

From the Pastor's Keyboard ...

"Freedom

I am writing this article on the two-year anniversary of one of the darkest days I have ever seen in the life of our country; the anniversary of the Dobbs decision before the Supreme Court, where for the first time in our history, constitutional freedoms for individuals interpreted by a sitting Supreme Court were taken away by a later, more regressive sitting Supreme Court. This 2022 Dobbs decision reversed the 1973 Roe v. Wade decision that granted women freedom over their own bodies, taking vital freedoms away from half of the citizens of the United States. Women growing up today have significantly less freedom than women growing up a generation ago.

This regression of freedom has caused me to think considerably about the idea of freedom over the past two years; and I am not alone. All across the country, U.S. citizens have seen their freedoms taken away by legislators and judges who subscribe to the new fascism that has seized the thought processes of many in our country. This fascist oppression has caused many to ask: "what is freedom, really?"

There is no such thing as true freedom. Even in a "free country" one is not free to do anything one chooses. We are still not "free" to yell "fire" in a crowded movie theatre. We are not "free" to operate dangerous equipment without training and licensure. We are not "free" to commit actions that harm others. Freedom is not something you can touch, it is an intangible concept; it is an ideal to live into.

When our founders put structure to this country in 1789, they did so with the ideals of freedom ringing in their ears; but by the time our founding documents were inked, the freedoms that were articulated were only conferred on white men. Black men did not receive any degree of freedom until June 19, 1865 and women did not receive freedom to vote until August, 1920. Many Asians and Black Women were denied the freedom to vote until the passage of the Voting Rights Act of 1965. The freedom to marry across racial lines was not granted to interracial couples until 1967 and the queer community did not gain the freedom to marry whomever they love until 2015. Women did not gain control over their own bodies until 1973; a freedom that would be taken away from them 49 years later. Last week, freedom from religious oppression was taken away from every student in Louisiana Public Schools who will now be indoctrinated by a very narrow view of religion. What we label as a "free country" does not have a very clean history of "freedom."

Maybe "freedom" is not something we have, as much as it is something aspirational. Maybe "freedom" is something we draw out, a bit at a time; live into, struggle with, and struggle for. Maybe "freedom" is an unattainable goal, but a goal to strive for nonetheless. Maybe "freedom" is something that will always be just over the horizon, like a rainbow that we can't reach out and touch but that brightens our souls anyway.



A mentor of mine once said that "freedom is the right to chose for yourself whom you will serve." In other words, freedom is still servitude; but serving whom you choose. As Christians, we are called by Jesus to serve a God who is inclusive of all, pluralistic in relationship, and not bound by the doctrines of humanity. We are called to serve a God who affirms the value and worth of each person. We are called to serve a God of limitless love and we are called to exemplify that ourselves.

The freedom-denying fascists of our society are seeking to take away our freedoms to choose, to love, to think intelligently, and to live as God intends us to live. It is up to us to fight for our freedom, just as our ancestors have. For now, we still have the freedom to choose for ourselves whom we will serve. It is time to make that choice. Who will we serve, God or Mammon?

CUCC Church Council

The meeting was called to order at 6:33 p.m. by Kurt Heine. Pastor Rick opened us with prayer. Present: Kurt Heine, Jerry Kiesling, Sue Ann Schaefer, Christine Staelens, Ted Dachroeden, Mary Lorber-Solt, Keith Birkes, Tricia Price, Lorry Dreier, Pat Forward, Mark Duncan, Rick Oberle, Alethea Tennill, Lena Muench, Jed Schneider, Deb Birkes, and Jessica Lucas.

Motion to approve the agenda passed. Motion to approve the April minutes passed.

Unfinished Business:

- * Policy and Procedures Manual Update: Personnel Committee met in May. Added parental leave.
- * Land Donation Update: Closing date is set for June 2.
- * HVAC Bid: Three units have been replaced. Ted suggested that we get a security camera over the units.
- Council Retreat: The retreat has been set for Thursday, June 6 at 6 p.m. at The Heidelberg.

