From the Pastor's Keyboard ...

"Where Do We Go From Here?

The December Church Council meeting was the place for some great discussion about thinking "outside of the box" in congregational ministry. We have been reading a book by Bob Smietana titled, "Reorganized Religion – the Reshaping of the American Church and Why it Matters." This book discusses the changes we are seeing in worship and service post-pandemic; and reflects on why people are moving away from church toward more secular interests.

We are just getting to the good part -- "Where do we go from here?" We will be studying these final three chapters in the next few months as we prepare to ask ourselves as congregational leadership, "Where do we, CUCC, go from here?" One thing is for certain; we cannot keep doing things the way we have "always" been doing them. How our children "do church" will be very different than the way we have "always done church."

But the reality is, the church is always changing to reflect the spirituality of the times. Church today is very different than it was 40 years ago, back in the 1980s, and church in the 1980s was very different than church in the 1940s. If church is to be relevant and vital, it must always adapt with the times.

"God is Still Speaking . . ." What does this really mean? This tells us that God is speaking to us through the cultural context of our times. God is challenging us in ways that differ from previous generations; and that is wonderful. The church that is not of its current context is a church that is irrelevant. But the question still remains . . . where do we go from here?

It is noteworthy to mention that finances are a factor in this discernment process. We finished the 2022 fiscal year \$38,000 behind in Joyful Giving, and every indication at Communicator deadline is that we will finish 2023 about the same abound behind. Part of our discernment as Church leadership revolves around the fiscal question of how can we continue to support our current ministry programs with deficits such as this. "Passing the Plate" sustained the ministries of the church for many years, but will that be sufficient in the future?

Where do we go from here? Sustaining the church is not about simply propping up a declining institution. The church, in its purest sense, is about transforming the world. The church, when it is acting as a true church and not just a clubhouse, is the most effective means of doing Jesus' work in the world. Without the church, the hungry would not get fed, the thirsty would not get quenched, and the mighty would not get challenged. The church, speaking out for justice, changes the world. The loss of that would be monumental to our culture. As Bob Smietana writes in the aforementioned book, "Churches are important; and the decline of organized religion will affect all of us, whether we are religious or not. A world without organized religion (the church) is not a better place."

You will be hearing more from our CUCC Ministry Teams in 2024 about new ways to "be the church." We hope you will take all considerations into your heart and think about ways you can be the church in the world. In the meantime, I would like to invite you to undertake several intentional practices, some

"New Year Resolutions" if you will:

Publicize our church on Facebook: "Share" (don't just "like") CUCC Facebook posts.

• Share our livestreamed worship services with friends; post them on social media.

• Invite a friend to worship, and to church dinners.

• Commit to being present in worship and other church activities.


• Come to a Bible Study or Book Study this Spring.

From your student pastor



Hello, Friends! I had intended to write about creation justice this month, but I keep getting called back to the idea of hope, so creation justice will need to wait one more month. But be on the lookout for plans that are underway to be in conversation about creation justice in 2024.

Hope, on one hand, is such an essential part of our faith. On the other hand, we use the word so casually: "I hope it doesn't rain," "I hope there are some cookies left," "I hope I'm not late for my appointment."

I don't necessarily believe that hope requires an object – like a sunny day, a cookie, and an on-time appointment. Rather, I believe that hope is an end unto itself – a gift of our faith. Our belief in God gives us hope that, no matter what pain, suffering, and grief that we suffer, in the end, the glory of God's kingdom outweighs temporal pain in ways we could never measure.

Still, we hope for good here on earth. We hope that humanity, and how we live in harmony with each other and with all of creation, arcs upward. But sometimes the arc looks really slow from our human perspective. In our personal lives, there are struggles, difficult relationships, difficulties brought on by our own imperfections and those of people with whom we interact. On a larger scale, there is strife in our own government. There is conflict in Israel and Palestine and war in Ukraine. All of this – and more – can make hope challenging.

Still, I believe our faith offers us the gift of hope. And we can choose hope – or not – over and over again throughout our lives. We can be the source of hope for others. When things around us look dark, we can choose to act in ways that bring a flicker of hope to people we encounter. Perhaps you've heard the saying, "We're all here to walk each other home." Being the source of hope along the way, through a show of kindness, generosity, or tenderness, is part of walking each other home. The good news is that the people of CUCC possess kindness, generosity, and tenderness in great quantities. You bring flickers of hope to people through VAC Christmas gifts, through ministry at the food pantry, Room at the Inn, and Alpha Hart Lewis Elementary. You bring hope to one another in so many ways. In these flickers of hope, you are incarnations of God's love. That's a really big deal.

