From the Pastor's Keyboard ...

"The Church in Action"

On August 19, over 200 people (including at least 20 church members) gathered at our Shelter House to celebrate a 115-year tradition; the program that is Scouting America. We gathered for BBQ and fellowship, and to witness a passing of the torch as new youth leaders were appointed for this term and the Scouting America oath was recited: "On my honor I will do my best to do my duty to God and my country and to obey the Scout Law; to help other people at all times; to keep myself physically strong, mentally awake, and morally straight." It was also a birth of sort; the birth of a brand-new relationship between Scouting America and CUCC. They are now our Scouts, and we are their church, and they are part of us and we are part of them. This is the ground floor for something that is going to positively impact our church forever.

The key takeaway I received from the folks who were here last night was sheer amazement that a church would be as welcoming as we are. The fact that I (and 20 or so church members) was present at their BBQ made a huge impact. Just by attending a BBQ, we exemplified an inclusive, extravagant welcome that showed folks what God's love truly looks like. **This is the church in action!**

Beyond the "newness" of Scouting America, we are also experiencing a "revival" of our Nurture & Education program! VBS this year was a HUGE success - 67 kids registered! WOW! The extravagance of the program was very impressive. The whole team (led by Lena & Gina) did an amazing job and brought God's Word to many in the community beyond our church. Many of these children, youth, and their parents also came to our Nurture & Education Team Parent's Meeting on August 25. We hope to continue to reach out to these people and draw them in to the life of our congregation. The Nurture & Education Ministry Team is also revitalizing the Sunday School program and the Youth Program with new leaders and new ideas. Watch for exciting and interesting things happening in the next few weeks! This is the church in action!

We are going to be celebrating Pridefest again this year, with a Pride booth set up here in Columbia on September 28 and – **new this year** - in Marshall, MO on September 7! We received word that Marshall, MO Pride was organizing their first-ever Pridefest and they have been receiving hateful backlash from the community, including churches in that community. Churches in Marshall have not been vocally supportive of their efforts, so we are going to staff a booth for four hours (10:00 a.m. - 2:00 p.m.) and offer "glitter blessings" to the attendees. It may be the only affirming faith expression these folks will receive at the Marshall Pridefest. **This is the church in action!**

On August 21, a dozen folks from CUCC attended the kickoff celebration of "The Opportunity Campus," a central hub for all the social service agencies in Columbia. Located on Business Loop just east of the power plant, this campus will house the Voluntary Action Center, Love Columbia, Room at the Inn, Loaves and Fishes, and many of the other agencies that work with unhoused people and others in need in our community. CUCC is and will be an active part of establishing this campus and aiding in its growth. The Outreach & Advocacy Ministry Team is

discerning the details on how to make this happen. This is the church in action!

CUCC is just that—a church in action! We are not just a church of "Sunday morning only" or just a "social club" that talks the talk but forgets to walk the walk. We are protesting, we are working, we are advocating, we are caring for one another and the world. We are walking and preaching and living out the life that Christ calls us to live; carrying on Jesus' mission and ministry with the world.

Great job, CUCC! This is a church that really knows what it means to be church. 
COURAGEOUS CHRISTIANITY-HOW TO FIGHT RACISM

Last winter, we took a brief look at the book "How to fight Racism" by Jemar Tisby. Those who participated in the study agreed, they want to explore it in more depth! There are three units to this study, which we will split up over the course of the next year.

This book is about taking a stand for justice in our world today by confronting racial injustice. It is unapologetically Christian; the subtitle is, "Courageous

Christianity and the Journey toward Racial Justice." The author speaks to this in the first chapter as he writes, "Christianity provides a transcendent narrative for why racial justice is important. Christianity teaches that all people are made in the image of God. Their physical appearance, including skin color, are part of bearing God's image and should be respected as such."

We will begin studying this book on Sunday, September 15 at 9:00 a.m. in the Fellowship Hall and continue the next two Sundays. The study will include videos and a workbook. Inclusion and Affirmation Ministry Team

Jonathan Haidt (PhD in social psychology) has written a 2024 book, "The Anxious Generation; How the Great Rewiring of Childhood is Causing an Epidemic of Mental Illness." In this book, he presents evidence of how our advancing technology (especially the smart phone) is changing how children perceive the world and their place in it. He also highlights how that same technology is creating havoc in the adult world.

This book is highly recommended to anyone with children and/or grandchildren. There is so much to reap from his work, but for our Communicator, let us focus on just one chapter called: "Spiritual Elevation and Degradation."

