distant suddenly becomes sharper the more focused our lives become.

How do we do this? In the traditions of the Church, entire communities gave something up like meat, fat, sugar, alcohol, etc. Sacrifice enabled them to focus on God. Jewish communities often practice sacrifice for Passover,



giving up certain items to focus more clearly on God. Other communities put something on, like sackcloth, ashes, to remind them of their faith and focus. The Jewish practice of covering one's head (using a yarmulke/kippah) is about focusing on God's presence.

I don't generally advocate giving something up as much as taking something on. Try taking on a new commitment. There are many ways to take on something new to focus on God. Commit yourself to intentional daily reading about God, praying, worshipping, or looking for God in some other way. Use a Lenten Devotional such as the ones we gave out in church to focus your life around God. Give God 40 days, and your life will benefit.

This Lenten Season, bring your life into focus; bring God into focus; spend intentional time with Jesus. You will benefit from having a more focused life.

## **New Century Sanctuary**

I am very pleased to be a member of the team that will be leading the effort to raise \$150,000 to renovate our sanctuary. The sanctuary was last renovated in 1989 and the carpet is threadbare, the chancel backdrop is peeling, and the walls and ceiling are stained and badly in need of new paint. New draperies need to be purchased, the transom windows need to be replaced, and new steps and railings need to be installed leading to the chancel. Additionally, we need two new HVAC units.

Some of the work will be done by church volunteers, and a number of fundraising events are being planned as part of our campaign. Most of the cost will need to be raised by financial contributions from our members and

friends, and we will be informing and contacting everyone to help raise the \$150,000. To the side, here is the budget for those things we will need to purchase.



## We talk the talk, now let's walk the walk ...

Welcome to March, which is Women's History Month on the Open and Affirming calendar. We have, in the past, highlighted courageous women who have fought for equality both past and present. Their examples are priceless in the promotion of equality for all. In that light, what can **WE** do, personally, to improve equality in our own orbits?

- **Be a Girl Scout leader or supporter.** Having a single child, and a girl, I wanted her involved in organizations that would empower her. It was important to me that she also develop strong relationships with other young girls. She learned camping, cooperation, planning, and conservation, all in an atmosphere of fun.
- **Be a mentor.** *Big Brothers, Big Sisters in Mid-Missouri*, for instance, gives adults an opportunity to connect and positively impact a young person's life. We all want children to grow up in loving, caring homes; unfortunately, that is not always reality. Mentoring can bring light into a child's life: for those in happy homes, it is more positivity, and for those in troubled homes, some sunshine moments with an adult who cares.
- Watch your language. Use positive affirmations when talking about women and girls. There are so many cliches about older women, larger women, Black women, etc. I, myself, posted on Facebook about my own picture calling myself "that old woman." What was I thinking? Promote positivity.
- **"If you see something, say something!"** That has primarily focused on any negative or dangerous activity you may see or suspect such as abuse. Absolutely say something! It can also be used in the positive. When you see a good deed, let that good deed doer know they are appreciated.
- Vote for women's autonomy and rights; protest decisions, in writing and in person, that adversely affect women, especially the vulnerable. Be aware and take an interest in issues affecting girls and women.

## **NEWS FROM YOUR HEALTH MINISTRY CARE TEAM:**

Thanks to Stephanie Zimny for teaching CPR/AED at our first Heart Healthy Lunch & Learn on February 12. Those present in church that day also got to see where our AED is located (on the sanctuary wall in the gathering area across from the kitchenette). We opened the AED, showed how to apply the pads, turn on the machine, and remain calm. We discussed that in an emergency, we'd ask someone to call 911, send two people to go outside to direct EMS where to go, send others to move people away, and have someone perform CPR or other appropriate first aid. Thanks to the 20 participants who took time on Super Bowl Sunday to learn skills that may save someone's life. Pat yourselves on the back for a job well-done! If you missed out this time, we could do it again, so if interested, let me know. Also, let me know of any other ideas for our *Lunch & Learns*, and we will see about making them happen.

FYI: Those with a diagnosis of hypertension, Medicare will pay for an electronic blood pressure (BP) monitor so you can self-monitor your blood pressures on a regular basis. If you're not Medicare eligible, most insurance companies will reimburse you, as well. When taking your blood pressure, you should do it at the same time, in the same arm, with feet flat on the floor, with your back supported against the chair, on your bare arm or over thin clothing, with your arm supported at the level of your heart. Realize that consuming anything with caffeine or alcohol or exercising or smoking for 30 minutes before taking your BP can affect the accuracy of your results.



Record your Blood Pressure and pulse, and be sure to show your doctor at each visit. Notify your health care provider (HCP) if your blood pressure is elevated above your "normal" readings as directed by your HCP.

We have purchased (and these will be kept in a gray bag over the AED) an electronic BP monitor, Oxygen saturation device, Blood glucose monitor, sugar tablets, and three new first aid kits (located by the AED, in the church office, and in the kitchen downstairs). Extra first aid supplies are in the church office.

