From the Pastor's Keyboard ...

"Christ is Risen!"

Happy Easter!

The eight-week Easter Season has begun, and we are going to be spending the next few Sundays reflecting on what the wisdom of the Resurrection means for us. God brought New Life to Jesus, just as Jesus brought New Life to his followers through his wisdom teachings. From fishers of fish who became fishers of men to Lazarus, literally raised from the dead, Jesus brought New Life and Hope wherever he went; before and after the Resurrection. How are God's promises of New Life and Hope seen in our world, in our lives, every day?

Look outside. You will find a world that is being reborn. Trees are budding, flowers are blooming, the browns of winter are turning into the greens of spring. In the bulb, there is a flower; in the seed, an apple tree. New Life is "springing" up everywhere, and we are witnesses to it. All of this beauty speaks wonders about God's Creation.

On the national scene, New Life is abundant as well. All of the Stock Market indexes are at record highs, the economy is stronger than it has been in 40 years, unemployment is at record lows, and nationwide crime has dropped significantly. We have conquered the pandemic with God's gift of a miracle vaccine. Medical miracles are restoring our quality of life. We don't often hear the good news amid the sensationalistic fear mongering of the ratings-driven news cycle, but the reality is that nationwide, New Life and Hope is also "springing" up in abundance at the national level in our country.

Here at CUCC, that New Life is seen in the dreams and visions of church leadership as we strive to ensure the relevance of this congregation for generations to come. The first quarter of 2024 has been a time of walking a Lenten journey for us. Church leadership has walked a path of discernment, dreamed about the possibilities, and has begun setting goals for where this church could be in the future. Establishment of an Endowment Fund, our new Strategic Plan, and other new initiatives are creating new possibilities we would not have imagined a few years ago. New Life is "springing" up in this congregation and I can tell you, without question, that the best days of CUCC are still ahead of us!

The Gospel attributed to Matthew tells us that even some who witnessed the Resurrection tried to deny it. They made up a story that the disciples came and stole Jesus away while the guards were sleeping. They were afraid of the new possibilities that Jesus' Resurrection meant for them. They were afraid they may have to change or do something outside of their comfort zone. Fear kept them from embracing the New Hope that




Jesus offered. Their fear led them to stick their head in the sand and miss the blessings that Jesus had to offer them. Sadly, we are often like those Resurrection deniers. How is New Life and Hope being revealed in your life this Easter Season? What are the possibilities that are surrounding you every day? How is God calling you to do a new thing? Inclusion and Affirmation Ministry Team

April is Autism Awareness Month. Autism is formally known as 'autism spectrum disorder' or ASD. Approximately one in 36 children are affected. Through years of scientific study, researchers have gained the increased ability to recognize and diagnose the various characteristics of the condition. Individuals with autism tend to have difficulty with communication and social interactions in comparison to those who are neurotypical. They often have specific interests, and repetitive behaviors making school, work and other areas of life challenging.

What causes autism is still under investigation. Possible factors are: older parents, certain genetic conditions, and low birth weight. Some studies show that the rate of autism is increasing. There are several hypotheses as to why, including: prenatal exposure to air pollution and/or certain pesticides; maternal obesity, diabetes, a compromised immune system; a difficult delivery causing oxygen deprivation to the baby.

Some examples of symptoms of ASD are: delayed language and movement skills beginning in infancy; delayed cognitive or learning skills; hyperactive, impulsive, or inattentive behavior; anxiety, stress, or excessive worry, repetition of words or phrases (echolalia); repetitive body movements (stims); difficulty adapting to minor changes; obsessive interests; difficulty comprehending social and emotional cues. These are some of the major symptoms that doctors and parents look out for in children especially.