New Business:

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- Scout Troop Charter: Bob Maltsbarger and other scout leaders proposed use of our church for their meetings. It would include Scout Troop 708 (boys), Scout Troop 4475 (girls), and Cub Scout Troop 5183. Some equipment will be stored on our property; our church will hold the title to the trailers with liability insurance. We will authorize them to open an extra checking account. They are hoping to also participate in our worship services. Motion passed.
- Purchase bus for the church: Jessica Lucas proposed that we purchase a 14-passenger bus from St. John UCC in St. Charles for \$7,500. Motion coming from council to purchase the bus. Motion passed.
- Urban Mission Experience: Pastor Rick discussed initiating a COMO Mission Experience at CUCC. Groups of youth would be hosted at our church during the week and coordinate mission work in Columbia for non-profit agencies that we serve during the year. Moving forward with the idea.
- Appoint new LODO Ministry Team Members: The nomination committee made a motion to appoint Christine Meske and Lydia Whitacre to the LODO Ministry Team. Motion passed.
- Mader Fund: The congregation voted at the meeting in May to create an Endowment fund for CUCC. Once the Endowment Fund reaches \$500,000, four percent of the profit will be used to support the budget. Keith Birkes made a motion to transfer from the Mader Fund \$60,000 to the Endowment Fund, \$5,000 to Transportation Fund, and the rest to be moved to undesignated church funds. Ted Dachroeden seconded the motion. Motion passed.
- Council Meetings will remain on the 3rd Tuesday of the month at 6:30 p.m.
- Finance & Stewardship Chair is still open: The nominating committee is still working on finding someone to fill this position.

Pastor's Report: Pastor's Report is attached. Financials were presented.

Ministry Reports:

- Fellowship & Hospitality: Questionnaires were handed out at the annual meeting to determine what activities the congregation would like. They received 48 questionnaires back.
- * Finance & Stewardship: They are starting to promote the Endowment Fund.
- Inclusion & Affirmation: The handicapped access ramp is available for the chancel steps. The book shelves for the children in the sanctuary have spotlights on them.
- Nurture & Education: Lainey will be in the nursery during the summer. VBS is in July.
- Outreach & Advocacy: Missourians for Constitutional Freedom acquired double the number of signatures needed. It will be on the November ballot. "Green Team" will begin exploring and caring for the world we live in.
- Worship & Music; LODO; Membership & Care; Building & Grounds: Reports attached.

Pastor Rick closed us in prayer. Motion to adjourn by Lorry Dreier, second by Tricia Price. Motion passed. Meeting adjourned at 8:20 p.m.




Finance & Stewardship Ministry Team

Moderator's Moment

Take one dose every couple of weeks or once per month as directed. Side effects may include: increased sense of purpose and belonging in your church, sense of well being, positive interactions with types of people that you don't normally interact with, broken barriers and divisions of what separates us, loss of a sense of entitlement, and the overwhelming feeling of Christian love. If there was an tv commercial for a prescription drug called "volunteering," I think this is what it would sound like. I came up with this idea because I was thinking about why I volunteer and I thought about how the "side effects" of volunteering in general overshadow or outweigh the initial intended purpose, much like a drug commercial where the side effects are read off at a lightning fast clip just so they can fit into a 30 second spot.

As a teenager my parents encouraged me to volunteer so that I could have something to put on my resume for college and scholarship applications. I begrudgingly signed up for the City Of Columbia's Volunteer program, which connected youth with various volunteer opportunities, and for two summers I did a whole lot of volunteering. Special Olympics, bike races, food pantry, parades, the list went on and on. Then later in my life, I got involved helping out with the True/False film festival. I got assigned to the set up crew with the Missouri River relief folks, they had the trucks and trailers necessary to move large quantities of tables, chairs, stage risers, kiosks and wacky art installations that have become a hallmark of the fest. In all the

instances of volunteering I have come to find that the side effects, though they may not be immediate, have helped to shape my positive outlook on humanity. I may not have gotten those big ticket scholarships, but what I gained from those experiences will stay with me forever.

When a group of strangers can come together, coordinate efforts, and pull something off, that is truly magic. Our ministry teams have that same magic within them, they just need one ingredient- you. Please come to the ministry

team fair on August 25 after church to find out where you fit best. Any level of involvement, no matter how small is a help and a blessing to this church family.

Of course, I've been visiting family and friends, but I've also taken many opportunities to set up various music events. It was something all of the singers were very excited about as well. Almost all of those singers are either students or professionals in an area other than music. How is God Calling CUCC to Care for God's Creation?

Dear friends, many of you are likely familiar with the book "The Giving Tree" by Shel Silverstein. It's a story that holds many lessons about how we live with and among one another. In the book, a young boy meets and befriends a tree. Over the course of the book, the boy asks the tree for parts of itself, beginning with an apple, then its branches, and eventually the boy takes and takes and takes and all that is left of the tree is a stump with nothing left to give. Many see this as a story of generosity. But it's also a story of self-sacrifice on the part of the tree and unsustainable consumption on the part of the boy. I see this story not just as a story about a boy and a tree, but a story of humankind and God's creation.