Wishing you loving kindness. Say these phrases to yourself and practice this loving kindness meditation: May you be happy. May you be peaceful. May you be well. May you live with ease. May you find deep joy. May you be free of pain. May you be free from harm. May you be free of suffering. May you feel safe. We are here for You, God.

## WHAT IS THE UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST?

The United Church of Christ was founded in 1957, but its roots go all the way back to the Mayflower Pilgrims in 1620, Martin Luther in 1517, and to the life of Jesus Christ, the true leader of our denomination. We are the merger of the Evangelical Church, the Reformed Church, the Congregational Church, and The Christian Church, but we are so much more than that. Over the years we have welcomed many expressions of faith into our common union; we are a "tossed salad" of many diverse ingredients.

For three Sundays this month, March 5, 12, and 19, Pastor Rick will be leading the Adult Contemporary Issues Class all about the United Church of Christ. We will investigate our history, our mission, our structure, our polity, and our future. We will discuss some of the more political ideas championed by some settings of the United Church of Christ, and we will discuss why these settings do not necessarily reflect the views of all settings of the United Church of Christ. Finally, we will talk about General Synod, the biennial meeting of the United Church of Christ, which will be taking place this summer. We will look at issues and resolutions on the agenda and discuss



how we can be part of the united body of Christ that is represented by our denomination.

# Heritage Team

## **PINOCHLE OR MONOPOLY?**

The Heritage Team is celebrating our church's heritage by focusing on a different decade of our church's life each month during our 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary year. This month we are thinking about the Chapel in the 1940s.

Diversity, acceptance, and love were all alive and well at The Chapel when Rev. Harold Wilke was pastor. Rev. Wilke was a special person in many ways. He was born without any arms, but he learned to do everything with his feet. He would eat at a table, drive a car, and do anything else others did. He married his wife, Peggy, while at The Chapel. Rev. Wilke was quite exceptional to be a pastor in the 1940s with such a profound disability. At first, the Evangelical and Reformed Church was hesitant to ordain him, claiming that a pastor with no arms would not be able to consecrate the elements in the Sacrament of Communion. He showed them – he did just fine consecrating the elements with his feet! He would go on to head the UCC Disabilities Ministry and was instrumental in passing the Americans with Disabilities Act. He was present when President George Bush signed the ADA into law in 1990. There is a story that after President Bush signed the law, he handed the pen he used to Rev. Wilke – and Rev. Wilke accepted the pen with his foot! President Bush was quite amused!

I am sure the war was on everyone's mind in the 1940s. Many young Chapel men and a few women are listed in *The Elevator* (the newsletter of The Chapel) as serving in the military during this time. Chapel records also reveal that several Chapel members went on record as Conscientious Objectors to the war.

The May 1941 edition of *The Elevator* listed 27 Columbia residents and 65 students involved in The Chapel activities. There were Sunday morning worship services with choral music, Sunday evening vespers with a group meal, and a discussion group with featured speakers. On Wednesday evenings, the Chapel hosted group discussions and social time. The Chapel was open every day for small groups to get together and have fun in the Social Room. Pinochle was the most popular game, and then, Monopoly came along. Ping Pong was a favorite, so they even started having tournaments.

Also, in 1941, *The Elevator* contains reports from "the church mouse," reporting on things only a mouse would see. He asked questions such as, "What were *so and so* doing in the kitchen with the lights out one night?" He saw all kinds of fun things.

In 1942, the first overtures were made to the Congregational Christian Churches to enter into The Chapel program with the Evangelical and Reformed Churches. This union was made official in 1944, 13 years before the UCC merger.

Frederick Stoerker became pastor of The Chapel in 1943. He and his wife, Mildred, came to Columbia to continue The Chapel program. In 1943, a group was gathered to make toys for Japanese children. The Chapel Guild, 25 ladies, gathered clothes and material for overseas relief. Another group gathered \$100 of scholarship money for Christian Japanese students.

The Sunday evening discussions were sometimes controversial but educational for the students. Topics like the situations in Europe, Communism in China, politics, city planning, and justice issues were addressed by the students, and they brought in prominent speakers from many places to address these issues. A social action group, "The Fellowship of the Concerned," was formed and grew quickly. Students involved

"The Fellowship of the Concerned," was formed and grew quickly. Students involcould pick a subject and run with it, leading it and bringing in speakers, etc.

In April 1948, *The Headliner* (the new name for the newsletter) reported on a great retreat they attended at Camp Aurora. Chapelites had a spring and fall retreat each year, and that tradition continued into the 1970s. They packed a lot of fun and faith into two days!

Next month we will look at The Chapel in the 1950s as we continue celebrating our past, while embracing our future!