A diagnosis is the result of examining symptoms to determine an illness or other issue. Diagnosing is the first step to open the doors to understanding what is going on and what to expect from it. In terms of autism, like many other mental and physical disorders, a diagnosis not only normalizes what's going on with those around us, but opens a dialogue and lets education flow. Like any disorder, autism can vary in intensity for each person living with it. One person may be labeled as what is called "low-functioning", meaning they need more aid to function at a neurotypical persons level. Another person may be labeled as "high-functioning", meaning they may only need help sometimes or on certain things or maybe not at all. While some may fall into the low or high functioning categories, some may be in the middle. It is known as an Autism Spectrum Disorder because each person is somewhere on a *spectrum*.

Part of awareness month is not just reading articles or donating money, but truly understanding all sides of the community. Some people with ASD strongly dislike the idea of a cure, because they are not broken or ill. Some people with ASD strongly want a cure to be found or created so they can live a "normal" life. This is just one example of discussions going on in the community. There are also talks of what therapies and symptom controls are helpful versus harmful, such as Applied Behavior Analysis therapy. The best way to learn about ASD and what life is like for people who are diagnosed with it is to talk to them in person or read their books or articles - learn from the source.

KidSight Vision Screenings

Free vision screenings were provided by KidSight on Mar 5 and Mar 6. KidSight uses a completely non-invasive method to screen young children for Nearsightedness, Farsightedness, Astigmatism, Amblyopia, Anisometropia, Anisocoria, and Misalignment. Each year, KidSight alerts parents of vision concerns that were previously unknown, allowing for follow-up with an eye doctor. Conference on the Young Years

LODO Staff attended the 51st Annual Conference on the Young Years on Friday March 8 and Saturday March 9. By providing professional development opportunities, we invest in our staff to provide an intentional, loving, and developmentally appropriate preschool experience for our LODO students. Conference on the Young Years also serves to provide team building for our staff, which creates a cohesive teaching team. We enjoyed three keynote speakers as a group: Kim Strobel's, "The Science of Happiness: Ignite Your Spark & Increase Your Potential", Dr. Joe Sanfelippo's, "Lead From Where You Are", and Mr. Roye Moye III's, "Changing the Future of STEM Education with STEMusic".

Strobel's presentation educated the audience on what happiness scientifically is and how it works. She goes on to explain how we can reprogram our brains to become more fulfilled and positive and step into our own power of happiness. A statistic that stood out was that employees are ten times more engaged, thirty-one percent more productive, and three times more creative when happiness and well-being are prioritized.

Dr. Sanfelippo's keynote focused on the word "just". He explained that we are conditioned to think we are "just"-just a teacher, just a director, just so on and so forth. This "just" is followed by reasons we think something *can't* happen. Leadership is not a title- it's an action. Leading with INTENTION creates purpose. Leading with CONNECTION creates momentum. Leading with DIRECTION creates collective efficacy. Leading with all three in mind will not only build your capacity, but foster an environment where everyone in your organization has the best opportunity to lead from where they are.

Mr. Moye's talk discussed the lack of racial diversity in STEM. As an aerospace engineer, he has witnessed this first hand. His experiences encouraged him to create STEMusic, an organization that encourages students to

pursue STEM fields by educating through the medium of music. Moye performs songs that describe how chemical reactions work, the formulas used to solve equations, and more. He shares these songs and musical examples with educators so they can empower their students seeking STEM in a relatable and memorable way.

Staff also took various breakout sessions during the conference for training in a variety of developmental areas. Our staff were eager to share the information from their individual sessions to help our team grow as a whole.

