

From the Pastor's Keyboard ...

"Hope in Difficult Times"

Praise the Lord! Praise the Lord, O my soul!
I will praise God as long as I live;
I will sing praises to God my whole life long! -Psalm 146:1-2

During the month of November, we are going to be looking at the story of Ruth and Naomi, as found in the Book of Ruth. We will explore each chapter separately in worship on Sundays in November; but the importance of the story of Ruth and Naomi is in its entirety. This story is about having hope in the midst of despair.

The story arc of Ruth and Naomi is quite a journey. It begins with hope, promise, and prosperity, as they live luxurious lives with their husbands in Moab. Naomi, her husband, and her sons, were a good Jewish family from Judah, living in Moab for comfort and prosperity during a time of famine in Judah. Naomi and her family had plenty. The sons took Moabite wives, Ruth and Orpah, and anticipated the many descendants their unions would produce.

But then tragedy struck. The men all died, leaving the women helpless. Ruth and Naomi went from prosperity to poverty overnight. Naomi even changes her name to "Mara" which means "bitter" to reflect the hard times of their current context.

But faith is their guide. Naomi shares the faith of her ancestors with Ruth, and that faith guides them to promise, provision and plenty. Returning to the land of Judah, Ruth garners the attention of Boaz, a wealthy kinsman of Naomi's. After a brief courtship, Ruth and Boaz marry and conceive a son. Naomi joins them in their household to help care for the child; and through that child, the lineage of Naomi eventually produces David, who becomes the mightiest King ever for the people of Israel.

As we examine this story arc, we see promise and prosperity lost, resulting in poverty and despair; but even in the midst of that, there is hope. Working hard in faith, Ruth and Naomi regain their security. More importantly, God works through the poverty of Ruth and Naomi to produce the mightiest King ever to rule over Israel. David is the result of Naomi's bitter turn of events. From scarcity comes abundance.

This message is one of great importance to us in this day and age. As I write this, one of the most contentious elections in our history will come to a head in just two weeks. The fate of the world will be handed over to someone new, and we will live into that season no matter who is the top vote-getter. There will be a tumultuous time between November 5 and January 20, to be sure; but no matter what bitter times we go through, our faith tells us that there is always hope. God did not forget Ruth and Naomi, even when they felt bitter in their context. In like manner, God will not forget us, no matter the bitter divide within our country.

For this presence, we give thanks. In this season of Thanksgiving, no matter how "bitter" things get, we do have much for which we are thankful; most of all, God's presence in all things. God is our rock

and our redeemer no matter what; and for that, we give thanks.

While we are giving thanks it is not too early to look ahead to Advent! The Advent

That Sunday will also be our annual Cookies by the Pound sale, to benefit the Nurture & Education Ministry Team Fund. The Sunday School Christmas program is December 15. Our Women's Fellowship will be selling jellies and other goodies starting November 17, and they will have a bake sale November 24 to purchase goodies for Thanksgiving.

The season of preparation for Christ's birth is almost upon us; a wonderful time for Christians everywhere to be thankful, indeed!

The Council Steward is available to greet visitors who arrive after worship has begun, assist those who may not feel well, answer questions and give directions to people who need to step out of worship, and monitor the Gathering Area as needed.

The Nurture & Education Ministry Team has been talking to our children and youth about being safe at church, including walking - not running - inside our church building, and staying only in the Gathering Area or the sanctuary during Worship. We ask that parents and guardians help reinforce these safety standards and ensure that our children and youth follow these guidelines.

I'd be willing to guess back in the Native American and pilgrim days, the size of the harvest party largely depended on how good the harvest was each year. In a way, globalism has put an end to these hyper local ups and downs and on the whole I would have to imagine that's a good thing. But again, what exactly does the modern person harvest? Is it money? Status? Objects? Relationships? I think I will leave it as an open ended question to ponder. And you may find yourself answering it as this season of reflection begins, perhaps at the Thanksgiving dinner table or in a quiet moment. There is a 2022 website called 'SC training.' The "SC" stands for Safety/Culture training. It's target audience is employers, but several of their statements could apply anywhere to any organization or, even, to individuals. Here are a few examples.