Like the tree, God's creation has limited resources. And like the boy, we continue to extract more and more from creation to satisfy our needs - personally and collectively. But we know that God calls us to be stewards of God's creation. Stewardship involves responsibility and care - care for creation and care for those among us who are most impacted by our often acquisitive, extractive ways of using the gifts of creation. We often use water as if it's an unlimited resource, yet there are many among us who don't have enough water. Our industrial practices release greenhouse gasses into the atmosphere, contributing to the changing climate we are experiencing. Highly intensive factory farming practices, fueled by our own food choices, are taking a toll on God's creation.

Our congregation can't completely eliminate these issues. But what we can do is discern what God is calling us to do to care for God's creation. What does that look like? It starts with prayer. Individually and collectively, we can pray, listening for God's still, small voice. And it continues with openness to learning and the willingness to examine our own daily practices and how they impact creation, and discernment together on how CUCC can be faithful stewards of the earth.

To that end, we are assembling "Team Earth" at CUCC to lead that discernment process. Pastor Rick, Llona, Mahree, and I have been meeting to get things started. We're having our first official Team Earth meeting on Sunday, July 14, right after worship. Some of you have already expressed interest in participating on Team Earth. All are welcome to join us as we learn and discern. If you have questions, reach out to Pastor Rick, Mahree, Llona, and me. Please

join us on July 14 as we begin this important discussion as a faith community.

"Thought breeds thought; children familiar with great thoughts take as naturally to thinking for themselves as the wellnourished body takes to growing; and we must bear in mind that growth, physical, intellectual, moral, spiritual, is the sole end of education." - Charlotte Mason

As I've had the occasion lately to bury my head in policies and descriptions while preparing for this new role as LODO Ministry Chair, I was reminded of the importance of it all, especially for our little ones. It is our duty as the LODO Ministry Team to facilitate a nurturing educational environment for preschool children in our community and our church family. This is not only our duty as the ministry team, but our calling as a church body. I love this quote by Charlotte Mason who sees the development of a child as a whole body, not as individual parts to be addressed separately. In fact, her first and most important principle is that "children are born persons"- whole persons! Certainly a person in need of nourishment, guidance, and most importantly, love and acceptance. A thought to consider as we turn our eyes not only this past month to God's abundant and steadfast love, but also forward to the importance of LODO as a vital part of the health and service of this church body.

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EXCITING NEW HAPPENINGS AT CUCC!

There are lots of exciting things happening at CUCC! From our Annual Congregational Meeting to our June Council meeting, several decisions were made that will change the future of our church. We hope you are getting excited, because great things are in store for us. The best is yet to come for CUCC!

ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

At our Annual Congregational Meeting on May 19, we elected new Council Members. The entire Council roster is on page three of this Communicator. New members include: Deborah Long Birkes, Treasurer; Lena Muench, Nurture & Education Ministry Team Chair; Jedd Schneider, Worship & Music Ministry Team Chair; and Kristin Veteto, LODO Ministry Team Chair. Ted Dachroeden (Building & Grounds) and Alethea Tennill (Secretary) were re-elected for second terms.

CUCC ENDOWMENT FUND

Also at the Annual Congregational Meeting, the Congregation approved establishing an Endowment Fund. The descriptive language for this fund was distributed to the congregation in March and in subsequent Friday emails. Over the next five years or so, the Finance & Stewardship Ministry Team will be marketing this fund, soliciting donations to grow it to a critical mass. Once it reaches \$500,000 we will utilize a 4% annual draw to supplement our Annual Budget. The goal for this fund is \$2,000,000 and will be achieved through estate donations, stock donations, living trusts, and other donations. Reaching our goal of \$2,000,000 over the next few years will bring a significant level of financial security to this congregation. The fund already has \$50,000 in it, the result of a donation from the Alan Mader Estate.

SCOUTING AMERICA PARTNERSHIP

At our May Council meeting, we entertained a proposal to enter into a charter with an established Scouting America Unit who is looking for a new charter organization. The Council approved entering into this charter agreement, and the new Scouting Unit will begin meeting here in August. This is a very significant relationship for CUCC. This group is not just a rental group; they will be "our" scouts. We will work with them to nurture them and support their work, and they will do the same for us. They will be very visible in the life of our church, and even in our worship life. The unit consists of four troops, including a Cub Scout Troop, a boys group, a girls group, and a Venture Troop. Over 100 Scouts and 50 adult leaders are chartered with this Unit. You will be seeing much more of these scouts as they work with us, and as we enable each other's ministries.