Grief - we all experience it at one time or another. It is mostly associated with loss: the loss of a job, a home, a beloved pet, or one's health to name a few. But the biggest loss we experience seems to be the loss of a loved one. In 1975, Kenneth C. Haugk, a psychologist and pastor, created a non-denominational, not-for-profit Christian educational organization known as Stephen Ministries which is based in St. Louis. The main function is to train leaders capable of assisting those who are facing the crisis of loss. Rev. Haugk has written four pamphlets specifically on grief. They are given to a family experiencing loss, one at a time, over a period of a year. They are entitled: A Time to Grieve; Experiencing Grief; Finding Hope and Healing; Rebuilding and Remembering. CUCC has purchased sets of these pamphlets to be given, at timed intervals, to assist families experiencing loss. I received my first pamphlet three months after my husband's passing. I found all of them to be extremely helpful in my journey through grief. He includes quotes, anecdotes, personal experience and scripture to guild the reader through the maze that encompasses one dealing with such a heavy loss. It is such a blessing to be in a congregation that supports and advocates for the mental and spiritual health of each member, through all walks of life and beyond.

Why We Need to Read Bible Stories to Our Young Children

It is important and valuable for those of us who are parents (or grandparents!) to read the Bible with our children, starting very young with simple, sweet toddler Bibles, and progressing through the more age-appropriate children's Bibles as they get older. Kids find the stories interesting and exciting, and love to hear about the adventures of Moses, David, Jonah, Esther, and others. For young children, many of the Old Testament stories, in particular, are colorful, easy to follow and dramatic.

We are helping them understand that:

- The Bible is God's book and it is important. Kids quickly pick up on the fact that, if it is important enough to mom or dad to keep on coming back to that children's Bible again and again, there is something really important about it. It will become important to them too.
- God is a miracle-worker and helps Their people. It's impossible to read about the Exodus, even in the simplest children's Bible, and miss the lesson that God is active in human affairs and wants to help Their children. The lesson that God is powerful, loving, and deeply interested in human beings is a simple and obvious, but deep
- God works in ways that we don't expect. Blood on doorposts? Manna from heaven? How surprising! The walls of Jericho crumbling without any physical human effort? Shocking! God using a great fish to teach Jonah a lesson? Who would have thought? Kids are rightfully amazed and surprised by these things, as they should be. Without the cynicism and doubt that prevents so many adult minds from experiencing awe, children read and develop a simple, beautiful faith in an amazing God whose ways are higher and more powerful than our own ways.
- Faith and obedience lead to blessings, and sin can lead to problems. From Adam and Eve, to Sarah, to David, Jonah, Hannah and more, the message that to trust and obey God is clearly the better way to go is woven through the Bible from beginning to end.
- God makes and keeps promises. When God promised to save Noah and his family from the Flood, They did. When God promised Abraham and Sarah a long-desired son, Isaac was the answer. When God promised to fight for Joshua and lead him into the Promised Land, They did. Through these stories our children learn that God can be trusted to fulfill Their Word.

Sitting down regularly with our kids and reading Bible stories seems like such a simple little thing. It doesn't take a theology degree or advanced learning to sit and lovingly read with our kids. But that time together gives them a valuable foundation to build on. The seeds that are planted in the process promise to take root and flower into greater spiritual and personal growth down the road.

Worship & Music Ministry Team

As we enter the Easter Season, I have been revisiting all of the great choral music associated with the Easter season. The piece I most frequently associate with Easter is "The Messiah" by George Friedrich Handel. If you don't know that piece by name, you will likely know its most famous movement, "The Hallelujah Chorus". This piece is a nearly 3 hour long oratorio. Like an opera, an oratorio is a musical dramatic work with a full orchestra. It tells an extended story. Unlike opera, there is no scenery, costumes, and stage acting. Singers frequently refer to oratorio as "park-and-bark," i.e. they stand in one place and sing.

The text for Handel's Messiah comes from the book of Isaiah and it is divided into three parts: the first are prophecies regarding the Messiah that will come, second is the birth and life of Jesus, the third the death and Resurrection of Jesus.

This story is told in a number of ways. Soloists will sing speech-like figures that we call "recitative". It is mostly expository and sets the music up for the chorus pieces.

In what some believe to be "Heavenly inspiration," Handel wrote the entire oratorio in 24 days. The Messiah is likely the most-frequently used piece in all of choral music.