Ethnic and Cultural Differences: Each of our identities have a basis in the culture and customs we observed and experienced growing up. As we all have unique upbringings, these differences can, at times, illicit positive or negative feelings in others. It is important to learn how to calmly discuss these issues in order to find resolutions that are acceptable to all. Alternative lifestyles (lifestyles that differ from society's 'norms'): When we hear that phrase, we often think of the Queer community. However, alternative lifestyles also include: veganism, choosing to be childless, modifying one's body (tattoos, bright hair coloring, etc.,) and unusual hobbies - just to name a few. Accepting our differences and/or preferences begins with understanding the reasons behind those choices. Those discussions can assist with understanding and acceptance of identities that are different from our own. Non-Inclusive Diversity: As the saying goes, "diversity is a fact – inclusion is an act." Diversity without inclusion, within any type of community, defeats the purpose of being diverse. Thus, having a roomful of individuals from various walks of life, but only catering to the dominant subgroup, is counterproductive. (Source: training.safetyculture.com)

I delivered several backpacks in October that were much appreciated. On October 4, I attended the CPS Faith -based Advisory Committee meeting with Superintendent Dr. Yearwood and Ms. Jennifer Maddox (CPS Director of Health Services) and Dr. Jeff Klein (Chief Academic Officer.) There are a number of different faith groups represented at these meetings and it is a good opportunity to meet and work with them in aiding our youth to attend school and learn and grow. Dr. Yearwood encouraged the Faith community to talk with parents and families to engage in their children's schools through PTAs, various organizations, and volunteering that connects their youth to the schools and learning.

He also asked us to share the CPS data:

*over the past 2 years we have increased our attendance from 73% to 80% with a goal of 90% in 2026-27.

*our graduation rate has increased to 90.1%.

*we have decreased our out of school suspensions from 3684 to 3202 and our goal is to continue decreasing out of school suspensions because our students cannot learn when they are not in school.

*goal of 3% proficiency on MAP exams each year (math and communication arts).

It was so exciting on October 18 when I visited with Kindergarten students at the AVID Academy day and they told me, and showed me through their drawings, what they wanted to be when they grew up: police, doctor, motorcycle racer, dad, ballerina, mom, ninja, gymnast, princess!

DR. NIBEDITA PRAMANIK AND THE EVANGELICAL HOSPITAL SOCIETY KHARIR

On Sunday, October 6, Dr. Nibedita Pramanik was our special guest for the 9:00 a.m. Adult Education Sunday School hour, and 10:30 a.m. worship. We were thrilled to have her with us for these special times of education and fellowship. After worship, Anne Heine and the Health Ministry Care Team took her out for lunch, and a tour of University Hospital. It was an amazing day of building a connection with one of our global mission partners.

Dr, Pramanik is a Global Missions Co-Worker (Missionary) with <u>Global Ministries</u>, the shared mission agency of the United Church of Christ/Disciples of Christ. Through Global Ministries, we have a presence with 250 mission partners all around the world, in 90 countries.

<u>The Evangelical Hospital Society</u> in Kharir, India is one of those mission partners; and Dr. Pramanik is the director of this Hospital. Dr. Pramanik share a bit of their history with us in her presentation on October 6:

In 1923, The German Evangelical Synod (our predecessor) sent Rev. Herman Feierabrand and his spouse, Marie Feierabrend (RN), along with their children, to Kharir to establish a congregation. The Mukti Marg Church was established in 1923, (the same year our church was established). They also established an orphanage and a school. All of these are thriving to this day. However, two of their children died of communicable diseases in this first year of missionary work. The nearest medical facility was three days away. Healing from this tragedy, they petitioned the Evangelical Synod to form a hospital in Kharir. The Synod agreed, and the Evangelical Hospital Society was formed in 1930. What started as a 4-bed hospital in 1930 has now grown into a 110-bed multispecialty secondary level hospital complex, working together with the school and the orphanage.

Evangelical Hospital Society in Khariar treats the poor with the best medical care, adopting new cost effective technology to provide holistic care. They strive to be Christ's witness through their service to the community. Their outpatient services include specialties in general surgery, orthopedics, pediatrics, obstetrics and gynecology, palliative medicine and psychiatry. Internal services include 24 hour a day, 7 day a week emergency services, critical care services, recovery services, and more. They have full radiological services and advanced laboratory services including hematology, biochemistry, and microbiology labs; as well as a blood bank. This is just one of the missions we, as a congregation, support through our support of Global Ministries and the National United Church of Christ. Please continue to keep Global Ministries, The Evangelical Hospital Society, and Dr. Pramanik in your prayers!