Mr. Haidt notes that when individuals see morally beautiful actions, they feel lifted up. When individuals participate in spiritual rituals such as attending church, eating with friends, walking in the park, etc., we are lifted up. True religions urge us to be less judgmental, more forgiving, and slower to anger. He states that we all have a "God-shaped hole in our human hearts that yearns for meaning, connection and spiritual elevation."

In contrast, social media often depicts negativity, and those words and pictures bring individuals down. That virtual world is disembodied, asynchronous, and disruptive. We carry that disruption in our pockets via our smart phones. This leads to a focus on ourselves more, too: Who is texting? What is that alert? How many likes did I get? Why isn't anyone responding? When will someone like me? Imagine how this affects a preteen/teenage mind. Teens already have a full plate with their changing bodies, school pressures, developing insights and opinions.

Mr. Haidt doesn't just describe the issues and show evidence of their effect on all of us; he offers solutions especially for our youth. Some actions require collective intervention, but there are things that parents can do, as well:

- No smartphones before high school. If needed, provide only basic phones for contact.
- No social media before the age of 16 (at the earliest).
- Encourage schools to be phone-free all day, not just during classes.
- Encourage more independence in play and more supervision online for children.
- Parents/Grandparents, be role models and put your phones down, pay attention to your loved ones without that distraction.

For those of us already addicted to our phones (young and old alike), these steps will be challenging, but the mental and physical health of ourselves and our children is at stake.

In closing: Proverbs 22:6 – "Train up a child in the way they should go; even when they are old, they will not depart from it."



Fresh starts also come into play for the school year: new learning opportunities, new skill sets and interests, new perspectives. As we approach our new Sunday School year, I am optimistic that we will all benefit from having a fresh start this year - of course, carrying over our joy, experiences, and knowledge from last year and so many years prior. We are hopeful that so many will consider the ways that they can help our ministry team support the learners of all ages at CUCC. GLOBAL MINISTRIES- EMPOWERING WOMEN IN INDIA

In 2009, The Centre for Social Equity and Inclusion (CSEI) was initiated in India by <u>Global Ministries</u> Mission Partners to build creative spaces, expand opportunities, and enhance the skills of youth from marginalized communities to access their rights and play a due role in society.

Unequal quality of education and discrimination in opportunities are key to maintaining large sections of the Indian population vulnerable and in poor development indicators. Young people from Dalit, Tribal, Minority, and other marginalized communities remain out of schools/colleges and enter the vicious cycle of poor technical and life skills, unemployment, migration, and poverty.

CSEI believes that promoting quality education and 21st-century skills for young people can empower them and their communities and contribute to national development. Girls from these communities face multiple challenges, such as low worth and value in family, barriers to mobility, household burdens, high dropout from education, early marriages, and negligible opportunities to enhance their personality, leadership, or learning. Since the pandemic, CSEI has laid special emphasis on adolescents in these communities through the Girl's Learning and Leadership Program (GLLP).

The GLLP enrolls Girl Champions (GCs) and Education Fellows (EFs), who are trained and further organize peer group members to promote social equity, inclusion, constitutional and legal literacy, sensitivity to gender, sexuality, and adolescence, governance, and other relevant social information.

To respond to children's poor school performance, CSEI began building curriculum modules in English, Math, Science, Digital, and Life Skills to support first-generation learners in effectively completing schooling at class 10. Math and Science curricula development was initiated with support from Global Ministries.

Since 2020, CSEI has trained:

- 60 Girl Champions, who further created a gender-sensitive learning environment for 1200 peer group girls across 60 habitations during the pandemic, busting isolation, depression, and fear.
- 90 Girl Champions who reached out to 1000+ peer group members to build foundational English language and life skills in 90 habitations.
- 11 Math fellows, who supported 1500 children in classes 6-8, reduced their fear of Math and facilitated the clarity of foundational concepts across 11 schools in Bihar and UP.
- Organized Science melas (festivals) in 60 habitations discussing health, hygiene, nutrition, safe drinking water, water conservation, and skills to measure building interest among children in electricity, light, magnetism, and many other science concepts through activities to interest them.

LODO PLAYGROUND RESPECT

Please help us keep our playground safe for all children by following these guidelines:

- The CUCC playground is designed for, and should be used by, *only children ages 8 and younger*.
- Adult supervision is required while children are on the playground.
- Mulch must stay on the ground. When children dig up mulch it creates holes that are tripping hazards. Children should only dig in the sandbox.
- Sand should stay in the sandbox. Please do not allow sand to be carried and dumped in the playhouse or on play structures.
- Use playground equipment in the manner it is intended.
