From the Pastor's Keyboard...

"A Pentecost Moment"

And he (Peter) testified with many other arguments and exhorted them... and that day about three thousand persons were added. They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved. -Acts 2:37-47

Our Tuesday afternoon Bible Study group has been looking at the Book of Acts and all the ways the early church was fired up by the Holy Spirit to do God's work in the world. In this section, the Holy Spirit inspires Peter to preach to the crowds gathered in Jerusalem; and because of his testimony, three thousand people were added.

This is not a story of institutional support or doctrinal mandate; this is a story of the power of testimony. God's Holy Spirit did not "inspire" three thousand people to join the church, God's Holy Spirit inspired Peter to reach out to a community of people who were hungry to hear a message of faith with integrity. The Holy Spirit did not act alone; They acted through Peter and the other Apostles.

Our church is in a Pentecost moment. After the ravages of the pandemic and the attrition of membership due to the cultural effects of that pandemic, we are in a Pentecost moment. We have a new LODO Director, and a new Music Coordinator, both with new visions for ministry; we have an Administrative Assistant with fresh new ideas and great skills and a fantastic Organist/Accompanist. All three section leaders are planning to come back this fall, and several frequent guests are interested in becoming more connected with the church. We are fully staffed to do great things in the time that is to come. We are in a pivotal moment in the life of our congregation.

But the Holy Spirit is not going to revive the church all on Their own; just as the Holy Spirit did not, independently, add three thousand people to the early church. The Holy Spirit needs "Peters" to get the job done. Just like that first century community of faithful people who were dismissed as irrelevant by religious leaders, we have a world full of people who have been turned off by hypocritical church. The right message will bring new vitality to our congregation, if we are bold enough to preach it.

But why would we want to do such a thing? Is it all about keeping the doors to this church open? Is it about institutional vitality alone? If that is the only reason we "do church" then our work is essentially irrelevant. Our witnessing is not just about paying the bills for this institution; it is about spreading the Good News of Jesus Christ to a world that needs to hear it- just like Acts 2. We are called to glorify God, not this church; but one of the ways we glorify God is by bringing institutional stability to God's church; in this setting, Columbia UCC.

Columbia United Church of Christ needs a marketing team. But the marketing team that we need is not just a "committee" of 6-8 people; it is a team of 200+ people; the members of this church. We all need to be the "marketing team" for Columbia UCC by sharing the Good News, witnessing just as Peter did to all who will hear. Social media posts, word of mouth, direct invitations, and even casual conversation will help draw people to our church. But they won't know the glories of loving Christ if you don't show them the way.

• Question- can people tell you are a member of CUCC from your Facebook page?

- Question- do your friends/co-workers know you go to church?
- Question- how can you work "church" into casual conversation with your friends?

This summer, many people "take off" from church. I encourage you to use this summer to introduce some of your friends to Columbia UCC through social media, word of mouth, direct invitation and casual conversation. Bring a friend Sunday is not just once a year; it is our call as Christians to practice this every Sunday. We are Pentecost people; let's all go out and share the Good News! -Pastor Rick



The Story of David Ho

David Ho's father left Taiwan searching for a better life for his family. Nine years later, he was able to bring them to America. At 12 years old, David Ho didn't speak English. Yet, he completed high school with honors, attended MIT and Cal Tech studying physics. That lead him to molecular biology. As a medical resident, he witnessed some of the first AIDS cases in the U.S. Ho developed the 'cocktail' now used to treat early stages of HIV. His treatment has been credited with extending the lives of HIV individuals.

REFURBISHING BELLS

We love the music from our Chapel Ringers; but, the bells are getting older and are in need of a tune up. The last time they were "refurbished" was 2007, and they are well in need of another one. "Refurbishment" means sending them to Malmark Bells in Pennsylvania where they will inspect each bell and refurbish/fix the necessary components. The Worship and Music Ministry Team brought a proposal to the Church Council to do this, and the Church Council approved. The total cost for this will be a **minimum of \$3,408** and probably wind up closer to \$4,000. We currently have \$1,965 in our Worship & Music Designated Fund; not enough to cover this entire expense. EGYPTIAN-US DIALOGUE INITIATIVE

The Egyptian-US Dialogue Initiative is a collaborative effort of the Coptic Evangelical Organization for Social Services (CEOSS) through its Forum for Intercultural Dialogue and US churches and ecumenical partners, including the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) and United Church of Christ with Global Ministries. Launched in 2014, the Initiative recently met in New York City and Washington, DC from April 27 through May 1.

The meeting was the seventh encounter since 2016, when the initiative began. CEOS, Disciples, and the UCC were joined by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, the Presbyterian Church (USA), and ecumenical organizations, including the National Council of Churches of Christ in the USA and Churches for Middle East Peace.

The Egyptian-US Dialogue Initiative seeks to build bridges of common interest – cultural, social, logistical, and religious – between the nations of Egypt and the United States. Topics of discussion include issues specific to Egypt and the US, as well as global issues. The Initiative discussed countering extremism and radical ideologies in 2025. It has previously addressed confronting terrorism and hate speech, countering disinformation, the promotion of efforts related to coexistence and dialogue, and what it means to face global pandemics such as COVID-19.

Peace comes through dialogue, sharing hopes, dreams and fears. When people from diverse nationalities and



expressions of faith can come together in dialogue such as this, the world leans a bit close to Imago Dei– the image of God. Please continue to keep the international and interfaith work of CEOSS and the work of Global Ministries in your prayers as together we work for peace, love and justice in God's world.