CUCC MISSION TRIP DESTINATION – 2025 AND BEYOND

We also entertained a proposal at the May Council Meeting from the Nurture & Education Ministry Team and the Outreach & Advocacy Ministry Team to make CUCC a mission trip destination for church youth groups all across Missouri and beyond. Modeling after a very successful program in St. Louis (The Urban Mission Experience), we will be working with local non-profit agencies in Columbia to offer service opportunities in the summer of 2025 for churches and youth looking for a mission trip experience. We will be marketing this program to churches across rural Missouri and other states, inviting them to stay for a few days at CUCC and participate in service opportunities we put together.

Mission Groups would sign behavioral covenants regarding their stay at CUCC. The average group would stay three to four nights, in two of our Sunday School classrooms upstairs. During the day, they would work with our mission partners, such as The Food Bank, Ronald McDonald House, Fisher House, etc. participating in service opportunities. Tours of Mizzou, Columbia College, and Stephens College would be offered. We would prepare one meal for them during their stay, and lead them in a program one evening. Groups would pay a set fee per person per night; we anticipate bringing in \$9,600 our first year.

CHURCH BUS PURCHASE

At our May Meeting, the Council also approved a proposal brought by the Membership & Care Ministry Team to purchase a used church bus from St. John UCC in St. Charles, MO. They are selling of one of their busses, and offered it to us for \$7,500 (below blue book value). It is a 15-passenger, 2006 Ford step bus and could be utilized for youth events, Women's Fellowship trips, picking up church members for worship, or other special trips. It is much more versatile than our current van, and much more practical for our purposes. Funds for this purchase will come from the Transportation Fund, one of our investments with United Church Funds. As we will be using this bus more than our current van, there may be more expenses incurred. Any donations to the Transportation Fund to offset maintenance expenses would be appreciated. If you are interested in donating, talk to Kurt Heine, Moderator; Jerry Kiesling, Vice-Moderator; or Deborah Long Birkes, Treasurer.

Through <u>Global Ministries</u>, CUCC is a partner in mission with The Congregational Church of Southern Africa (UCCSA) and Inanda Seminary and, through them, we are actively working in many families in South Africa. DR. NIBEDITA PRAMANIK AVAILABLE TO SPEAK IN CHURCHES THIS FALL

Global Ministries is happy to share that a Partner-in-Residence will be available to visit churches this Fall. Dr. Nibedita Pramanik will be available to speak from September 8 through October 24, 2024. Dr. Pramanik is the director of Evangelical Hospital Society Khariar, India. She has been serving this institution since 2007 in different capacities: as a junior medical officer, as a general and laparoscopic surgeon, and starting in 2015 as the director of the hospital. She trained at the CMC Vellore medical school and received additional training in urology in 2022. She was moved by the poverty and crying medical need of the area and heeded God's call for her to commit her life to missions. She dreams of making Evangelical Hospital Society Khariar a well-equipped tertiary care hospital that will be able to provide competent compassionate service to the most critical patients. She has additionally undergone training and education as a palliative consultant and has a heart for dying patients.

She says, "I strongly felt that God was leading me to be planted here in Khariar, and I was moved by the crying need for medical help in this region. I dedicated my life to missions at the tender age of 24 years to serve long-term in Khariar. I have the vision to make Khariar not just a surviving mission hospital, but a thriving mission hospital, a mini CMC, and a tertiary-level medical center with a medical school in the future. I hope to be able to let the churches (both UCC and the Disciples) and individuals know about how this little frail four-bedded medical

mission started in 1930 and has grown into a 110-bedded secondary level multispecialty hospital. I want to share with them about the trying conditions of persecution and financial strains that this organization has suffered, and yet been richly blessed by the prayers, good wishes, and contributions of the churches and individuals. I want to testify to my brothers and sisters in the US on how God has enabled us to stand against all odds and be a progressive hospital adopting modern technology in medicine and surgery with a spirit of Christ's love and compassion, and offering competent care to the poorest of poor at very affordable prices, while all of the staff working in very low salaries, and striving to serve and follow Christ. I want to inform them about the needs and plans of this organization. I also want to inform them about the orphanage and the school that the hospital supports."

Dr. Pramanik's is a member of Mukti Marg Church, Church of North India, Khariar; one of our Global Ministries Mission Partners. CUCC is in talks with Dr. Pramanik and Global Ministries to bring her here to visit with us this fall. Watch for more information as we move into the fall!