I want to share with you a **YouTube video** that I watch when I need to have my own hope boosted. It's an event led by Koolulam, a social musical initiative aimed at empowering communities and strengthening the fabric of society. The event was held in Haifa, Israel in 2020. More than 3,000 people from various religions – Muslim, Jewish, Christian, and more – from many different countries came together, learned the song "One Day," which has a message of peace and love, and they performed it together. It's amazing. I have watched it several times since the October 7 attack in Israel. It feeds my soul and brings me hope that we can grow to live together as a peaceful world community. I pray it does the same for you.





CUCC Council Meeting — November 21, 2023

Jerry Kiesling discussed our book **Reorganized Religion**, Chapter 6: "The Land of Mini and Mega Churches." We now have fewer Mega Churches. There is a net loss of 1/3 of the churches every year. A whopping 10% of churches now have 50% of the worshippers they previously had. Smaller churches have more intimacy, and the pastor is more accessible.

Unfinished Business:

- Spots were filled for stewardship duties.
- Worship Sanctuary Updates: Most things are completed. Still waiting on the drapes and the ribbing at the front of the altar.
- Policy and Procedures Manual Update: Personnel Committee started the review this evening.
- Clergy Personnel Committee/Annual Pastoral Review: The review is completed.
- Vision Team: Looking to increase the collaboration among the ministry teams.
- Inclusion Ramp for the Sanctuary: Tricia is still working on collecting all the information needed.
- Server Update: New Server has been completed, and it went flawlessly.

New Business:

- Pastor Rick's laptop had some issues that have now been resolved.
- A request to purchase a new keyboard was received from the worship committee. We received a bid of \$1,299.99. A stand or amplifier is not needed. The money will come from the Worship and Music Designated Fund. Moton passed.
- Annual Reports are due December 31.
- Annual Congregational Meeting is scheduled for May 19, 2024.
- Financials were presented. We are under budget in Joyful Giving and over budget on expenses. Giving Tuesday is coming up. They hope to raise \$25,000 with 90% going toward Joyful Giving.

Ministry Reports:

- Building and Grounds: Ted has worked on a gate in the LODO area and a door in the sanctuary.
- Fellowship and Hospitality: Advent Banquet will be December 10 after the Cantata.
- Finance and Stewardship: Giving Tuesday is November 28. They are promoting it through Facebook. We are giving 10% of money received to the Fisher House, which is associated with the VA Hospital.
- Inclusion & Affirmation: June 1 and 2, the choir from Kansas City will be here.
- LODO: Lorry Dreier stated that enrollment is down.
- Membership & Care: They will be calling inactive members and working on a Handy Helpful Ministry Team.
- Nurture & Education: November 19 was Pajama and Gingerbread Decorating Sunday. The Advent postcard went out today. We plan on contacting youth and children to encourage more attendance. There will be a special Sunday once a month. Cookies by the Pound will be December 10. Linda Hayward is running the children's program December 17.



Copies of the book are available in the church office; pick up yours today and read ahead! If you have any questions, talk to Pastor Rick.




FINANCE & STEWARDSHIP MINISTRY TEAM

The Importance of Building Social/Emotional Skills in Young Children

Parenting and caring for young can often feel overwhelming. Children have <u>BIG</u> emotions and have yet to build the skills necessary to control their behaviors when they feel a lack of control over their bodies. Acknowledging the feelings and emotions of toddlers and preschoolers is imperative to their social/emotional growth. Emotional learning occurs through play, crafts, songs, and books. Children can best be supported by giving them time to move and play.

A first step in building social/emotional skills is to help children recognize and identify what they are feeling, and then validating their feelings. Many young children are unable to identify their feelings, but using a visual Emotions Chart will allow you to work with your child to match their feeling to the pictures. This opens up the opportunity to further talk about why a child feels that way and what may help them to feel happy/safe/calm. There are many Emotion Charts available with a quick internet search. When faced with strong emotions/behaviors, the best thing you can do is to share your calm. Breathing exercises can help children and adults reach the level of calm required to talk through an undesired behavior. Many breathing exercises can be found with an internet search, and there will be some trial and error in finding the breathing exercises that work best for your individual child. Here are a few of the many breathing exercises we practice at LODO.

In our busy lives it can be hard to slow down and take time to work through strong emotions with our children. When we take the time to help children understand the feelings that they are experiencing, validate their feelings, and teach them approaches to managing their emotions, children will build the skills necessary to self-regulate their emotions as they grow.

