## PROFESSOR J. CLINTON MCCANN

J. Clinton McCann, Jr. (Clint) is the Evangelical Professor of Biblical Interpretation at Eden Theological Seminary in Webster Groves, MO. He is a graduate of Davidson College (A. B.), Union Presbyterian Seminary (D. Min., Th. M.), and Duke University (Ph. D.). He was chair of the Psalms Section of the Society of Biblical Literature from 1989 to 1998, and much of his research and writing has focused on the Book of Psalms. He is author of *A Theological Introduction to the Book of Psalms: The Psalms as Torah* (Abingdon, 1993); editor of and contributor to *The Shape and Shaping of the Psalter* (JSOT, 1993); author of the Psalms entries in *Texts for Preaching: A Lectionary Commentary Based on the NRSV – Year C* (Westminster John Knox, 1994); author of “The Psalms: Introduction, Commentary, and Reflections” in *The New Interpreter’s Bible* (Vol. 4, pp. 641-1280; Abingdon, 1996); as well as many other books and commentaries on Psalms, including over 40 essays for [workingpreacher.org](http://workingpreacher.org). Clint is also the author of *Judges*, a commentary in the Interpretation series (John Knox, 2002).

Clint has served frequently as a teacher of the Psalms and other biblical material at many noted academic forums. He has taught, preached, and led workshops for church and academic gatherings in twenty-seven states, including over one hundred congregations representing twelve denominations. Clint is a Teaching Elder (Ordained Minister) in the Presbyterian Church (USA) and a member of the Presbytery of Giddings-Lovejoy. Before he began teaching at Eden, he was a pastor for ten years in North Carolina. He served for sixteen summers as the Resident Minister of the New Piasa Chautauqua near Elsah, IL; and he is an Associate Member of the Iona Community, which is based on the Isle of Iona, and Glasgow, Scotland, and which is committed to the pursuit of peace, justice, and the flourishing of creation.

Among Clint’s interests are the theological dimensions of popular music, and Latin American theology and biblical interpretation. Growing out of the former of these, he co-authored *Facing the Music: Faith and Meaning in Popular Songs* (Chalice, 1999). Growing out of the latter of these, he led groups of students on study/travel seminars to Guatemala and Costa Rica in 2001, 2003, and 2005; to Nicaragua and Costa Rica in 2008 and 2015; to El Salvador and Costa Rica in 2013 and 2019; to El Salvador in 2018 and 2024; and to Cuba in 2017. Clint is the Co-Chair of the International Board of IPM (International Partners in Mission), which has partners in Latin America and other parts of the world.

Clint’s wife, Sarah, is the pastor of Hope UCC in St. Louis, MO. He has three daughters – Jennifer, Sarah, and Annalise – and a son, Ian. Clint may be contacted at 314.395.5826 or 314.619.0599 or via email at [cmccann@eden.edu](mailto:cmccann@eden.edu).

April is Autism Awareness Month. Autism is formally known as “autism spectrum disorder” or ASD. Approximately one in 36 children are affected. Through years of research, researchers have gained the increased ability to recognize and diagnose the various characteristics of the condition. Individuals with autism tend to have difficulty with communication and social interactions in comparison to those who are neurotypical. They often have specific interests, and repetitive behaviors making school, work and other areas of life challenging.<sup>1</sup>

What causes autism is still under investigation. Possible factors are: older parents, certain genetic conditions, and low birth weight. Some studies show that the rate of autism is increasing. There are several hypotheses as to why, including: prenatal exposure to air pollution and/or certain pesticides; maternal obesity, diabetes, a compromised immune system; a difficult delivery causing oxygen deprivation to the baby.<sup>1</sup>

Some examples of symptoms of ASD are: delayed language and movement skills beginning in infancy; delayed cognitive or learning skills; hyperactive, impulsive, or inattentive behavior; anxiety, stress, or excessive worry, repetition of words or phrases (echolalia); repetitive body movements (stims); difficulty adapting to minor changes; obsessive interests; difficulty comprehending social and emotional cues.<sup>2</sup> These are some of the major symptoms that doctors and parents look out for in children especially.

A diagnosis is the result of examining symptoms to determine an illness or other issue. Diagnosing is the first step to open the doors to understanding what is going on and what to expect from it. In terms of autism, like many other mental and physical disorders, a diagnosis not only normalizes what's going on with those around us, but opens a dialogue and lets education flow. Like any disorder, autism can vary in intensity for each person living with it. One person may be labeled as what is called “low-functioning”, meaning they need more aid to function at a neurotypical persons level. Another person may be labeled as “high-functioning”, meaning they may only need help sometimes or on certain things or maybe not at all. While some may fall into the low or high functioning categories, some may be in the middle. It is known as an Autism Spectrum Disorder because each person is somewhere on a spectrum.

Part of awareness month is not just reading articles or donating money, but truly understanding all sides of the community. Some people with ASD strongly dislike the idea of a cure, because they are not broken or ill. Some people with ASD strongly want a cure to be found or created so they can live a “normal” life.<sup>3</sup> This is just one example of discussions going on in the community. There are also talks of what therapies and symptom controls are helpful versus harmful, such as Applied Behavior Analysis therapy. The best way to learn about ASD and what life is like for people who are diagnosed with it is to talk to them in person or read their books or articles - learn from the source.