# **International Missions**

## CUCC IS SERVING IN BANGLADESH

The people of Bangladesh are concerned about climate change as they experience more frequent and extreme cyclones, tidal waves, flooding, and riverbank erosion. The Christian Commission for Development in Bangladesh (CCDB) responds to these life threatening concerns by training farmers in innovative climate adaptation practices through Community Climate Resilience Centers. One focus for the centers is safe drinking water. The amount of salt in the soil and groundwater affects agricultural activities and creates a safe drinking water crisis. The centers

provide training and funds for projects including climate change risk assessments, climate resilient agriculture, and installing freshwater technology. Through these adaptive techniques, livelihood opportunities, community engagement, and risk assessments, CCDB is working on long-term solutions toward climate resilient communities in Bangladesh.

Columbia United Church of Christ is a partner with CCDB through Global Ministries, our mission partner agency shared with the Disciples of Christ. Through Global Ministries, we have mission partners all over the world, and CUCC is making a difference – even in Bangladesh!



## UCC IS PRESENT IN TURKEY AND SYRIA AFTER EARTHQUAKE

The news continues to unfold about the devastating earthquakes on the border of Turkey and Syria. The death toll continues to rise – numbers are pointing to over 45,000 – depending on the source. This is shattering news and adds to the challenges of the war in this area for over a decade.

Immediately after the earthquake, the UCC posted a prayer and short statement in response to this crisis. While the earthquake was on the border, the tremors were felt as far away as Lebanon and Cyprus. At this time, we are issuing an appeal to help recovery efforts in Turkey and Syria. It is hard to tell what other areas are affected or the extent of the damage from this seismic event.

Our international partners are assessing the needs of survivors. Through our international mission partners, we are providing food, blankets, medicine, clothing, and shelter in response to immediate needs.


# **Book Study with Pastor Rick on Thursdays**

## Are you ready for some REAL TALK?

Pastor Rick is hosting a Book Study focusing on the book "Anti-Racism 4 Reals: Real Talk with Real Strategies in Real Time for Real Change" written by Sheila M. Beckford and Michelle Ledder, two anti-racism trainers and pastors in the Methodist Church. This is not a casual read. They challenge the reader to do more than just talk about anti-racism but to actually do the work of dismantling racism. They challenge the reader to stop talking and get their hands dirty. They ask the question on page 5, "What does it mean to have REAL TALK, not just more talk, about racism and anti-racism?"

This book is not for the faint of heart or for the thin of skin. It serves as an anti-racism template to interrupt and dismantle racism. In doing so, readers may find it unsettling. Some may find it offensive. Some may not make it all the way to the end, but if the reader does make it to the end, they will find enlightening REAL STRATEGIES to work towards creating a more just and loving world, a world more reflective of Jesus' call to unity.

Pastor Rick will be walking through this book with us on Thursdays: March 2, 9, and 16 at 6:30 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall. Copies of the book are available in the church office. We discussed the introduction and Chapter 1 on February 23; Chapters 2, 3, 4, and 5 will be discussed on the consecutive Thursdays. # From Your Student Pastor ...

#### Greetings, friends!

We recently concluded four weeks of great discussion in our Contemporary Issues class focused on the book, "How to Heal Our Divides: A Practical Guide," compiled and edited by Brian Allain and Adam Thomas. We only made it through half the book, so I think we may reprise this later this spring. Stay tuned!

On our last Sunday, we discussed a chapter titled, "America Doesn't Need Fewer Arguments: It Needs Less Stupid Ones." A little blunt, isn't it? But the content is so practical – and so good – I want to share it with all of you. The chapter focuses on *The Better Arguments Project*, which is "based on the idea that the key to addressing division isn't for people to argue less, but to argue <u>better</u>."

The *Project* recommends five principles to practice having healthier arguments. Brace yourself. The first one is tough. It is **take winning off the table**. Are you still with me? Because when I read it, I thought, "If that's the first, how impossible are the next four?" But I tested this one out today in a very contentious meeting. And it worked. Taking winning off the table means engaging with someone with the goal of learning and understanding, not beating them or converting them to your way of thinking.

Number two is **prioritize relationships and listen passionately**, which means starting with a human connection and truly listening. (Instead of thinking about your retort, try to truly hear what the other person is saying and seek to understand.)

And the next is **pay attention to context**. If you can't understand why someone would hold a given opinion, ask them about it. Try to learn more about how they came to believe what they believe.

The fourth is another tough one: **embracing vulnerability.** Having better arguments means really sticking with it through some discomfort. Sometimes it can mean that you discuss your doubts about your own position. Having already embraced the "take winning off the table" principle can help.

And finally, **make room to transform**. Hold open the possibility that your encounter with another person could be so compelling that it opens you to changing your position. And remember that another

person's transformation is not in your control. That's their responsibility.

We all encounter differences and divides – at home, at church, at work, in school, with our extended families, in social situations. Arguments are inevitable. But there's a way to have better arguments, and we may just make our little corner of the world better as we do it. Blessings to all of you!