LODO will be closed through January 2 for Christmas Break. We return on Wednesday, January 3 and will review school expectations to jump right back into learning.

CUCC IS WORKING IN FIJI

The Pacific Conference of Churches (PCC) in Fiji is an ecumenical organization representing Christian denominations across the Pacific region. The PCC fosters cooperation and dialogue among diverse Christian communities across the Pacific. Advocating for social justice, human rights, and environmental sustainability, the PCC addresses pressing issues like climate change and regional conflicts. The PCC"s impact reaches beyond

religious boundaries by engaging in humanitarian efforts, disaster response, and empowerment programs for religious communities. Through the collective efforts of its member churches, the PCC is promoting peace, equality, and holistic well-being in the Pacific region.

Through <u>Global Ministries</u>, CUCC is a partner in mission with the Pacific Conference of Churches in Fiji (PCC), and through them, we are actively working in many Christian communities in the Pacific. In this New Year, please keep Global Ministries, the PCC, and the people of Fiji in your prayers!



DSPR UPDATE FROM GAZA

The Department of Service for Palestinian Refugees (DSPR) of the Middle East Council of Churches (MECC), one of our Global Missions Partners, has provided this update about their ministry in Gaza

The situation continues to be very dangerous and catastrophic; the airstrikes and artillery bombardment of buildings, institutions, and residential locations are intense, stronger, and nonstop. It's creating more damage and forcibly displacing more people to the south, while the south became a target for increasing attacks and invasion for the last 3 days! This has also severely affected our staff and premises. Unfortunately, our medical center in the Al-Daraj area has been bombarded and leveled to the ground, and the primary health care clinics, the pharmacy, the optical and the dental clinics, and the psycho-social unit do not exist anymore. Nevertheless, our staff is proceeding in response to the huge needs and to reduce the pain and suffering of the people in Gaza. We are proud of them. We believe that they are real heroes. They are standing for care and support, working days and nights while trying to take care of their family members and themselves. Below is a summary of our work in Gaza that our colleagues are conducting under fire:

- We are working with the forcibly displaced people in the south of the Gaza Strip, especially children and mothers, to help alleviate the psychological pressure they have as a result of the traumatic experiences and to reduce the possible development of this into a psychological illness.
- We are conducting sessions in psychological First Aid to train groups of people to be helpers and reduce panic in emergencies, which is always there.
- We are distributing hygiene kits to help raise the level of hygiene and cleanness and reduce the spread of communicable diseases.
- We are organizing health awareness days for groups of mothers to achieve better health and nutrition behaviors.
- We are receiving the people in our Clinic for primary health care services, including offering some medicine and health supplies.
- We are offering unrestricted cash distributions to 620 households, \$100-200 USD, through the system we organized with the Bank of Palestine, which will check the eligibility and send the money to individuals.
- Most of the 800 Christian Community members remain in the two Churches. We managed to bring them food and some basic supplies during the pause. They are in dire need of medicine for specific cases, and we are trying our best, but with little success. The invasion now is very close to the Christian churches.

Please continue to keep the people in Gaza and the work of the DSPR-MECC in your prayers in the New Year.

The violence continues, and their work is far from over!

Pastor Rick and I met with the AHL administration on December 11 and noted the following. Please mark your calendars for the various support opportunities:



AHL also notified CUCC of one family who "fell through the cracks" and still had needs for the Holiday, and we/CUCC provided "Christmas" for that family in the same way we supported those families through the Voluntary Action Center (VAC) program.

- 4-15-2024 Week Provide snacks for students during MAP Testing week of April 22. CUCC can bring individual packages of goldfish, fruit snacks, granola, and mints (no dairy & no peanuts).
- 5-6-2024 Week Teacher Appreciation Week; Dr. Minear will let CUCC know how we might support.
- **5-10-2024** Carnival (this year on Friday evening) from 5:30 7:30 p.m.. CUCC volunteers requested.
- 5-14-2024 5th grade field trip to BizTown Junior Achievement in St. Louis (chaperones needed).

Also, it was mentioned about an opportunity for **volunteers to help coach** during the Home School Coordinators Basketball games/teams around March 2024. This requires an interview and background check.

Dr. Minear and Pastor Rick discussed staff changes, AHL's new Music Teacher, Mr. Silvey, and CUCC's new Music Coordinator, Mr. Casey Wood. We hope they can meet each other, but they may not be able to do a joint music event this year with both of them having a lot of work this year, in their new positions.
